2. It will be seen that Mr. Holt was required to resign his office because alcoholic indulgence had incapacitated him from the duties of his office.

3. In view of the Mr. Holt's twenty years of service under the Imperial Post Office of the United Kingdom, and of his general good character, which he was entitled to the special gratifications referred to by Sir Charles Elliot's letter of the 11<sup>th</sup> of March, Mr. Lytton would be disposed to treat his case in the same way

4. The reduction in such cases is 50 per cent, and this is the amount of reduction which Mr. Lytton would suggest in the case of Mr. Holt's salary. Mr. Holt's salary was £330 and his total service in the E. I. P. was beyond 10 months.
