Dear Dutcher

I see no objection to various methods.  
I enclose a copy of your letter of Oct. 1 about the loan of a District Court & Raupibus so will you forward & return promptly. We should be very glad to avoid delay.

You will see from the attached letter that the F.O. want us to lend them an E.A.P. or Uganda official to act as Collector of Peumba for two years. I have no doubt that a District Commr. with the necessary qualifications could be found to whom the higher pay for two years would be a sufficient attraction.

- We should have to stipulate however, that no expense was caused to E.A.P. (or Uganda) funds by the arrangement. This would mean that
- (a) The man would have to be seconded for the purpose, his place in the E.A.P. (or Uganda) service would have to be filled in the meantime.
  - (b) The F.O. would have to pay the cost of his successor's passage to East Africa.
  - (c) No leave with pay or passage from E.A.P. (or Uganda) funds would be earned by the Zanzibar service.
  - (d) The Zanzibar service would not count for pension from E.A.P. (or Uganda) funds.

Dear Tilley,

I think there is a mistake about the men you sent from Marybury Africa Protection from Beaufort.

We are ready to take Mr. Tilley's men & give you a District Commissioner & his Dependants & his actions for two years. We will also stipulate that no longer than during the term of Africa Protection of five & one-half years. This would mean that

(a) District Commissioner & his Dependants  
will be paid £100 per month & £1000 per annum.

(b) District Commissioner & his Dependants  
will be given a residence & all expenses.

- (c) to leave with pay or pension on Dec 1<sup>st</sup> next  
Africa Protectorate which will be turned  
over to the Military Commissioner's service on the  
same day.
- (d) His return in that capacity with the rank  
of Captain from the above mentioned field.
- (e) The cost of his passage from Africa to  
either the sea or land by land route in first  
class "private" passenger to be paid by the War  
Office.

I think it will be well to set each of these things  
quite clearly before anything is said to forward, so  
that you may see exactly what is involved.

If the Foreign Office come to these conditions  
will you kindly let me know so that I will telegraph to  
the Foreign Office again, and ascertain if there is any one  
objection to the same being done.
