With reference to your confidential despatch of April

27th and to other correspondence on the subject of the

Abysinian incursion into the East African Protectorate, I

have the honour to report that I instructed the Officer

Commanding Troops, Jubaland, to despatch messengers to

Majeire and to the Lorian Swamp to endeavour to ascertain

more certain information regarding the movements of the

parties charged with levying taxes from the natives, etc.

2. I have now the honour to state that the messengers

have returned, and I enclose herewith a copy of their

report, etc. I have received, from Majeire, You will

observe that the Abyssinians have now left the country,

but it would appear from the information obtained that

they are possibly intriguing with the Borans and

endeavouring to persuade the latter to declare that their  
territory extends further to the South than it does in reality.  
If this is so, it is probably done with a view to claiming  
some territory as subject to themselves when the boundary is  
determined, when you otherwise fall within the limits of  
 Abyssinia.

Sir,

I have the honour to report that the following men sent by Major Kirkpatrick to enquire into the movements of parties of Abyssinians in the British territory have now returned.

2. The names of the men are:- NASIB GAAL ( AULIHAN), BURRA HASSAN ( MUGABUL) HASSAN AHMED ( MAHOMED ZUBIER) MAHOMED HASSAN (AULIHAN).

They report as follows:-

The marched from Kismayu to WAJIR, WAJIR to LORIAN, from LORIAN back to WAJIR and from there back to Kismayu via Afmado.

The Abyssinians have now completely left the country, none, except a few stragglers, being South of ARERO.

4. The Boran at WAJIR report that a party of 32 Abyssinians under one DEMAR or DEEMAR came some months ago, and were subsequently reinforced by 10 men under a man called YARDYSO. The whole party left, and went to LORIAN where they shot three elephants. From there DEMAR'S party moved towards the KOREH and RENDILI country, whilst YARDYSO returned to WAJIR. DEMAR marched towards the KOREH country, coming across 5 KOREH 2 of whom he seized, one escaped during the night, and the other is said to have been killed. DEMAR then moved into the RENDILE country, the RENDILE refused to give him tribute beyond 4 goats, alleging that they were British subjects. After this the

party passed on back to their own country.

5. YARDEYSO while at WAGALLA, one of the groups of wells included in the WAJIR district, some 10 miles N.W. of the same WAJIR in map, and on the RENDILE road, is said to have killed one Boran called DABASABERI. The name of the Abyssinian, who did this, is said to be GURUBU. The Abyssinians collected a considerable amount of stock, water vessels, etc.

6. About three months ago about 600 Abyssinians, all armed with rifles, under one WEYLDI, and accompanied by GDU the head chief of BORAN, visited MUDU ARKLE some distance west of LUGH, and KIL WAK. Our men were told that GDU was brought to point out the limits of his country and that he claimed MUDU, KIL WAK, WAJIR, and LORIAN.

The Abyssinians did not visit the two latter places as they knew them. They are said to have taken sand from KIL WAK to send to MERNLIK. Our men stated that the Abyssinians took much stock but not by force, ordering it to be paid as tribute. Our men also state that no one could be found to guide them as they (the Boran) were afraid of the Abyssinians.

7. From other reports I understand the Abyssinians have threatened the MURREHAN who replied by sending back a bow and a poison arrow.

Should paragraph 6 be true it would seem that something more than mere raiding was being aimed at.

That GDU has any right to claim any of the four places mentioned as his country seems unlikely; Mudu seems to be near LUGH. KIL WAK until lately has been constantly occupied by the GURREH; WAJIR is in the debatable ground between the SOMALIS and BORAN and though often occupied by them is as often not. The LORIAN, of course is completely outside BORAN.
