The designs as appeared on the obverse designs are originally approved for the bronze coins on 9494/05. The design for the obverse is less happy than for the reverse.

It is a question whether East Africa ought to appear on the half-cent. However, that coin is not wanted in the East. It is not likely to go there, so the inscription may stand.

If these designs are approved by the S. G. S. we can write to the Treasury and ask them to include the new designs in the amending O. & C. - so far as this can be done before we get the ^{letter} asked for in the last paragraph.

to him to be advisable
that all the subsidiary

struck in white
metal and, in order to
