The minutes on the left of Ord. no. 11 of 1904 (H.O. paper 77/1904) do not give any reason for the charge for a licence available for 12 mos. to a licence expiring on a certain date (31st March) whenever issued.

Sir,

I have had the honour to receive your despatch No. 319
of July 21st on the subject of the fees paid for game licences
by the Anglo-German Boundary Commission, and I note with
some surprise that Lieutenant Colonel Smith wrote to the
Marquess of Lansdowne on this subject, after first applying
to me through Mr. Ainsworth for a refund, and being refused.

2. The ordinance to which Lieutenant Colonel Smith refers
was promulgated in the Official Gazette of August 15th 1904,
and all sportsmen, settlers and officers in the Protectorate
who held game licences suffered by their licences expiring on
March 31st instead of at the termination of one year after
the date of issue. It would be obviously unfair to make an
exception in the case of the officers on the Boundary Commission
especially

possibly as the fees were paid from Commission funds.

The officers in question have also been given various
privileges enjoyed by nobody else in the Protectorate,
such as shooting in the game reserve and they have shot
over the best districts in East Africa.
