EAST AFRICA PROTECTORATE.

My Lord,

Captain Salkeld whose resignation I reported in my despatch No. 206 of April 30th, has submitted a request that his twelve military service may count towards pension under East Africa Protectorate rules.

2. The reasons on which he bases his request are as follows:-

The Administration of the Province of Jubaland was taken over by the Military Department in 1901 since which time Captain Salkeld has been doing civil work there. In consequence of this it was considered advisable, when the post of the Officer Commanding, Jubaland, became vacant, to promote Captain Kirkpatrick rather than Captain Salkeld. This course was not intended in any

way to prejudice the latter's chance of subsequent promotion, as it was through no wish of his own that he had been selected to do civil work - he had, in fact on several occasions asked to be allowed to return to his military duties, a request which it was found impossible to grant, as, with his exceptional knowledge of the Province and Somalia, he was considered by far the most suitable officer for the post.

3. At a later date Captain Salkeld applied to be reappointed to a further term of five years, in order to continue his civil work in Jubaland. This request was refused by the Army Council and Captain Salkeld has accordingly resigned his commission in order to take up a civil appointment.

4. I understand that he is not entitled to any Army pension unless he has served for twenty years, and he thus forfeits twelve years' service.

5. The Treasurer is of the opinion, in which I concur, that Captain Salkeld has put forward a very strong case and it would, I submit, be extremely hard on him, after the excellent work he has done in Jubaland, to lose his pension rights in this manner. I would therefore request Your
