My Lord,

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of
ad 9
2/94
Your Lordship's despatch No. 188 of the 6th ultimo, giving
cover to correspondence with the British Cotton Growing
Association.

B. In view of the more favourable conditions now
existing in Uganda owing to the higher civilisation of
the Natives, abundance of labour, and the progress that
cotton growing has lately made, I consider that the
Association would be well advised to devote the greater
part of their attention, at this particular time, to that
Protectorate. I should be glad to confer with the
Agents of the Association with regard to cotton growing
in East Africa, but I am not at present inclined to

government that they take over the work of increasing cotton cultivation in this Protectorate just at present. The natives are in a backward state and I am of opinion that better results would, for some short time to come, be likely to accrue from our own endeavours to stimulate the natives to take up the industry than from any outside work. I may qualify this opinion later but such is my view at present. In the meanwhile every assistance will be given to the Agents of the Association both in the purchase of cotton and towards any experiment they may wish to make on their own accord. Our Agricultural Department has every confidence in the Coast districts of the Protectorate as a good field for cotton growing, but unfortunately reliable labour is scarce. Personally I am inclined to think the most promising field will be found in Kavirondo, which climatically approaches to the conditions of Busoga which I have always looked upon as one of the best parts of the Uganda Protectorate for the development of this industry. Kavirondo, moreover, is in most parts thickly populated, the natives freely come forward for work, and generally this part of the Protectorate shows

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signs of early development. In considering the question
of the reorganization of the Agricultural Department, I
will probably recommend a cotton expert working on the
coast as at present and another in Kavironia. I may add
that I am expecting a large consignment of the best
Abbasi cotton seed from Egypt which I hope will arrive
in time for this season's planting and that I propose to
follow the system which has been found to answer so well
in the sister Protectorate and issue seed free to all the
districts where it can be carefully sown. The results
for the first year may be small, but the great thing is
to get the seed into the soil and encourage the natives
to plant.
