Music in Kenya.

Is good music appreciated in Kenya? The lack of it, the want of good literature, good plays and all the paraphernalia, whereby culture finds expression is from time to time deplored in this country and yet it may well be asked whether full advantage is taken of such opportunities as come the way of the residents in the Colony—and this applies more particularly to the women—in making his critical and casual taste for intellectual and cultural balance. Less week there were to Nairobi two states of the highest musical rank and yet, although their concert work was well advertised and the high reputation they had gained in other parts of the world was known, they played before somewhat pitifully small houses and must have gone away surprised and pained at the lack of musical virtuosity in the Capital. On the other hand lighter entertainments—admissible in their way and well deserving of support—found a ready welcome. We do not intend to flatter on the positive merits of good music, for instance, a good film concert, but it is nevertheless rather markedly fact that a concert of the high standard of those which delighted our lives of music on Thursday and Saturday of last week failed to attract anything like the number that would have been accorded a picture featuring Mr. Charles Chaplin or Mr. Tom Mix. It is perhaps that there is too great a tendency on the part of those who lay no claim to a musical education to be nervous of the terms "high-class" or "high-brow." These are expressions which are very lowly, and nowadays almost always these appear deprecatingly. Actually it does not require any intense education to appreciate really good music, enjoyment or boredom to the result according to whether the hearer is sensitive or indifferent to beauty in art. Although of course a greater measure of enjoyment is the reward of judicious appreciation and understanding. Climate or environment can hardly be taken as sufficient excuse for a form of mental laziness or intellectual paralysis which refuses to recognize any entertainment within its life, higher forms of art. The real test is to whether any considerable body of people in the Colony are interested in good music and the efforts being made to foster appreciation of it in Kenya will come next month with the holding of the first Kenya Music Festival. There, again will be presented an opportunity of hearing two artists of repute as well as gauging the musical abilities of those who are quite frankly amateurs, but who very properly aspire to a higher development. Surely, if the productions of Hollywood (created as many of them are) can win such an appeal as to secure them being always a commercial success, civilization may be stimulated for no less excellent and yet instructive forms of artistic attainment. The need of past apparent indifference probably lies to a large extent in circumstances but the tendency is now the best — notable.

EXTENSION OF THE NYERI RAILWAY.

Economic Survey to be Carried Out.

It has been agreed by Government that a new administrative centre should be established at Nanyuki or in the neighbourhood. The new civil administration of the N. E. The Nyeri Railway extension is a most important economic survey of the area north of Nanyuki. It is the question of extension of the Nyeri Railway to Nanyuki— a distance of 15 miles. He explained that it had been decided by the Inter-Localities Commission that as the Nanyuki section of the line was proposed by the absence of an economic survey it could not be considered with other branch lines until a survey had been carried out. It was now possible to give a great deal of money by carrying out the survey immediately and commencing the railway extension.

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AN AMENDMENT OFFERED.

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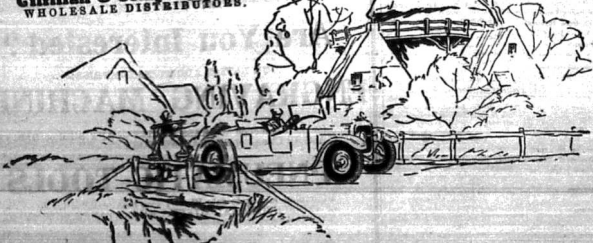
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GOOD YEAR

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The Irish Election.

A very curious situation is created by the result of the General Election in the Irish Free State and politicians the world over will watch with interest the developments which will take place within the next few months. The primary fact that emerges is that the Congress Party has secured a return to power and that it itself would seem to indicate that the majority of the electors in the Free State are on the whole satisfied with the Government's record and that they prefer a known quantity, so to speak; to an experiment in government such as would be provided by the advent of an inexperienced party in power. The Government's majority, however, is so small that the power of the Congress Administration is limited in consequence to be strictly limited. Whilst actually the constitutional party has gained sixteen seats, that gain almost balances by the increased representation secured by the Republicans. Mr. De Valera's followers in the Dail are now only four fewer than the supporters of the Government, although that party from the point of view of the latter, is an improvement in the position because of the time-honoured maxim which says that the casual observer might be persuaded that anything would count for little. Actually these small-party parties in the Dail will be able to exert a very great deal of influence and there is every reason to suppose that they will make full use of the many opportunities which will be afforded them in the near future. Mr. Congreve is presently secured of the support of the twelve members belonging to the Independent Party and of the six representatives of the Farmers Party; whilst the principal opposition will be strengthened by the support which is anticipated they will have from the Labour members and those belonging to the National League and the Workers' League. A noteworthy result of the Election is the disappearance from the political arena of Mr. Johnson, the Labour Party leader who, had it not been for the abnormal behaviour of a certain Mr. John Jinks at a time of a few weeks' back, might have become the head of a Coalition Government. An interesting figure of the reconstituted Dail will be Mr. Larkin, representative of the recently formed Workers' League, of whom so much has been heard in the publications which marked the years immediately preceding the War. The new grouping of parties in the Dail will undoubtedly make the task of Government a difficult one, but at the same time ensure that legislation will be hastily passed and in particular that new economic policies will receive very full consideration before they are adopted or rejected. It is expected that the Congress Government has secured the approval of the people of the Free State if only because it did succeed in establishing constitutional government in a State wracked with pest and suffering a measure of peace and industry.

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ZANZIBAR TRADE IN 1926.

Effect of Drop in Clove Prices on Island's Finances.

REDUCED IMPORTS AND EXPORTS.

In reviewing the trade prospects of Zanzibar for 1927, the Comptroller of Customs forewarned the restriction of business which in fact has occurred during the year.

This was due to the heavy export and import transactions effected during 1926, and the position has been accentuated by the fall in clove prices. During the present year, the clove industry will enjoy it is an output considerably in excess of average dimensions, and the moderate recovery in all branches of trade is confidently expected.

Taken on the whole although the Trade Report for 1926 suggests that last year was a bad one, there is reason to believe that 1927 will show an improvement.

A BIG SHOW TRAFFIC.

In 1926 the figures for clove exports were Rs. 15,392,798 or 285.5 per cent. a reduction of approximately 25,000 tons. Clove imports were only 20,000 tons or a slight decrease over the same period.

It is interesting in this connection to observe that the clove prices in India take the most, in 1926, coming as much as 20,000 per cent. The United States raw India also with 47,000 cwt. There is a large surplus over those two countries; the Netherlands East Indies coming next with 11,000 cwt. The United States and the United Kingdom follow with 7,000 and Holland with 6,000 cwt. Other countries include Egypt, China, Japan and other countries take the remainder in small quantities.

The most noticeable feature in the statistics of the year's exports is the falling off in the shipment of clove to the United Kingdom.

This is due partly to a reduction of the clove crop and partly to the fact that direct shipments are now being made to those countries which formerly bought from London. The shipments to the United States are largely in excess of the average for the past five years, and the reduced shipments to Ceylon are due to the fact that the Bombay market is turning to direct shipments to the East Indies and Malaya States.

Fall of Clove.

The fall in the price of the clove industry was particularly emphasized during the year under review, but it is probable that the past five years of business has resulted, and there is every reason to anticipate that the clove export industry in 1927 will be materially larger than in 1926.

The total exports of clove for the year amounted to 547,000 cwt. or 285.5 per cent. as against 4,277,000 cwt. as first sight it seems strange that clove should be imported into Zanzibar. It seems like taking the clove crop but the explanation is that the imported clove is used for bulked clove for subsequent re-exportation.

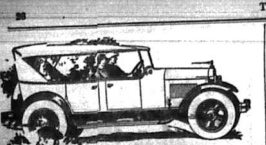

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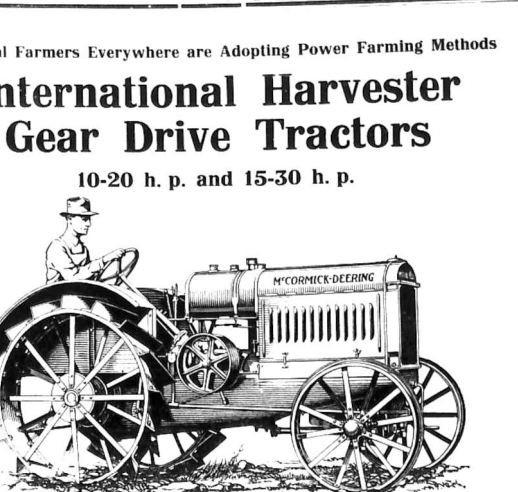

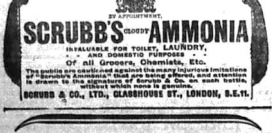

WATER LEGISLATION AND CONTROL.

Government to Appoint a Committee.

["STANDARD" SPECIAL CORRESPONDENT.]
Nairobi, Sept. 17.
Government agreed to appoint a Committee to enquire into the water legislation problems of the Colony during the coming month of the Council session. The motion was moved by the Member for West Kenya, the Hon. E. M. V. Kennedy, in the following terms:

This Government appoint a Committee of this House to make recommendations concerning water legislation and control.

He pointed out that the present water legislation was antiquated and that was the greatest disability. There were negotiations concerning water but there was no water legislation and the law rested upon two ordinances. It was an excellent thing that funds should be provided to supply the water resources of the country and they already saw the results of the lack of proper legislation in the railway expenditure for water supplies and if there had been a properly regulated supply the railway would have been able to use a smaller amount at Harbours than they were doing. They had to hold upon the relative importance of the use of water for irrigation and for power and electric traction of traffic.

Major the Hon. W. B. Robinson (The Coast) seconded.

The Director of Public Works was glad to find himself in agreement with the mover's principle. He said that the water resources of a country were really comparable to the resources in land, forests and minerals but the question of the allocation and control of water supplies was more com-

plex than that of land or forest resources. This having been accepted, by the mover and the necessary amendments moved by the D. F. W., the motion was amended as passed.

PROBLEM OF A SCHOOL SITE.
