Sir,

Brig-General Sir W. H. Manning has spoken to me with reference to a proposal made, I understand, by the Postmaster General for British East Africa, for the establishment of a through overland telegraphic service between British Central Africa and Mombasa.

I understand from what General Manning tells me that an arrangement is under discussion between yourself and the Governor General of German East Africa by which it is hoped that Mombasa will be joined up with Tanga by an overland line, and that the line from Darassalaam to Tabora may be continued to Ujiji on Lake Tanganyika, (where it would connect with the African Transcontinental Telegraph Company's line.)

General Manning suggested that it might possibly to some extent assist in the carrying out of this scheme if I were to communicate with you giving my opinion as to the benefits which would be derived by this Protectorate. I have the honour to state that it is quite clear from the Memorandum supplied to me through General Manning by Mr. Gosling that very considerable benefits would accrue to British Central Africa. Not only should we have an

In reply to Foreign Office despatch No. 1234 on 24th inst, I have the honor to inform you that Lieutenant Colonel Barry took out sportsman's licence at Mombasa on August 16th 1905 at the same time he was issued a copy of the Game Regulations.

I do not consider that his plea that he was unaware that an East African licence did not empower him to shoot in Uganda should be admitted. Had he made enquiries on this point he would have been informed at Mombasa that he would have to take out another licence in Uganda and however unfair he may consider the fact that he should be called upon to do so, the fact that he should be called upon to do so is clear from his own game returns that he made use of both licences, as he shot game in Uganda and also at Mientaita in this

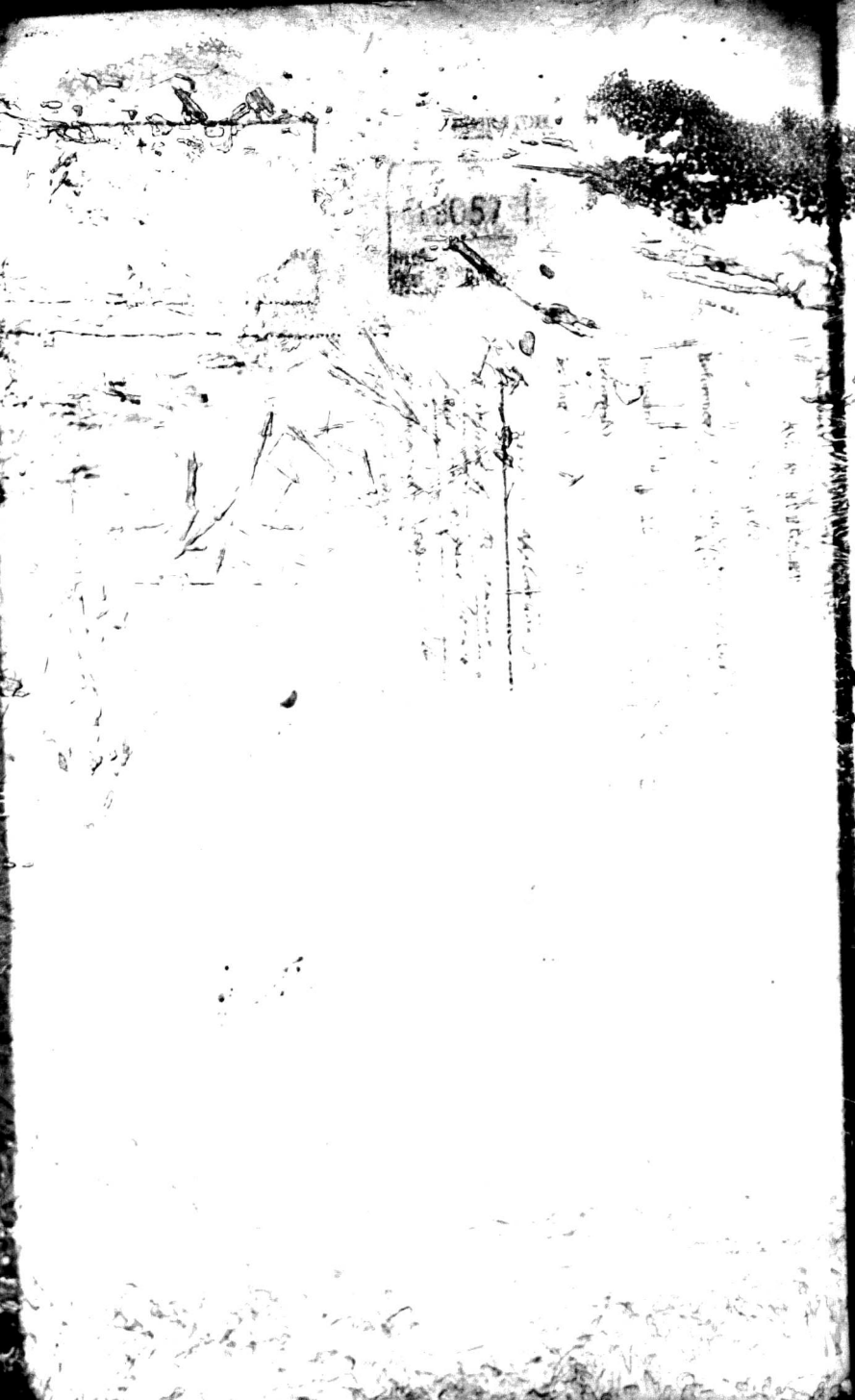
