7494/05. The design for the obverse  
is less happy than for the reverse.

It is a question whether East Africa  
ought to appear on the half-cent. If,  
however, that coin is not wanted in  
the E.A.P. it is not likely to go there,  
so the inscription may stand.

If these designs are approved  
by the S. G. S. we can write to the  
Treasury and ask them to include  
the new designs amongst in the  
annual O. & C. - so far as this  
can be done before we get the  
info asked for in the last para <sup>below</sup>

2. Lord Elgin is  
informed that it  
would not be  
possible to coin  
the new half cent  
piece in any  
metal other than  
aluminum without  
incurring a loss, on  
the manufacture. It  
has therefore seemed  
to him to be advisable,  
that all the subsidiary  
for the sake of  
uniformity, that all  
the subsidiary coins  
to the ten cent  
piece should be  
struck in white  
metal, and, in order to  
avoid all possibility of

the four coins concerned, the  
one cent piece and the five cent  
piece (which however will not  
be issued for the present) will  
be of nickel-bronze, and the  
two cent and half cent  
pieces of aluminum.

in connection with the  
silver coins, that they  
should be perforated.

3. These changes will 205  
involve a complete  
revision of the schedule  
to the Order in Council  
of the 10<sup>th</sup> of February, 1905,  
in which the weight, &c., of  
the coins then proposed,  
and Lord Elgin will be  
glad if the <sup>existing</sup> Order in Council  
referred to in the letter  
from this Dept. of the  
31<sup>st</sup> of January can be  
redrafted or to be  
drafted accordingly.  
Should a further  
communication will be  
sent to you as soon as  
the weights and standard  
allowances of the new  
coins have been  
ascertained.
