I am directed by Secretary Sir E. Grey to transmit to you herewith copy of a despatch which has been received from His Majesty's Agent and Consul-General at Zanzibar, with reference to the desirability of inducing Germany to adhere to the Paris Sanitary Convention of 1903 on behalf of German East Africa.

Before, however, approaching the German Government in the matter, Sir E. Grey would be glad to have Mr. Secretary Harcourt's views on the subject and in particular as to whether he would feel disposed, in the event of the point being raised by the German Government, to adhere to the Paris Convention on behalf of British East Africa.

"With reference to my despatch No. 7 in this series
dated the 13th November 1909 I have the honour to
transmit copies of correspondence which has passed
between myself and the Governor of German East Africa
(for which see last transmission) in answer
to that telegram addressed to me by the Secretary
of State dated 19th January 1910.

It is very difficult now to regard what affairs will be
as possible by means of some international
obligations in the matter to which we could on occasion
be called upon. I would therefore suggest that if you are
in position to do so you should find an early
opportunity

opportunity which might possibly be given in concluding
the negotiations for the new German-Egyptian
treaty of endeavouring to arrange that German East
Africa should also become a party to the Convention
in question.

I have the honour to inform Your Excellency that the
Zanzibar Government is about to become a party to the various
Sanitary Conventions, and article 34 of that Convention
provides that "Quarantine traffic shall be governed by
special regulations to be agreed upon by the countries
concerned."

It appears to the writing Government that the
simplest method of coming to an agreement on the subject
will your administration would be to despatch telegrams
to the Commissioner of Health, to arrangements
for the protection of the public health.
