I was born - Melbourne (Victoria Australia) & educated at the Melbourne Church of England Grammar School and at Kinty College Melbourne University.

My previous experiences, in addition to those for which I enclose Certificates, have been on sheep & cattle stations in New South Wales & Queensland, with the Repatriation Dept. & the Boer War in the SW. Transvaal after the war. I resigned my post in the latter to come to this country thinking I had been invited to start myself farming, and for 17 months worked on my farm at the Murrumbidgee River, but owing to lack of funds had to break up & quit most & joined the R.A.V. Police - May 1908. When leaving my last employment to come up here I asked for a letter from the Sup^{dt}, not thinking I should require such things again. The Sup^{dt} is still - S.A. & held his Power of Attorney to take up law for him & did so: Lewis & partner with in Holland, which I think - sufficient guarantee that I have performed my duties satisfactorily there.
