With reference to my telegram of the 14th inst. the result of the late meeting is that the sentences passed in connexion with the looting incident in no way render the position of the natives insecure. The natives are perfectly quiet and unaffected by the excitement which only exists among the clique of agitators in the town. The action taken by the Government and the law as a ring leader was perfectly just.
