With reference to your despatch No. 296 of July

7th, I have the honour to transmit to you herewith a copy  
of a despatch which I have received from the Chief of

Customs and Shipping reporting the resignation of Mr. May

the Chief Officer of the Protectorate Steam Ship "Juba",

and recommending the engagement of Mr. F. M. Jenkins, who is

at present in the employ of the British India Line, and

who formerly acted satisfactorily when Mr. May was on leave.

You will observe that Mr. Marsden proposes that the new

Rs. 200 Chief Officer should be appointed on a salary of two hundred

Rs. 70 rupees per mensem plus seventy rupees messing allowance,

Rs. 25 with a yearly rise of twenty five rupees to three hundred

Rs. 500 rupees per mensem, the salary now drawn by Mr. May.

Sir,

I have the honour to inform you that Mr. May the Chief Officer of the S.S. "Juba" has received an offer from the Zanzibar Government to take up the position of Assistant Port Officer in Zanzibar and now tenders his resignation in order that he may accept the same. He has been nine years and a half in the Protectorate service, his duties have always been performed in a very satisfactory manner and as this new position will mean promotion for him I beg that his resignation be accepted.

In his place as Chief Officer of the "Juba" I beg to submit the name of Mr. F.M. Jenkins at present in the employ of the B.I. line of steamers who has formerly acted for six months on the S.S. "Juba" when Mr. May was on leave and whose duties were always performed to the complete satisfaction of the Commander of the ship, Captain Wilson.

Mr. Jenkins on the termination of his period of service on the "Juba" made an application for permanent employment in the Protectorate service whenever a suitable vacancy should occur and this application at the time was supported by Captain Wilson and myself. In the event of His Majesty's Colonial Secretary giving sanction for the engagement of Mr. Jenkins I would suggest that his salary commence at Rs. 200 plus messing allowance of Rs. 70 and rise by annual increments of Rs. 25 to Rs. 300 per annum, the salary which Mr. May is now drawing.
