With reference to my telegrams Nos. 108 and 109 of

11th and 14th instant, I have the honour to submit the
following report on the circumstances attending the
death of the late Mr. R. F. Weston, one of the
Government Surveyors:

[On April 10th Mr. Weston was engaged in surveying
an estate on the West bank of the Garenat River. After
lunching at 12 o'clock he removed his hat and coat
and entered the river presumably with the intention of
crossing, as he had taken a sight on to a point on the
other bank. It has since been discovered that there
is a very deep hole a few yards from the bank with a
steep, rocky bottom covered with weeds, and it is
surmised

unconscious but the deceased slipped into the hole and was entangled in the long grass.

Two Indian chairmen were a short distance behind Mr. G. C. Tracy and his dog alone was visible when he sank. On hearing a shout proceeding from the water and the barking of the dog, the two Indians ran to the bank and saw two large air bubbles coming to the surface.

Information was immediately sent to the Government Farm at Naivasha, and the river searched the same afternoon. Owing to the treacherous and boggy nature of the ground however, the body was not discovered until the morning of the following day. It was then found to be covered with long grass which had led to the wrong conclusion. The remains were buried with full military honours.
