Railway Order-in-Council.

GENERAL MANAGER'S STATEMENT ON RAILWAY POSITION.

STOCK ROUTE TO WAJIR.

The Legislative Council continued its session at 10 o'clock on Monday morning. The minutes of Friday's meeting were read and confirmed. The following papers were laid on the Table:

Annual Report, Prisons Department, by the Acting Colonial Secretary; Abridged Annual Report of the Forest Department, by Mr. Raitisoomba; Abridged Report, Posts and Telegraph Department, by Mr. Fitzgerald; Annual Report of the General Manager, Uganda Railway, by the General Manager; Department, by the Commissioner of Customs; Annual Report, Public Works Department, by the Director of Public Works.

Questions.

WAJIR-LAMU ROAD.
Mr. Robertson Enslin asked—
In view of the great importance of opening communications between the Northern Frontier and the Coast, whether provision may be made in the Estimates for the making of a road between Wajir and Lamu.

The Acting Colonial Secretary replied—No specific provision is being made by Government in the Estimates for 1926 for a road between Wajir and Lamu. Government is however making enquiries of the officers in charge of the area concerned as to the possibilities for a stock route from Wajir to the Coast in British territory.

Arising out of that answer Mr. MacLellan Wilson asked if it would be possible to take produce from Wajir along the stock route by motor transport.

The Acting Colonial Secretary replied in the negative but stated that elaborate produce from Wajir had been carried by camel transport and that the stock route would naturally be capable of taking small traffic.

PORT CONTROL & WORKING.

Mr. Conroy (for Lord Delamater) asked—

Whether the attention of the Government has been drawn to the report of the debate in the House of Lords on the 26th July, 1925, on the subject of the Uganda Lake traffic.

Whether the statements made regarding the profits of the Uganda Railway, and other details made at the same time, are correct; if not, what the actual results of working have been since 1921 and how much profit as has been made are used.

Whether the line and lake services are in a fit condition to carry the increasing traffic, and if not, why not. What action has been taken and what expenditures have been incurred from various sources to extend and improve the transport facilities, equipment, etc. Whether there is any delay in placing tenders for material and labour, and whether there is

the General Manager in placing tenders for the future control and operation of the line.

How many senior European railway officials are stationed in Uganda, and what changes in composition are proposed. Have the powers of the General Manager been extended in staff matters, and if so, to what extent. Has the working expenditure of the Railway been increased sufficiently to cope with increased work.

What were the causes of the congestion referred to, has there been damage to traffic, and how is it proposed to improve matters in this respect.

What is the position in regard to the future control and development of the Port and shipping work of the landing and shipping work.

FINANCE SINCE 1921.

The General Manager replied—
1. The answer is in the affirmative.

Some of the statements made were based on inaccurate or incomplete information and the figures stated are incorrect. The figures quoted as profits were actually the balances left after deducting from gross earnings ordinary working expenditure and depreciation for contribution for depreciation and for interest on capital.

The actual results of working since 1921 have been as follows—
In 1921 the year's working resulted in a net loss of £9,870, with no allowance for depreciation. In 1922 there was a nominal profit of £26,705, without any allowance for depreciation. The working for 1922 would have shown a loss if railway construction material had not been carried at high rates, thus inflicting revenue of the expense of capital.

In 1923 there was a credit balance of £302,910, which after contributing £145,401 to the Uganda Fund, left £157,509 as profit. This amount was paid into the betterment Fund.

In 1924 there was a profit of £486,000 paid into the betterment Fund, after allowing £108,570 for depreciation.

The whole of the amounts paid into the betterment and betterment funds are available for use in renewing, improving, and extending railway facilities, and to a large extent have been so being so used.

LAKE SERVICES.

The answer to the first part of the question is that a greatly increased traffic is being carried, but not without great difficulty at times. There has been an improvement on the line in recent months but the Lake piers are still so full as to cause anxiety. Working generally should be improved, but difficulties will be experienced from time to time until the large renewal, betterment and extension programme has been completed.

services not being in better condition is that prior to the 1st April 1921, most inadequate provision was made for renewals and betterments, and the line, equipment, etc., depreciated considerably.

In 1921 there was a loss in working, while in 1922 the nominal profit was small. In 1923 earnings increased simultaneously with substantial reduction in expenditure, and it then became possible to set aside large sums for renewals and improvements. In 1924, therefore, was the first year in which a large improvement programme could be embarked upon. In 1924 the £28,500,000 loss was sanctioned. From this loss the extension of the line to Uganda was authorized and further sums allocated for improvements.

IMPROVEMENTS.
In response to the second portion of the question, I am laying on the table a statement showing the actual and estimated expenditure since 1921, and the betterment and Renewals Funds to the end of 1925.

The works included in this statement comprise—

- (a) Major works in hand and rolling stock on order on 1st January, 1925.
- (b) Works and rolling stock authorized from January, 1925, to date;
- (c) Anticipated expenditure in 1925; and
- (d) Estimated expenditure for 1926 and thereafter on works already authorized or now authorized.

The total expenditure incurred and proposed, it will be observed, from this amount to over ten millions sterling, under the following heads—

FULFILLING ORDERS.

Everything possible is done to avoid delays in placing orders for materials, etc., and it is apparent that the Crown Agents for the Colonies, through whom all orders are placed, realize the importance of carrying out the fulfilment of orders. In this respect the position has greatly improved this year.

In regard to the powers of the General Manager in this order, the position is that in the early part of 1923, when special arrangements had to be made in consequence of the reduction of the powers of the General Manager to the Government and from the Government to the Colonial Office regarding expenditure, but for some time past the General Manager, in the matter of authorizing works, purchase of rolling stock, etc., has acted on his own initiative, referring to the Government only when re-allocation of loan money has become necessary, or when special approval of the use of Renewals and betterment funds allow reallocation by the General Manager within the limits shown in the Estimates. Within the limits of Funds available, the General Manager has not been restricted in placing orders, either by the Government or Kenya or by the Colonial Office.

STAFF FOR UGANDA.

(a) There are 500 staff

either European or marine officials in Uganda.

(b) It is proposed to re-organize the work by arranging for the Transportation Department to take over the control of the pier work on the lakes hitherto exercised by the Marine Department. An Assistant Superintendent will be stationed at Kisumu to control the pier work there and all piers on Lake Victoria except those at Port Bell and Jinja. A Divisional Superintendent will be stationed in Uganda to co-ordinate all the services in Uganda and control everything except the actual running of the ships on the lakes and the civil and mechanical engineering work. The Divisional Superintendent will control all the railway work in Uganda, the pier work at Port Bell and Jinja on Lake Victoria, all the pier work on the other two lakes, as well as the motor services between Masindi Port and Butaba.

G.M.'S AUTHORITY.

(c) About three weeks ago authority was received from the Secretary of State to give the General Manager extended powers in regard to junior staff, their rates of pay increases, etc. The new railway control proposals, which were recommended by the General Manager, approved and introduced as soon as practicable. The new system of working will allow of much wider business powers to the management. Such powers are desirable.

INCREASED COSTS.

(4) The working expenditure this year has increased considerably. For the first six months of the year the expenditure of the Transportation Department was £161,691 for the same period in 1924—an increase of 34.13 per cent; while the working expenditure for the Lake Marine Department was £14,855 for 1925, about the same period of 1924—an increase of 60.9 per cent.

In the Transportation Department the bulk of the increase was due to the cost of fuel, which was £14,855 for 1925, about the same period of 1924—an increase of 60.9 per cent.

In the Lake Marine Department the increase was due to a large increase in staff and substantial increases in the cost of labour. The work of handling on the Lake piers—which is work done entirely to the break in the railway chain—cost £19,241 for the first six months of 1925 as against £7,174 for the first six months of 1924, or an increase of 168.2 per cent.

No effort has been made to reduce the expenditure, and everything necessary and possible to cope with the increased traffic has been authorized, provided of whether or not provision existed in the Estimates.

COMMISSION.

the traffic could be moved there was a temporary stoppage of traffic to Port Bell, owing to a cause beyond the control of the railway. Thereafter traffic was sent into Port Bell and Kampala too rapidly, and congestion, damage, and pilferage resulted, since this trouble was overcome the traffic as a whole has moved much faster than in any previous year. There has never been any breakdown.

LAKE TRAFFIC.

The traffic carried on Lake Victoria during the first six months of the year amounted to 33,500 tons as against 55,433 tons during the same period in 1924, 37,900 tons during the first six months of 1923, and 24,424 tons during the first six months of 1922. In other words, in three years the traffic on Lake Victoria has increased by about 300 per cent. In the same period the carrying capacity on the Lake has been increased by about 30 per cent and even allowing for the fact that in 1922 some boats were idle, it is suggested that the increased tonnage which has been found possible to carry by the steamers and lighters on the lake is astonishing. An additional tug and a number of additional lighters will be on the lake by the end of the year, but as all steamers, tugs, and lighters have to be built in England, sent out and up to the lake in parts, and, therefore, there are limits to what is physically possible to do to increase the carrying capacity on the lake in the time available until the line will be through to Uganda.

COTTON REED.

It is proposed next season to prohibit the export of cotton seed until the end of May, so as to allow the cotton from Uganda to be cleared first. Strong representations have also been made that a system of rebates should be introduced in order to regulate better the export traffic in Uganda. The railway, in any case, proposes to regulate its own traffic, and to secure more expeditious working and so as to avoid pier working and congestion, with consequent delays and serious damage to the cargo. While damage does occur on the railway, much damage occurs also before the railway reaches the cotton, as the result of dumping outside railway premises. The railway proposes to do its best to move the traffic as quickly as possible. It cannot see it as an obligation to allow holders to be used for financial reasons, but a measure which delays and causes damage to traffic.

PORT CONTROL.

This matter is under the consideration of the Secretary of State for the Colonies and a decision has not yet been given. It is clear that some steps must be taken to give the control of the Port to the actual performance of landline and shipping work. The railway has been asked to consider the Railway Act, which should cover the Port. It is understood that this is under consideration.

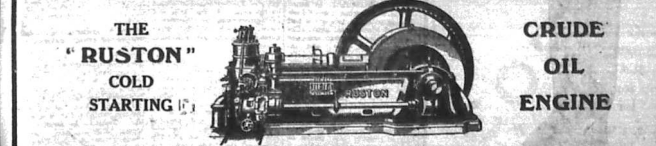

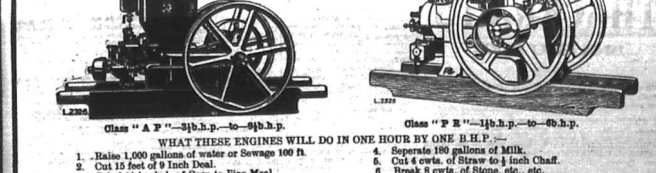
