In reply to your letter of yesterday (16.5.1905) the Principal requests me to say that owing to the short time the Post Graduate Courses have been instituted in years there are not more than one or two suitable Candidates for the appointments about which you write, who have attended these Courses - His Honor the Honorary Magistrate is communicating with me on the subject.

The Principal thinks it would be highly advantageous attendance on the Post Graduate course of elementary Bacteriology & Pathology should be one of the qualifications of Candidates for all appointments of this nature & he hopes that in a year or two there will be a very much larger number available than is at present the case. I may say that the number attending the Post Graduate Courses during the last 12 months has been 28, the great majority of whom held responsible positions either at home or abroad, and it is confidently hoped that the numbers attending in subsequent years will show a considerable increase.
