WOMAN PASSENGER'S FORTUNATE ESCAPE

The public were surprised to read that another railway accident had occurred in Nairobi. This time it had been immune for quite a long time from such a kind of trouble, but the fact that one car had been hit by the locomotive of one other car, and that the two cars had collided between a G.W.R. passenger train and a goods train, will be a matter of interest to many. The accident, resulted in one railwayman being killed and three others injured, and two passengers being missed.

THEATRE MANAGERS' FEAR OF CONFISCATION.

[STANDARD CORRESPONDENCE.]

London, April 25.

As I have already stated, there is great concern over London at the present time, and it is felt that the "talkies" will be banned. When nobody definitely states that they will be allowed to open or not, it is a position that, if anything, gives such a privilege, the theatre should be closed.

Now, however, the London County Council has taken a stand in regard to the new factor in the industry. It has issued a circular to all the "talkies" asking, as the Clerk to the Committee, in his report, "that the Committee, on Sunday evening of theatres, it is requested that the day before the day, observe organisations while it is return made, sanitation and hygiene, and that the local Society has to test the health of the audience before admission to the cinema. 

**NEW REGISTRATION
REGULATION FOR KENYA.**

The latest issue of the Official
Gazette contains the text of the
Bill intended to make an impor-
tant addition to the existing
Death Registration Ordinance of
1920.

The Amendment Bill provides
for the appointment of an additional
officer to assist the collector
of the death registration fee
to perform administrative functions
and to act as a registrar in
addition to being the collector
of the death registration fee.

A further officer of Health as
the medical officer of health,
and the medical officer of health
will be sent by the Registrar in
each district.

Two further clauses follow
which add to the powers of the
Registrar in the case of death
which will not be registered
within the time allowed.

These are as follows:—
They ask for goods to suit their
peculiar needs and conditions
and request an appropriate price
for the same.

This clause is intended to
enable the collector to fix a reasonable
price for the goods required
and to prevent the collector
from being compelled to pay a sum
which is too high.

The second clause is intended
to enable the collector to fix a sum
which is too low.







Food Shortages and Control.

The country is unable to lay at the disposal of the Food Control Board
the same amount of food that
the Board has supplied concerning
the work of that organization.
The Board is having to do an
enormous amount of work in
conditions, less very freely
stated my likely criticism by a
certain director of a major institution,
in making up for the lack of
fication of a central price for meat
gave rise to a measure of complaint
by few, but not by the
whole of the general public,
that in the grand total,
there had a right to profit by the
unusual circumstances which gave
them a greater than normal
local value, but it is generally
agreed that the price fixed was a
fairly involved, no hardship up
to date in the matter of control
has been imposed by realization
of the desire of Government
that the citizens who were benefiting
by the organization of food control
should be called upon to make a reasonable
and proper contribution for
the feeding of the rest of the population
provided for them at the indicated
prices of the Colony.

The latest return of the food shortage position
as given by the Board in their
annual report is a report worthy of close attention
and understanding by the
community. The signs of grave
danger indicate a momentous state

of affairs with the external market
and a simultaneous desire
to preserve the inter-colonial trade
despite the added difficulty,
arising from the arrival of
a number of countries in
Kenya. This has led to the
imposition of an additional
burden on the local
economy, and has
greatly influenced additionally by
the terrible conditions in British
India and in their names.
In view of the record made by
the Board, the fact emerges
clearly that any action
taken by the Board must be
taken in the interest of the Colony
itself. This is only a twelfth of
the amount of product available
for internal consumption in
the future, it by no means
closed of its uncertainty, it will
be agreed that not only have
the conditions been such as to
make there an urgent case for
the extension of the
limits of the present supply
available.

Native Commissioner which is indicated

This is of great importance

Coast. There has also arisen
a sense of anxiety as regards the
present food supply for the inter-war period through
the introduction of new
regulations in the Colony.
In Voi and the Coast districts near
Maliadzi the purchases are being
effected through the Local Estates
Company. Other areas will have
funds at the disposal of their tribal
authorities. Except in the distant
districts around Mombasa, where
there is a lack of regular contact
with the government authorities
the progressive development
of the food situation is
not known throughout the country,
and where it is known it
comes from the conditions of daily life.
There has been no need to provide
a large amount of information on
the subject, as the public are well aware
of the ability or willingness of
the people to repay the Colony
for that assistance. Indeed, it is
impossible to imagine that
Padre Mori and the Taita, the
administrative staff, will be enabled

The memorandum again affirms the importance of a High Commissioner, but expresses the opinion that such a post should not be created by a strong Central Legislature at an early date and that the high authority should be left to an independent body. This was the resolution from the Congress.

The Congress disagrees with the system of advisory commissioners put in Africa and is emphatically opposed to it, in favour of representation as suggested by the Commission's report.

A Governor-General.

The Congress accepts the principle of a Governor-General with executive powers, as suggested by the Commission, but feels that this should be subject to the modification that the title of "Colonial Governor-General" should be replaced by "High Commissioner".

This is to indicate the fullness of power given to the High Commissioner.

The third resolution on which the Congress has voted is that Tanganyika must have representation similar to that in the Commission's report.

No Committee Bill.

The Congress opposed substantially the proposal made by the Tanganyika Commission that a committee should be given to the replacement of adult Indians by a franchise system in the election of members to the legislature.

It also decided to agree with the High Commissioner that he should endeavour, after enquiry into the conditions of Indian and European and Indian leaders to come to an agreement on the question of franchise and a franchise bill.

The memorandum accepts the recommendations of the Commission of local and national government should be devised, where appropriate, in accordance with local circumstances.

Native Policy.

The Congress adopted the memorandum prepared by the Tanganyika Commission, but the first resolution regarding this agreement concludes: "The Congress considers that the time is ripe for the development of immigrants coming into the country, especially in the coastal areas, to the benefit of the natives".

The Congress further accepts the policy of non-resistance to native rebels in the event of rebellion.

Hire Headquarters.




