I have the honour to reply to your letter of the 10th inst. - Confidential - Re the proposed lease for the site of a building for the purpose of establishing a school within the limits of the District of Columbia at a cost of \$100,000.00.

It is my duty to inform you that I have the honor to advise the Board of Commissioners that if arrangements could be made agreeably with the Board of Commissioners, the project would be abandoned.

It is extremely easy for an immigrant to evade Emigration Officers at a port where, as is the case with the majority of the ports of the Protectorate, a duty is lying within a few yards of the shore, and it is still more easy for an immigrant to re-embark at the inland frontiers of the Protectorate, unless, however, the Emigration Officer will have to exercise his powers of the Navigation Ordinance which enable him to arrest and return to his ship or to return over the inland frontiers the immigrants who have entered the Protectorate without his sanction.
