Sir,

The Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury have had before them your letter of the 18th Instant as to the propriety of allowing an officer of an African Protectorate to take English full pay leave immediately before giving effect to a previously declared intention to resign.

Their Lordships desire me to say that this is a question which, in their opinion, may be left to the decision of the Secretary of State according to the circumstances of each case.

If an officer has made up his mind to retire, he shows consideration for the public convenience by giving timely notice of his intention, and merits corresponding consideration from his Chiefs.

Speaking generally, My Lords see no objection to allowing an officer of good conduct to take the full pay leave earned by his service before he retires.
