Mr Sir J Stewart's reply is not very clear. The Treasury refused to allow Mr Brandt the advantages of establishment notwithstanding that in order to mark his subordination to Mr Sturdy, whose substantive salary was to be less than that received by Mr Brandt.

Subsequently, however, they passed the increased Veterinary estimates in blue, and this included the charge in Mr Sturdy's establishment from £450 to £100, probably to £550

Mr Brandt's salary is therefore now less than his chief's and the Treasury objection falls to the ground.

In view of the repeated recommendation in Mr Brandt's favour, I think it might explain the position to the Treasury & ask them to agree to his being put on the permanent establishment.

Sir,

It would appear from Foreign Office despatch No. 104 of February 27th which encloses a copy of a letter from H. M. Treasury No. 3032/05 that Mr. Brandt is now placed on the list of permanent officials at a salary of five hundred pounds per annum and is eligible for pension rights and the advantages of establishment, his pay being less than that of Mr. Sturdy the Chief Veterinary Officer.

It is not, however, quite clear that H.M. Treasury realised that Mr. Sturdy's salary was to be raised from April 1st last.

of £550 a year was

It appears, therefore, ⁴²⁵
that the substantive
emoluments of W. Stoddy
are now greater than
the salary of £500
received by Mr. Brandt,
and in these circumstances,
and in view of the repeated
recommendations in Mr
Brandt's favour which
have been received
from the Protectorate,
and by the Hon. Members
that their Lordships
will consent to sanction
the retention of
that officer with
the usual privileges
of establishment.
