I have the honour to transmit herewith a copy

2. His experience of Government service is limited
to this Protectorate where he has served for over two
and a half years including six months as an Assistant
Collector and two years in the Secretariat.
3. During the period of his service in the Secretariat
he has been drawing the pay of an Assistant Collector,
i.e. two hundred and fifty pounds per annum, receiving
no extra remuneration.

4. Mr. Kenyon-Slayney, who has during these two years

performed the duties of the post for which he is a
candidate with every satisfaction to his superiors, has
already been highly recommended (vide Mr. Jackson's despatch
No. 622 of November 6th last), and I will therefore only
add that I consider his previous experience of the duties
of the post in question to constitute a strong claim in
his favour. His educational attainments would appear
essentially to qualify him for a Secretaryship including
as they do a knowledge of foreign languages, precis writing
and so forth. He has also passed the Swahili examination.

In the event of Mr. being selected for the appointment
of 3rd Assistant Secretary, I would remind Your Lordship
that there will be a vacancy among the Assistant Collectors
and in this connection I have the honour to submit once more
the name of Mr. F. C. Hamilton, whom I recommended in my despatch
No. 224 of May 6th for an appointment in the Administration.

Sir,

In compliance with your request to be furnished with details as to my age and education, which I understand are required in view of my application for the newly created Post of 3rd Assistant Secretary to the Administration of this Protectorate, I have the honour to inform you that I was born on July 26th 1879 and am therefore twenty-six years and nine months old.

I was educated at Haileybury College from January 1893 to August 1897, obtaining there both Junior and Senior Classical Scholarships. From that time until the summer of 1903 I was occupied in studying for and in attempting to pass the examination for the post of clerk in the Foreign Office, spending in the process about three years in France and Germany (Paris, Berlin, Freiburg) with a view to acquiring a knowledge of French and German, and about a year with Mr. W. B. Scopely, of 19 Carnick Street, London, the well known Diplomatic and Civil Service coach. Though unsuccessful in the examination (competitive) for the Foreign Office, yet on one or other of the occasions on which I presented myself I passed the standard in French, German, Latin, Italian, Geography, Precise writing, English Composition, Arithmetic &c.

3. In October 1903 I was appointed an Assistant Collector

in

Secretary

to the Administration

In the service of the "United Nations" and in March 1964 was attached to the Secretariat, in which I am at present serving.

I understand that, although the normal salary of the appointment is at the rate of two hundred and fifty pounds rising by annual increments of twenty pounds to three hundred and fifty pounds, should I be selected for it, my remuneration will be at the rate of three hundred pounds rising by twenty pounds to three hundred and fifty pounds, in recognition of the fact that I have for over two years performed the duties of the post for which I am applying. I would however respectfully ask for an assurance on this point, as I find that the expense connected with life at Headquarters is out of all proportion to the amount of my present salary, £250 a year; in fact, had I no means possessed of private means, I should long ago have been compelled to apply for a transfer to some less expensive post.

Sir,

I am directed by the Secretary of State for the Colonies to inform you that, subject to your being passed as physically fit for service, he proposes to select you for probationary appointment as

Assistant Collector

in the name of

the East African Protectorate with salary at the rate of

£250 per annum, and free quarters, or an allowance in lieu thereof.

2. A memorandum showing the general conditions attached to appointments in the Protectorate is enclosed herewith, but you are to understand that you will be subject to any regulations which may hereafter be introduced by or with the sanction of the Secretary of State.

on the day named for the purpose of being medically examined. The letter is to be attached and

left with him; and you will be required to pay him a fee of one guinea.
