THE POULTRY WORLD.

THE BARNEVELDER.

Its Origin and Qualities.

A correspondent writes asking for information about Barnevelders, their origin, qualities, etc.—very desirable breed to import. The Barnevelder originated in Holland, and since the majority of the breeders were poultrymen the eggs of Barnevelders (originally of Gollerland), was agreed to give it the name of the town. The original Barnevelds were evolved from the ordinary farm birds, which laid a good brown egg. It has been bred as a breed about twenty years. For a long time each breeder had according to his own ideas, and the outcome was of different types and no uniformity.

In January 1921 the association called "De Barnevelder" was formed, and from that time the breed began to improve. To look at the male is something like the Partridge. Wadette neck in coloring. The comb single and the legs and skin yellow. The lacking of the female is so like an Indian game hen that many think that there must be Indian Game in the blood, but the originators used Partridge Cochins, Brahmas, Buff Orpingtons and Leghorns.

The aim of the breeders was to produce a bird which would be hardy under unfavorable conditions, consequently to be winter layers, and also to lay plenty of tender flesh for the table. Also they wanted a bird to lay a big thick brown egg like the Langshan. On the other hand they wanted an active bird, active improving the egg laying production.

The Barnevelder should weigh about seven to eight pounds for the male and five to six for the hen. The eggs should be a deep brown color. The breed is strong and hardy. The principal drawback to the breed is that they do not always breed true, that is especially the case with the pullets. I have seen birds with all sorts of markings in this country, but when I was in N. Africa I saw very most beautifully bred pullets.

As to the question of importing, it is a breed that would have to be brought from somewhere very reliable, as the very correctness by an otherwise the purchaser would probably be very disappointed in the breeding results. It would prefer them to be raised on the small side as they would then probably be more fertile and more energetic. The big brown eggs are a distinct attraction to the breeder who breeds for egg production.

It is a breed I do not know very much about, and I would want some information on the Barnevelders from breeders in this country, as personal experience is of much greater value than that derived from books.

CHARCOAL FOR POULTRY.

The importance of feeding charcoal is overlooked by many poultry raisers, we believe chiefly on account of the lack of full information as to the benefits that are to be derived.

In the selection of charcoal for feeding the first essential is that the wood be thoroughly carbonized so that pitch, tarry or oily properties found in some grades of charcoal, will be completely driven off and the charcoal that remains will be practically free from these impurities.

Charcoal in this form has an unusual value for feeding to poultry. The charcoal is very porous and therefore more absorptive of gases. The absorption of stomach gas is the chief benefit derived. It may be said that since charcoal serves such a purpose that continual feeding to poultry is not necessary, that poultry do not require a constant aid to the assimilation of their food. However true this may be, most large poultry raisers are in business not only for their interest in poultry raising but also the income that is derived from the successful operation of such a business.

It is a poultry raiser who is interested in the quick development of chicks, for the market and such development is secured and speeded up by the constant aid to digestion and thoroughness of assimilation of food.

What is good for the large poultry raiser is also good for the small raiser. A.M.B.

not too low in front, tapering over the shoulders, and in a deep V at the back.

Then there is the one which has quite wide shoulders and a deep, narrow V in front and at the back, filled in with flesh-coloured or fine corded tulle.

Another is a long line in which the bodice is achieved by ruffling the top of a blouse; the top bodice is normally in front, at the back, and under the arms. The small point which is thus made are sought over the shoulders with minute steps no wider than the face-line—sometimes they are merely strings of pearls or crystals—beads on very strong diamond.

At this time the straight-across bodice is very much the better—it never was becoming!

With day time "Yankees," a pretty idea is to draw a bow of the fresh material, through a slit made on the shoulder.

Belle and Brandy.

Belle are quite interesting and full of variety. With the new skirt which is worn over the blouse gown, a swathed waist, laced by a large bow through which the end is drawn. An alternative day-time suit with a wide, stitched affair, complete with a wide belt and a real "buckle." Both these are attached to their skirts.

On evening and sports clothes, belle are extremely narrow. Usually they are of the same material, finished with small well-defined changes in fancy motifs: several shades of gold or old silver, or cubes of semi-precious stones. As a rule these changes are the works of artists.

To the waist. Lighter day frocks, it is quite usual to take a narrow belt of white muslin and cover it with dress material, leaving an inch or two unworked in the front.

I saw a sweet pale green and white flowered chiffon suit with white. The suit was plain and simple, the bodice as simple as a tennis house, and the skirt was shaded all round. The waist was finished with one of the white kid belts three parts covered with children, the front and buckle being left plain.

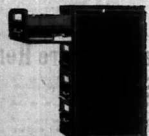

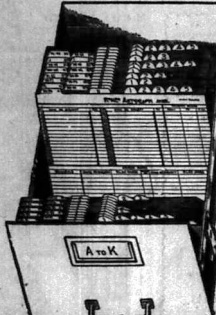

ACROSS the Lake.
PROGRESS OF RAILWAY OBSTRUCTION.
"WARDEN'S" CORRESPONDENT.
 Kampala, Sept. 10.
 Railway construction between Kampala and Jinja is now progressing at a tremendous pace. Last week over two miles of track were laid over a distance of 10 miles. This morning we saw engines drawing construction trains, pulling down from the tower of cuttings or embankment above an extraordinary material such as rails, sleepers, etc., further along the line where they are being laid as quickly as they can be brought up. The trip from Jinja to Kampala by road is a very different matter to a year ago and even the geography of the surrounding country seems to have been altered.

Level Crossings.
 One very serious addition to the hazards of the road is the introduction of level crossings. The railway has to cross the road on several occasions, and this is the first time Uganda has had to face this danger, which has caused so many accidents in Kenya. Some time ago we pointed out that, with the long guns we use on one level with in Uganda had no narrow roads something must be done to give reasonable safety to road traffic.

The first of such crossings from Kampala is at about M.S. 2 1/2 on one side there is a very steep embankment which grades sharply down and over the road into a ditch which almost hides the

chances of ultimate success are immeasurably greater than they were two years ago when the almost absolute definition of parity wrecked the negotiations. There is good reason for hoping that the more flexible "realist" attitude in the course of the present discussions will prove to be a more accommodating measure than in the realm where the principle of reality is even more significant than in the space time of the physical universe. This time moreover there has been no lack of diplomatic preparation. The ground has been prepared by the psychological improvement in the psychological situation brought about by the Kellogg Pact has created a new spirit of goodwill which has certainly led to mitigate the understandable difficulties of the problem.

The Cruiser Problem.

Mr. Stimson, Secretary for the Navy, announced that the Daves-McKean naval negotiations had reached a point at which a con-

ference could be called to deal with any matters not yet settled by direct conversations. These discussions would be chiefly concerned with the differences in cruiser tonnage and even on this point it is probable that it would resolve itself into a settlement in the way in which cruises were constructed, armed and manned.

A General Conference.

Washington, Sept. 10. A naval limitation conference here, as the outcome of the current Anglo-American discussions, has been proposed to be held early in December. The participants in this conference will be the United States, Britain, Japan, France and Italy. Mr. Stimson said that all categories of ships would be included in the conference, but at immediate limitation, and particularly such ultra-Atlantic policies which President Hoover advised.

A Naval Holiday.

THE HOUSE OF COMMONS. A naval limitation conference was not proposed to be held at Washington as suggested in an earlier cable. The terms had been mentioned, but it is understood that it will very likely be held in London. It is stated that the United States Government will propose a 10 years naval holiday for the construction of capital ships which shall be extended from 1931 to 1936 when there should be an opportunity for a second conference at which bigger steps could be taken towards the reduction of all classes of warships.

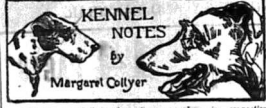

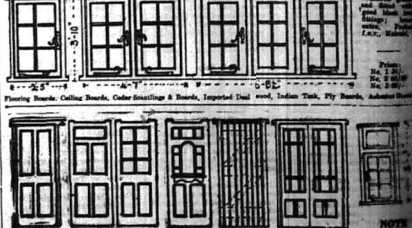

KENYA INDIAN SCOUTS IN ENGLAND.

Extracts From a Boy's Diary.

IMPRESSIONS OF THE VISIT.

The Kenya contingent of Indian Boy Scouts who recently visited England for the World Jamboree had many new and very interesting experiences. Some of them had never visited Great Britain before and a glance at the diary which they kept throughout their travels gives an insight into their feelings regarding many of the new adventures which they encountered.

Although it is evident through our diary that for the most part they enjoyed themselves fully, it is also clear that on occasions their experiences were not so pleasant. For instance, on the day on which they landed at Mombasa the diary concludes with the name "Wheat". The steamer called at 4.15. We had tea at 4.15 p.m. and supper at 6.45, but only a very few of us took either tea or supper. When we had at about 9.0 p.m. That night must have been a distinctly unpleasant one as the following day commences with the words "Great inconvenience was caused to the men entering our cabin at about midnight. All beds got wet. Much of the kit was spoiled. Some of us fell sick. Few of us had dinner at 10.15. How nice by the following day "all felt much better."

A Jolly Voyage.

The voyage seems to have been a jolly one and was welcomed by bright, brilliant sun as we left Djibouti where "a crowd of natives who got on the ship to sell their wares were kicked out. Some jumped into the sea, peevish and an amusing sight!" In addition to such things as tin boxes drill the Scouts carried out signalling practice and had lessons in making knots. The Straits of Messina, the diary states that the Straits between Italy and Sicily and the horns on both sides were most picturesque. At 9.30 p.m. we left all this behind to our regret, because it was a marvellous spectacle."

Only two hours were spent in Paris on the journey to England. London was reached at 4.0 o'clock on July 20 and the boys were billeted at the Scout Hostels at Earl's Court, where they met the Scout Hostels from all over the world and spent much of their time "enjoying amusements."

Touring London.

On the following day they started sight-seeing in the shape of a Rover Scout who acted as their guide. They saw some old buildings and the House of Commons of Parliament, Buckingham Palace and the House of Lords. They also took a ride to the Zoological Gardens where we were held till 2.30 p.m. We saw there the Lion which was previously at Government House, Nairobi.

On the same night the party left for Birmingham where they were camped at Arroyo Park.

At Birmingham.

One of the most wonderful days during the whole of their travels was August 2. At 1.0 p.m. we left the camp, "stated the Diary, and joined the Kenya European Scouts. We marched together to the Parade Ground where a great crowd of Scouts was present. These different contingents marched past the platform where were present H.R.H. the Prince of Wales and the Chief Scout. It was also paraded before the platform and attracted considerable attention. Then we all gathered round the platform where speeches were delivered by H.R.H. the Prince of Wales and the Chief Scout. The former in his speech announced that he had visited the Scouts in Kenya in 1912 instead of 1914.

PRODDER MARKET.

Another important day was August 6. "We were informed that the Chief Scout would be coming to visit us. We dressed ourselves in Scout uniforms. At 9.30 a.m. he came to our camp and after shaking hands with each Scout he said that he was very glad to see us. He had been to Nairobi but there was no Scout troop at that time in Nairobi. He tried to see the Scout Nairobian again. He left us and we gave thanks."

Colours Presented.

On August 19 there was the Colour Presentation. "After lunch we left our camp. We reached the Parade Ground at 1.20 p.m. where we waited for the Kenya European Scouts, but they did not turn up, so we had their flag gone to Liverpool."

After the Parade Mr. Somers, Ralph Singh and Chundal left with the troop flag and marched with other Scouts to the platform. They were presented with a World Jamboree Flag and the Chief Scout said the flag was presented to the Kenya Contingent and intended to use all the Scouts parading under the same flag.

During the time that they were at Birmingham the boys were taken to see a number of sights in the city. They visited the Cathedral, the Liverpool Docks and the Hall where we were allowed to follow their work. They also saw some scenery at New Brighton. The Chief Scout and the boys were taken to see the "Pon H. use and see all of his dog messes."

On the next morning they spent two days in London and nights in the short time. All night they visited the Pantomime Theatre, and saw and heard talks, films and during the day they visited the British Museum and the Tower of London. As the boys had one day and were fortunate enough to attend a part of a singing a motor tour round "numerous beautiful places."

Homeward Bound.

The S.S. "General Dumas" was boarded on August 15, and the return voyage did not present any very exciting incidents, although rough weather was encountered and necessitated the altering of the course of the boat after leaving Aden.

There is no doubt that crowded space for the months that the boys were away from Kenya there were experiences sufficient to teach them a very great deal. The resulting portions of the diary show a very much broader outlook on things in general than it is to be found in the early stages.



STEADY, UGANDA!

Disquieting Factors in Cotton Outlook.

CAUTION ADVISABLE.

Merchants Warned Not to Expect Bumper Years.

The Uganda correspondent of the "East African Standard" without being pessimistic, directs attention in a special article published below to disappointing aspects of the cotton situation and particularly emphasises outstanding lessons of the experience of the past few years.

He points out that the market has fallen, that the premium on Uganda is shrinking, and recalls the fact that 40,000 bales of Uganda's 1922 season cotton were still unexported in Liverpool when the 1920 cotton was cleared. A large quantity of this season's crop is still on hand in Liverpool.

hol" in the matter of cotton production. 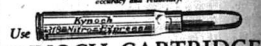
