GETTING READY FOR BROADCASTING.

Advice on Receiving Set Needs.

HINTS FOR AMATEURS

As it is now only six weeks from the date when Broadcasting is due to start in Kenya Colony, it is not too late to purchase a wireless set in time for the opening ceremony on July 1st.

In the following article Commander Mansfield Robinson deals with types of sets most suitable to local conditions.

The Wireless Set by Kenya Colony is by no means such a complicated affair as it has hitherto become in England owing to the Kenya Service employing valves where there are only a limited number of makes of Wireless Receiver which is suitable for use with this Service.

The Broadcasting wavelength will at the commencement of the Service be approximately 90 metres, and great care should be taken before purchasing a wireless set to see that it is capable of operating at a wave length of 90 and 100 metres. Owing to the number of stations however, which it is necessary to receive on a reasonably good short wave broadcast receiver, the public will be well advised to purchase a receiver set capable of working on all wavelengths between 20 and 120 metres, although this will probably entail the necessity for changing coils when using wavelengths in view of the fact that the Kenya Service is one of very few in the world operating upon short waves. I wish to supply the public with the following information which I hope will be of assistance to all intending listeners.

The most important point to consider when buying a Wireless Receiver is that it is capable of giving good reproduction, that is to say that the sounds issuing from the loudspeakers or loud speaker of the receiving set will resemble as accurately as possible the sounds actually taking place in the broadcasting station.

The next important point is that the receiver should be of sufficient power to give the maximum strength of signal corresponding to the design of the motor, the number of valves used, the voltage of the respective batteries, and the quality of the components with which

this set is made and upon which its price will usually depend. The next point is that it should be so constructed and shall be reasonably fool-proof so that it may be handled with equal ease by all members of the family including children.

These points are undoubtedly the most important and should be given primary consideration by anyone intending to buy a Wireless Receiver. It may be wise to have a wireless set which is not only suitable for use in one's home but the equipment should be such that it is so important as the three points mentioned above.

Tuning the Set.

Now comes the question of how the average number of the public who have nothing about them can judge a broadcast receiver from the number of valves. With regard to the matter of reproduction, it is not only the number of valves but also the arrangement of the valves which is of importance. A receiver must be able to pick up a signal of a high degree of proficiency in the respect.

It is advisable to point out here that should not be satisfied with applying that is not of a moderately high standard, as modern receivers are capable of a high degree of proficiency in the respect.

With regard to the efficiency of the receiver this can be done by actually testing it on one's own radio but this is not a satisfactory proof of the efficiency of the receiver but one has to rely on the reputation of the manufacturer. It is necessary to take into consideration the design of the receiver and in this case we may consider at the same time the question of the set being foolproof and easy to handle as these things also are directly dependent upon the design of the receiver.

Receivers for use with long wave broadcast services are not so employed in England and in most other parts of the world, but in Kenya they are used with short wave services unless very considerable alterations are made in the design so that they may usually perform very inefficiently.

There are certain essential features of any good short wave wireless receiver which I will summarize now for the benefit of all intending purchasers—

(1) It is due to be of an inductive type it will probably not contain any high frequency signal coil as this is not necessary in this case it will consist only of a detector valve fitted with one, two, or perhaps three low frequency amplifying valves. In this case the inductance of the Receiver should contain three coils:

- (a) a loose coupled tuning coil
- (b) a secondary tuning coil
- (c) a reaction coil

The tuning circuits will also contain two condensers connected from plate on the first panel, one of which will control the wave length in use and the other the sensitivity of the receiver.

It is essential that all variable condensers used in Short Wave Broadcast Receivers shall be fitted with some form of high ratio reduction mechanism, and that the tuning receiver is extremely sensitive.

(2) If it is desired to obtain a receiver in which high frequency amplification is employed, it is absolutely essential to use a new type of available coil which is placed on the market and which is known as the screened grid valve, as this is the only type which will function satisfactorily on short wave broadcast services. One or two of these valves may be employed and in this case the tuning circuit will consist of:

- (a) a loose coupled tuning coil
- (b) a secondary tuning coil
- (c) an additional tuning coil

Each of these coils is connected to each high frequency screened grid valve employed.

In this case there should be one condenser for each screened grid valve tuning coil employed as well as for the secondary tuning coil, but no reaction condenser will be necessary as variable reaction should not be fitted in this type of receiver.

(3) Considering now the Low Frequency part of the broadcast receiver the coupling between the valve will consist of what is known either as Transformer coupling or Resonance Capacity coupling, the former gives a larger degree of amplification and the latter giving the higher quality of reproduction. If Transformer coupling is used purchasers should make quite certain that the transformers are made by a well known firm of reputable make. If resonance capacity coupling is used, that wire wound resistance coil is incorporated.

An Important Point.

(4) A very important point to which purchasers should pay particular attention is that the valve incorporated in the receiver are made by a well-known firm of reputable make. It is essential that the valves in the particular positions where they are employed should occupy the valves in the boxes in which they are sold.

(5) It is particularly important that the valves specially designed for loud speaker work should be used in the last stage of broadcast receiver and it large loud speaker work valves are required.

(6) Care should be taken that

the low tension batteries applied with a receiver are of the same voltage as that specified with the valves, and of sufficiently large capacity to supply the requisite current for the receiver during hours recharging.

(7) The terminals of the high tension supply for a Wireless Receiver should be connected with the greatest care and careful consideration. The following are the points to be observed in this connection:—

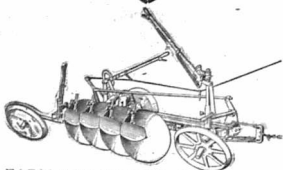

Cutting in Charge.
JUDGMENT IS A MOTORING CASE TO-DAY.

A case in which Mr. A. J. McCarthy was charged with driving a motor car in a reckless and negligent manner occupied the time of the Resident Magistrate's Court for nearly two hours yesterday morning.

The complainant in the case was Mr. C. J. Green. It was stated that on the night of April 9, at about 7.30 p.m. Mr. Green was driving up Valley Road towards the corner of Grosvenor Road. As he approached the entrance to the Hill Hotel a car swung round the corner from the direction of the Bahagalia's Nursing Home, to come down Valley Road. At the same time another car overtook and passed the first car on the corner, and in so doing went on the wrong side of the road. To avoid being hit Mr. Green maintained that he was forced to get off the road on to the grass at the side. The complainant's car was so loose, that of the accused a Renault, and the car which was overtake, a Chrysler driven by Mrs. Chichester. The speed of the Renault as it took the corner was estimated at being approximately 25 miles per hour.

Evidence was given by Mrs. Green, the wife of the complainant, who was in the car with her husband and also by Mr. and Mrs. Chichester who were in the Chrysler car.

Mr. McCarthy in the witness box said he had been driving for 15 years and had considerable experience as during that time he had been often driving a motor car, and was a competent motor mechanic and driving in the city. He had never collided with another car nor touched a pedestrian, nor had he ever been under a charge of driving in the night in violation of the law. Following the Chrysler car for some distance, and as he had turned on to Grosvenor Road from Lennox Road he had concluded from signals given that the car was going to the left whereas in reality it had turned to the right and he had to pull up dead. He concluded from the way the Chrysler was driven that the driver was a highly nervous and so determined to pass it as to leave his car in a panic at the corner. He had no hesitation in asserting that the Chrysler was not doing more than eight miles per hour, although Mrs. Chichester had said her speedometer was registering 15 m.p.h. STOCK AND PRODUCE THEFT BILL.

Question of Unjustifiable Arrest.

In the Legislative Council on Saturday the Bill to amend the Stock and Produce Theft Ordinance was discussed in Committee. The Acting Director of Agriculture proposed the substitution of the word "person" for the word "cattle" in the clause dealing with liability to account for possession of produce, and power of conviction of persons receiving produce suspected of having been stolen.

Mr. H. M. J. Kirkwood (P. M. S. S. S.) and those opposed to the new penalty for malfeasance in a constabulary. The Hon. The Crown or its duly authorized agents in respect of stock or produce raised on such land or to the holder thereof."

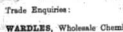

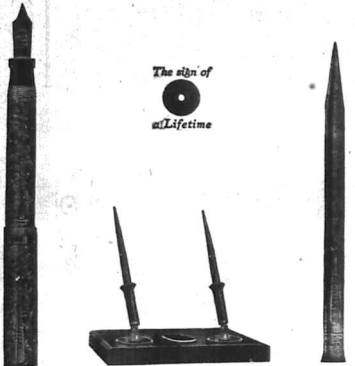

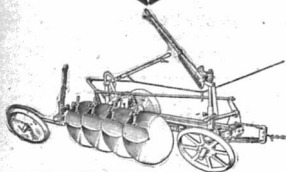

SPORTS EVENTS.

STANDARD CORRESPONDENT.

Mombasa, May 19. We have had some fine weather during the last ten days or so. Then down came the rain again, and some wet and almost cold days for Mombasa—was the result. The sun is shining brightly today, and, alas! however, where possible, in the order of the day.

Mombasa is looking forward to the celebration of Empire Day, for which great preparations are being made. May 24th (Thursday) as ever, will be the principal sports, if earnest endeavor can make it so. For people outside will be the gratifying knowledge of the fact that His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, and His brother the Duke of Gloucester, will soon be paying Kenya a visit. That, of course, adds to one's enthusiasm for Empire, and all the Empire stands for.

At 8.00 on Thursday next, there will be sports, of which the following is a brief summary:

For Europeans—1 mile relay race; 100 yards race; 220 yards race; and half mile race.

For Indians—A precise duplicate of the above.

For Arabs and Africans—The same events.

In the relay races, each member of a team of four has to run 400 yards and pass on a baton or flag to the next runner of his team. A final runner will be pulled off between teams of eight selected from winning teams.

There will be a football match between mixed teams. The Sports will be held on the field Course, and will start at 4 p.m. immediately after the arrival of the procession of the decorated cars. Each British subject may compete in these sports.

For the Children.

For children there will be open events "for children of all races."

such as a sack race; egg and spoon race; Flat race (1000 yards); Flat race (children under 8); Skipping competition for girls under 10.

The great event of the day is to be the procession of decorated cars, representing various Dominions and Colonies. At the same time, industries may be shown in this way, so long as they are of Empire origin. At least twenty cars have already entered, and many more will probably decide to enter at the last moment. Prizes are to be offered for each section. Nearly 4,000 have already been advertised for the purpose of the grand rally expected for the 24th. The arrival of the N.E.R. Road, kindly lent by the authorities in Nairobi will add a welcome touch of bright sun and heat to the day's proceedings.

We are sadly disappointed that His Excellency the Governor cannot come down to be with us on Empire Day. But one supposes that his recent indisposition may be the reason for the plans falling through. We hope he will have made a good recovery by now, and be quite fit again.

GOVERNMENT LOANS TO THE NAIROBI MUNICIPALITY.

Conditions Governing Advance of £100,000 for Roads.

A MAINTENANCE FUND.

Work to be Open to Inspection by the Public Works Department.

Subject to certain specified conditions Government has now definitely approved of the grant of loans to the Nairobi Municipality amounting to £310,847.

One of the main items is the £100,000 roads loan which is granted on condition that the standard of construction is of a satisfactory character; that ample provision is made for maintenance; that the programme of construction is approved by Government; and that facilities are given for inspection of the work in progress by the Public Works Department.

The Town Council on Tuesday agreed to the conditions imposed, so that the big programme of road construction may be embarked upon immediately.

STATE TO APPROVE PROGRAMME.

A special meeting of the Finance Committee of the Nairobi Town Council was held on May 9 when the Hon. Commissioner for Local Government, Lands and Settlements was present for the purpose of discussing proposals for getting all loans from Government. The following were the conditions to be satisfied at this meeting:

- (1) That the Hon. the Commissioner for Local Government, Lands and Settlements, the Mayor (Councillor Brough), the Town Clerk and the Municipal Engineer should be invited to the Finance Committee of the Hon. - (2) That special provision be made for the satisfaction of the Council and in addition to interest and sinking charges on the loan will be made from the revenue of the Council for such maintenance and repairs as may be necessary to keep the roads constructed in the following order throughout the loan period.

- (3) That in the first place a programme of construction should be prepared by the Council and approved by Government. For this purpose the Council will refer to the Director of Public Works a general plan showing the works proposed to be carried out during the term of each work including an estimated cost. The Director of Public Works will submit the proposals to Government for consideration thereon.
- (4) That when the programme of construction has been approved by Government the Council will submit for approval all plans and specifications of such works as will be undertaken by contract before tenders for such works are invited by the Council.
- (5) Plans and descriptions of the method of construction of such works as it proposes to de-construct by contract before any departmental construction is commenced.
- (6) That facilities will be given to members of the Council to accompany members of the Public Works Department for inspection of works in progress.
- (7) That in order to provide for the proper maintenance and reconstruction of the roads, a committee of the Council will be appointed to advise the Council and will, in addition to the roads, be responsible for the maintenance and reconstruction of the roads.
- (8) Annual contributions to the capital outlay from the loan will be set aside in a special fund to be known as the "Maintenance Fund" and the Council will be bound to use the same for the purpose of maintaining and reconstructing the roads.

Wireless Experiments.

AN AMATEUR TRANSMISSION SET AT WORK.

With the announcement of the early opening of the Kenya Broadcasting Station, public interest in wireless is becoming more general and enquiries for information are being received on all sides. It is interesting, therefore, to know all that is happening in Kenya. To-day there is published the second part of an article by Comdr. Robinson on the types of receivers that are likely to prove of use in this Colony.

Last week an opportunity was taken to examine the private installation of Mr. J. A. Moore who has been experimenting in wireless transmission since November of last year. Mr. Moore, a partner of the firm of Messrs. Lockhart Moore & Coy, who are interesting themselves in wireless equipment, determined to acquire his own knowledge of this highly technical subject by carrying out his own experiment. Under a special arrangement he has been given access to the firm's transmitter. Mr. Moore commenced to build up his private home by his own transmitter from such material as was available together with certain necessary parts which he imported.

The Apparatus.

The transmitter employed consists of a modified Colpitts oscillator with split stator coils bridged by a series condenser. Grid potentials are determined in respect to the filament which is connected to the mid-point between the two condensers. The aerial coupling being placed between the two halves of the stator coil can be critically adjusted for the aerial coil by a variable coupling. The modulator circuit used is the conventional choke control system using a solid back output transformer. The valve used in both oscillator and modulator are the

well known Philips 64/20 type fed by an 3C. 25 type B. battery operating on 22 volts and delivering 500 milliamps at 25 milliamperes to the plates of the valves.

The test transmission are being carried out on a wave length of 31 meters until sufficient data has been obtained as to the steadiness of the carrier, strength and distance of reception, antenna quality.

The whole transmitter is driven from a 12 volt car battery to a motor generator with an output of 250 watts. The motor, consisting of a motor generator set and a motor generator set could not be used as it is not suitable for use in the Colony. The electrical radiation from this set is so great that it will light an incandescent lamp held near the set which is not connected with an current.

Heard in New Zealand.

Mr. Moore's early tests were by telegraphy and his messages were picked up by his office in New Zealand and South Africa. Within the last fortnight however, he has experimented in telephony and by the use of speech and gramophone records has been broadcasting there that has been picked up by various receivers throughout the Colony. To-day the official designation of his station is V K R. Everything seems so simple and yet the engineer must be in the simplicity.

Mr. Moore has not given his attention solely to transmitting but is also testing a 4 valve superheterodyne set for its suitability to receive in the Colony. The programmes of England, Holland and America broadcast from a local station when it starts broadcasting and from the results of his tests to believe that super-receivers are likely to meet with difficulties which cannot be easily remedied. He is also concerned in constructing amplifying sets for use in hotels, clubs, etc. So small part of the receiver attached has been due to the help of Mr. Fisher who has assisted in the wiring and the making of parts for the transmitter.

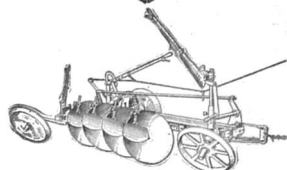

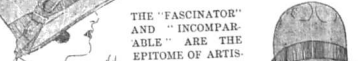

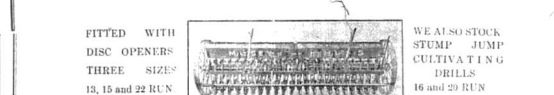

THE WORKING OF A LAND BANK.

Its Success in Southern Rhodesia.

THE KENTA MODEL.

The Land and Agricultural Bank of Southern Rhodesia came into existence by proclamation on August 10, 1924. It is the result of the fact that the functions of the proposed Land Bank in this Colony are practically identical with those of Southern Rhodesia. The following notes on its operation by Mr. R. Thornton in a recent issue of the *Rhodesian Agricultural Journal* are of interest to its readers.

In its broad details the Rhodesian Land Bank Act of 1924 and its former regulations connected with the administration of the Bank, the Board has been guided largely by the practice in the United Kingdom as the result of practical experience under conditions similar in many ways to those obtaining in Rhodesia.

Art. 1 of the Bank and four of the other provisions, all contained in Title I, the Governor is responsible. The members of the Bank are appointed by the Board, when he is not to go outside the provisions of the Land Bank Act.

In its operation, through the Legislative Assembly in 1924, the Bank was subjected to an exhaustive examination, every clause being discussed with care and thoroughness, and every amendment was made at the suggestion of members before it was finally passed.

On Business Lines

If there was one point in the Bill remarkable for its uncertainty with which it was accepted on both sides of the House, it was that the Land Bank was to be established strictly on business lines and that money was to be advanced only on a proper security. The point, perhaps, hardly needed emphasis. It is fairly obvious that a Board charged with the administration of a large amount of public money should not be given freedom to run risks or indulge in speculation with that money. Despite the stress laid upon this fundamental condition, many

many applications have been, and will be, received, by the Bank officers and members, to borrow money at all, just as much as human nature is indisposed to see the applicant upon being informed of the Board's attitude, to lose the loan requested, is usually the first essential, therefore, to the success of any application is a

It may be asked what is the difference between the Land Bank and an ordinary money lending institution? The former is a commercial bank? The fundamental difference lies in the fact that the former is established for the development of the land and the promotion of agriculture. The latter is established to make the profits of the commercial bank, but neither should it make bad loans nor should it be bound to purchase the securities of the Government, to the furtherance of its prime object as shown by the Land Bank officers and members, to the furtherance of the welfare of agriculture and the development of the land down by business enterprise and practice. Applicable doctrine holds outside those limits must of necessity seek it elsewhere.

Security

After outlining the business of the Land Bank as set out in the Act, Mr. Thornton continues, "It is seen that the only security which the Board is empowered to accept for an advance to a farmer is land within the Colony. In the case of a note of land advance concern must be given by the applicant for noting the land in the Deeds Office against the land and a corresponding endorsement on the title deeds."

"Other securities are, in practice, accepted or not by the Bank, except on a note by the applicant, as a note upon note for the security of holders of Crown lands under 'Agreement of Purchase.' Applicants may proceed on land at the date of their application if the purpose of the desired advance is to purchase a farm. In such case transfer of the property to the applicant must be registered simultaneously with the raising of a bond to the Land Bank."

It is noted that the prime function of the Land Bank is to promote agricultural and pastoral pursuits (and merely to land money) the result for which might otherwise appear to be a rather limited field of activity. It is appreciated. The purpose to which advances are given are more thoroughly scrutinized by the Land Bank than would be the case with an ordinary commercial bank advancing money on simple security. Therefore, land

ability and past records of farming operations are taken into consideration, as well as the character of the applicant. The duty of interpreting the spirit which animates the letter of the Act thus becomes the duty of the administering authority. It is a delicate work, but one which requires the circumstances surrounding the applicant.

Spending the Loan

It is not considered necessary here to enumerate the purposes for which the money may be expended, as these are set out in the Act. It is sufficient to state so accurately as possible the manner in which the money will be spent. It is further laid down in the Act that no advance shall be made until the farmer is in receipt of his title deeds, and that the work has been completed.

The money loaned to a farmer is advanced in the form of a note, which is secured by the land. The note is issued to the farmer, and the land is mortgaged to the Bank. The note is payable to the order of the Bank, and the land is sold to satisfy the note in the event of default.

Regarding lending, Mr. Thornton says, "The Board cannot do all in its power to assist, and when applications fall within the limits of the Act, an advance will, if desired, be made for the full value of the fee."

Payment

Mr. Thornton continues by giving examples of the instalment repayments for various periods of time. On the subject of payment, Mr. Thornton says, "An important section of the Land Bank Act, and one which, in his opinion, applicants should make themselves acquainted with, is the 'First Schedule,' which enumerates the 'covenants to be included in every mortgage bond' executed in favour of the Land Bank. In these covenants the mortgagor undertakes to pay all instalments of principal and interest, to keep all buildings and other improvements in good and substantial repair, to offer such security as the Bank may require, and to indemnify the Bank against all claims of third parties."

The mortgagee further agrees that the representative of the Bank may inspect any buildings and improvements, and should the

Carrying Out a Systematic Inspection.

HOW TO GO ABOUT IT.

When the purchase of a used car or motor construction vehicle has been effected which is of any type, age and price to the requirements of the purchaser, it is advisable to inspect the car before it is possible in order to ascertain whether there are any serious faults likely to render an otherwise expeditious necessary shortly after the car becomes the property of a new owner.

Such an examination of the engine, best carried out by a qualified engineer. However, in cases where there is no doubt as to the exact fitness of the car or the honesty of the vendor, an amateur driver of experience with some mechanical knowledge and a little common sense will carry out a sufficient examination for himself.

INCOME TAX AND THE COST OF LIVING.

A Suggestion to the Commission.

LAND VALUES

The redistribution of income tax has been suggested to the Commission which is at present investigating the high cost of living. The suggestion was made by Mr. Joseph Mortimer who recently gave evidence before the Commission.

With reference to income tax Mr. Mortimer would like to point out that a light tax of this description would retard development and urged that this tax when applied in 1921 had not had a far trial. He did not lose sight of the fact that capital from abroad was required in the Colony for development and would like to avoid taxing it, but on the other hand large incomes which escaped taxation were being made in coffee, sisal, maize and commercial trading. His chief object was to relieve the Government of the necessity of collecting revenue from customs so that it might be free to deal with customs in the best interests of the country.

He urged that it was no part of the railway management's duty to set up customs offices. The railway tariffs should be fixed upon purely business principles only. Wheat Duty. He understood that for all the production must be at least one bag of imported flour to every bag of the local produce. Mr. Mortimer also made a statement on the subject of land tenure. 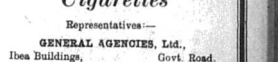
