The Police force is badly in want of reorganization & I think that we should take great care to appoint only men with experience of police work & good social & political character.

Mr. Tyner is experienced in police work & has a good name & character & would be a good man to be appointed. If the police force were to be reorganized it would be better to recommend him. I am doubtful about Capt. D and Capt. H. D. R. R. G. I think that only one man may do the job to be filled properly. The rate of £400 per annum is too high. It was in 17677 £200 per annum. I think £250 would be sufficient.

I was born - Melbourne (Victoria Australia) educated at the Melbourne Church of England Grammar School and at Trinity College Melbourne University.

My previous experience, in addition to those for which I enclose certificates, had been on sheep & cattle stations in New South Wales & Queensland with the Repatriation Dept & the Boer ~~of war~~ in the S.W. Transvaal after the war. I resigned my position on the latter to come to this country thinking that in ~~the~~ capital best start myself farming, and for 17 months worked on my farm at the ~~the~~ Barwon River, but owing to lack of funds had break ~~up~~ my outfit work & joined the S.A.P. Police - May 1908. When leaving my last employment to come up here I asked for nothing from the Sup^{er} ~~but~~, not thinking I shd require such things again. The Sup^{er} is still - S.A. & I held his Power of Attorney to keep him for him & did so. Lived a partner with no children, which I think - sufficient guarantee that I have performed my duties satisfactorily thru
