My Lord,

I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of a letter from H.E. the Governor dated June 26th 1907 stating that Your Lordship does not consider me a suitable candidate for Colonial employment in view of a remark I took in the recent Nanking Incident at Nanking.

In view of your decision I beg to draw Your Lordship's attention to the fact that my employment under the Colonial Office has been given to W. Wilson who on June 6th 1900 was sentenced by Dr. Blundell, Superintendent of Kenya Province to 6 months imprisonment and fine of Rs. 200/- for causing grievous hurt to a native with a dangerous weapon - a rifle contrary to Sec. 326 I.P. Code.

I would like to ask Your Lordship whether the sentence to which Wilson was condemned is not a bar to Colonial employment, when the much less serious sentence upon me is a
