THE proposal of the Syndicate communicated in your Lordship's telegram No. 28 might, I consider, be carried out. My Lord,

I HAVE the honour to submit further correspondence as to the man who recently gave himself out to be a "Mahdi."

He is now being taken proper care of.

The correspondence where marked by me\* is interesting, coming as it does upon what I have frequently heard from other sources, and showing that the wildest rumours are circulating as to the opportunities which adventurers will have, should the troops withdraw.

It will be necessary to do much before the authority of the tribal headmen can be sufficiently strengthened to enable them to deal fairly with unrest. Headmen are only beginning to reassume responsibility, and it needs time to cause them to fit themselves for the position we intend them to fill.

WITH reference to and in continuation of my telegram of the 25th February, I have the honour to report as follows:—

I received the news that the prisoner, Isa Ahmed or Kharshie, had proclaimed himself the Mahdi when I was at Bohotish, the news getting there the day I arrived. The man was well known, but reported to have no standing or influence. The Havaldar of the militia at Lasu Jelawadi reported the matter, asking for instructions, and I sent orders that the man was to be arrested at once. Later the man was reported to be very sick, so I ordered a sentry to be placed over him, if he was unfit to be moved, and sent Jemadar Mahomed Yusuf out from Mf Dab to inquire, giving him special instructions to identify the corpse should the man by any chance have died!

The militia at Las Jelawadi arrested the man, and he was brought in by Jemadar Mahomed Yusuf, arriving at Wadamago on the evening of the 26th.

The prisoner Isa Kharshie admitted to me that he was the Mahdi and was inspired. His statement as well as those of Jemadar Mahomed Yusuf and Akil Farah Naleya Rer Saal are attached.

There is no doubt that the man has been ill (he still suffers at times from fever) and is mad, on the subject of religion, though in some ordinary matters he appeared to me to be quite sane. He had apparently no time to cause a disturbance or gain any influence before his arrest.

Like the present Mulish at his commencement, this man does not appear to have actually preached against the Government, but the possibilities latent in a matter of this sort are too great to be overlooked, and I have kept the man a close prisoner.

*Jemadar Mahomed Yusuf's Report.*

ON my arrival at Lasu, where I went under orders of the Political Officer to inquire into the case of a new Mullah reported from there, I found the man Isa Ahmed in the custody of the militia who had been previously ordered to arrest him. I asked the man what was the matter with him. He said, "Did you not hear that I am the Mahdi?" I asked him how he was the Mahdi, and what were his arrangements. He said, "I was made Mahdi by God, and am the 'Muktear' of the whole country. I intend putting 400 men into Eil Dab and 200 into Wadamago. The Sirkar will go away." Mahomed Abdulla, the Mullah, is my servant.

I then told him he would have to come with me to the Sahib. Some of the women and children round in the Karias were saying they did not know what sort of a man he was.

I collected all the Akils of the Habr Toljaala and Dolbahanta, five in all. They said that they had been some distance off and had only just heard of the matter, as they were collecting camels for transport of rations to Eil Dab. None of these Akils were at Lasu when I arrived, and I had to send out for them. I asked them what they thought of the matter, and said that if they thought the man should be released I would report to the Sahib for orders. The Akils said they had heard what the man had been saying, but that it would be better if he were taken to the Sahib as they could not recommend his release. I therefore brought the man in.

The man had no followers, nor was any man listening to him. He had called on all people after the "Id" to follow him. The militia at Lasu first heard a rumour that this man was calling himself the Mahdi, and the Havaldar sent seven men to find out. The man Isa Ahmed told them that he was the Mahdi, and they informed the Havaldar, who sent in a letter asking for orders. He was told to arrest the man at once, and did so.

The Akil of the Rer Saal Farah Naleyha never sent news to the militia about this man.\* This man is a relative of Isa Ahmed's and the Karis is the same. I think this Akil was keeping the man dark. He told me that he had tied up Isa Ahmed at first, but the Havaldar of the militia said that this was not the case. I saw no disturbance caused by this man's talk, but people were beginning to talk about it.

*Statement by Abid Farah Naleyha Rer Saal.*

I am related to the man Isa Ahmed (Kharshe). I am his uncle. I think that he is mad. About fifteen or sixteen days ago he went like this. He said he was the Mahdi, but he said he had been told so by God. He did not abuse anyone, or beat any one, or talk against any one. He told us that he would settle between the Sirkar and Mahomed Abdulla, the Mullah. He said the Mullah was under him. He said nothing against the Sirkar. He was saying that he would tell all Mohammedans to pray at the proper time and not fight. He did not tell me of his intention of putting men in Eil Dab or Wadamago. I did not speak much to him. The day that he went off his head I tied him up, and when the sepoys came they told me to keep him for six days. They then came back after getting their orders and took him in custody to

their zariba. The man went mad on the day of "Id," and I tied him up, and the sepoys arrived before I could send news to them. That is all I have to say.

*Statement of Isa (Kharshe Ahmed) Habr Toljaala Rer Saal of Karim.*

My Karis is at Gurir, near Lasu. I came to Wadamago from Karis as I had a case—the girl I was engaged to bring about to be married to another. The case was settled before a punch,\* and the girl was declared mine by right. The father of the girl wanted more "yard"† from me, which I was unable to pay, and the punch decided that I had either to pay or get back the property which I had given, and the girl would then be free to marry another. This was arranged, and the defendant, a Havaldar of the militia, agreed to pay the full property for the girl. I went to Lasu, where I was ill. I was ill when I left Wadamago. I told the Karis people I had fever. When shortly after the "Id" God showed me something. This was on the first day of this Arabic month (Araf), God showed me all that was in the Koran and also in all the other books which we have come from God. I don't know how to read, but I was shown it all. God told me that if the people agreed I was to say that I was the Mahdi, and if they did not agree to say I was only Isa Ahmed. I was told that the English were to be with me, and that Abdulla Hassan (the Mullah) was to be under me. I said that I would post men into Wadamago and Eil Dab if the Sirkar was pleased (admits he told Mahomed Yusuf that he would put 400 men into Eil Dab and 200 into Wadamago, and that the Sirkar would go away and he would be the "Muktear" of the place). I never said I would fight the Sirkar. At first I said that I would kill any one who did not join me. Where the Sirkar does not administer it is the custom that any one who does not pray for three days should have his throat cut. This is according to Shariya custom. I told the people to pray and feed "Miskeens" and drop "fins" and not fight. I told them to listen to me according to our Shariya and to follow me. I would send word to the Sirkar, and then kill any one who did not obey me. I intended to follow God's orders and act according to the Shariya, but not to fight with the Sirkar. If the Sirkar does not want me to do this I will go away and do nothing; if the Sirkar tells me not to, I will not go to the Mejidah. I was all right in my head when I was saying these things, but was frightened at what God was telling me. I was eight days' senseless before this happened with sickness.
