The number to be raised now is 20, viz, 12 by hon, 1 Sgt, 1 Capt, 17 Troops Constables; but 14 by hon, 2 by hon, 1 Capt, 23 PCs have already been recruited locally leaving only 16 PCs to be selected here.

After consulting Mr Baring, I must report the following conditions proposed:

1. Each of the 3 years (agreement under the usual agreement) - free for those inspected, subject to all usual alterations. The men to be recruited only from the metropolitan Glasgow & Manchester Police or that of any large town or in the case of the Hong Kong Police. Mr Baring will be arranged this with the Capt. on Tuesday.

2. Pay - £108 pa + 2/6 ration allowance. Free quarters furnished, or an allowance in lieu thereof.

(They will certainly have to live under canvas for some time to begin with).

Free outfit, (and what hit locally). Free rail passages & rail expenses here. Men to be unmarried and not less than 24 years of age. The maximum age might be left to the discretion of the recruiting officer. Medical exam - by this hospital at Port's expense before candidates could be recruited.

3. Successful recruits to be recruited from the list of recruits.

4. Home - small & pleasant if not an engaging. If recruited, leave at Port's notice. If invited, a full passage home.

5. The Lt cannot recall select the men & I think Capt Graham will be the best man to do so. He will be here in the evening. They

Gentlemen,

I am directed by the Earl of Elgin to request that you will take steps to call for volunteers from the Metropolitan Police, or from the Police Forces of Manchester, Glasgow, and other principal towns in Great Britain, to fill the vacancies for Police Constables in the European Police at present in the East Africa Protectorate.

2. The conditions of service are given on the statement enclosed herewith, and it is desirable that selected candidates should

*working officers should make it clear to the Post Office that the Post Office is quite suitable for European service.*



should be recorded from the force to which they belong in order that they may, if necessary, be reabsorbed at the termination of the period of the agreement under which it is proposed to obtain their services.

Applications, accompanied by a statement of the usual particulars with regard to the candidate's <sup>official rank, etc.</sup> ~~name~~ age and a certificate that he is fit for service in the East Africa Protectorate, should be forwarded through <sup>his</sup> ~~the~~ official superiors to this Department for consideration.

All the course arrangements will be made for their attendance at this office when they will be finally selected by an officer detailed for the purpose. Railway expenses will be paid by Government.

I am to request that you will take action in the matter without delay as the services

European Police.

Qualifications and Services.

3. Candidates should be over 24 years of age, unmarried, and certified by a Police Surgeon as fit for service in the East Africa Protectorate, otherwise their application can not be entertained.

The Surgeon's fee will be paid by the Department *in the case of those candidates whose physical fitness renders them eligible for special selection.*

The period of service shall be for three years from the date of arrival in the Protectorate and selected candidates will be required *to sign an agreement* (similar to those in force for Police Inspectors and the East Africa Protectorate subjects to the same conditions and terms.)

On the temporary termination of his employment a Constable may be granted 3 months leave of absence with half salary if he does not renew his agreement.

If re-engaging for further service he may be granted leave according to the rules in force at the time for European troops in the Protectorate.

4. 3rd class Railway fare from place of residence to the port of embarkation and a 2nd class ocean passage to the Protectorate will be given to

In the event of their service being terminated for any other causes than those indicated, Constables will be liable to such provisions of the Inspectors' Agreements mentioned in section 2 as may be applicable to the circumstances of the case.

5. Constables will receive pay at the fixed rate of £100 per annum, together with a ration allowance of £24 per annum, and free quarters or an allowance in lieu thereof.

6. Free outfit on the usual scale will be provided here, and full uniform on arrival in the Protectorate.
