I am directed by Secretary Sir E. Grey to transmit to you herewith copy of a despatch which has been received from His Majesty's Agent and Consul-General at Zanzibar, with reference to the desirability of inducing Germany to adhere to the Paris Sanitary Convention of 1903 on behalf of German East Africa.

Before, however, approaching the German Government in the matter, Sir E. Grey would be glad to have Mr. Secretary Harcourt's views on the subject and in particular as to whether he would feel disposed, in the event of the point being raised by the German Government, to adhere to the Paris Convention on behalf of British East Africa.

Sir,

I have the honour to inform Your Excellency that the Gambia Government is about to become a party to the Maritime Convention, ... article 14 of that Convention provides that "Coasting traffic shall be controlled by special regulations to be agreed upon by the countries concerned."

It appears to the Gambia Government that the simplest method of coming to an agreement on the subject with your administration would be to despatch Mr. Spurrier, the Government Health Officer, to ...

I should be glad if you could let me know whether such a course would commend itself to you and if so whether it would be agreeable that Doctor Spurrier should go over to Dar-es-Salaam in the course of the next 3 or 4 weeks.
