I thought that Mr. Jackson  
was a "Sub. Comm. Person", and

for the time being should be a  
member of the Councils and should  
succeed (as senior member of the P.  
Council) to the administration of

the Government.  
The circumstances explained  
by Mr. Luller, I agree that  
Mr. Jackson should have some  
higher title than that of  
your Council, and the right  
title seems to be "Major".  
It is more correct "Deputy",  
but he is he liable to  
be confused with the "Deputy"  
to Governor when the Govt.  
may appoint under clause  
XVI of the Ord. C.  
The latter, <sup>with</sup> ~~with~~ <sup>with</sup> ~~with~~  
he personal to Mr. Jackson,  
who has thoroughly earned  
such a distinction, and should  
not necessarily be contented  
by his superior.  
The proposal that  
Mr. Jackson should be appointed  
"Deputy" is approved, but the

shall hold the office.



It seems to be somewhat inconsistent  
to create in 2. office an office which  
only a few months before was abolished  
in our important colony like Ceylon after  
having been held by three successive  
Colonial Secretaries.

If on 3. 1878 for a moment  
it is intended to create an office in 2. office  
for the purpose of raising the duties on  
imported goods, it is very likely that the
