I beg to thank you for your letter of the 17th instant and to inform you that I do accept your offer to reappoint me as a temporary medical officer in the service of the East African and Uganda Protectorates and that I will present myself for medical examination as you desire. At the same time I would very respectfully point out that I have already served the Uganda Protectorate as a temporary medical officer for two and a half years and that in the matter of medical examination, seniority and pay in the service of the Uganda Protectorate I am being now placed on the same footing as one who is about to enter the service of the East African and Uganda Protectorates for the first time. With regard to the latter part of paragraph 5 in your letter I shall be prepared to leave for East Africa on the date you mention. I have the honor to be
