

indefinitely. The Ambassador did not yet have enough and a further long-winded proposal had been made.

quested that the British Gov-

Lord Brentford (The Lord Lynton) said that whether in the form of the statement or the resolution contained either in Britain or in the proposed International Conference, their object would be the same.

Lord Thesiger replied: "It is indicated by the Foreign Govern-

ment that it is not the British Gov-

ernment's intention to include

the word 'International' in the

title of the Conference.

Continuing Lord Thesiger said that he did not know the precise form in which the resolution would come as it might. It could not be expected that any country like the Third International would be satisfied with a resolution that the Government should not be bound by the principles of the International Conference, but a country where structures and methods of government were different from those of the Third International, he said, might be inclined to accept the interpretation that the Government did not encroach upon and regulate the internal affairs of other countries.

Introducing the resolution, the representative of the International Conference said that the restoration of relations with Russia was to be the first step in the way to restore and restore all peace and orga-

nized control, including organi-

zed resistance to any assistance from them, from any na-

tion, over or other, liable in any way to interfere with the peace and welfare of the people of Britain or the rest of the British Empire or the British Commonwealth."

Lord Thesiger said that the resolution was the result of the fact that his interpretation that the International Conference had given the Government the right to take any and every measure necessary to check foreign submarine programs from whatever source it might be.

He believed he added: "That it is in the best interests of our country to have a friendly and peaceful relationship with Russia, but he believed that a country which has adopted a policy of communism is absolutely inimical to all forms of peace."

Lord Reading (Liberal), approved and supported the policy as sound and wise, and for universal peace.

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

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

the extension of the railway, and greater and faster development which would follow the opening up of the sparsely populated areas to the north and west of Arusha. The railway now runs into Arusha from the south, and the first train is on the road to the north of that district. The Government and planters are confidently anticipating greater prosperity and economic development, and of substantial figures—there is no sign of which has been made public. It would be futile to attempt to guess at the cost of production today and the estimated cost of production next year. But that does happen every year. There is no doubt that the cost of 20 miles is suitable for the production of coffee, and there is every possibility locally that the acreage will increase, and will do so in the next few years. Up to the present the production of maize, for example, has been on a very economic basis, on account of the low transport charges of the railway. The cost of maize, however, did not come down with the coming of a cheaper railway, and there was every possibility of a great increase in the cost of production of this crop.

Somewhat interesting in effect this new service will have on the fact that formerly, transport charges were levied on the coast by the H.M.A. per ton per mile.

It is anticipated that the charge will work out about Shs. 4/-.

The Railway Story.

The original negotiations for a railway from Arusha to Dodoma were made in March 1924. There was at that time a demand for such raw materials as the Arusha district planters were able to produce, and the Government was fully alive to the situation and made arrangements for roads and communications for trade development when they came into power. In the absence of any financial support, the Arusha people approached Government on the understanding that the railway was to run to Arusha, and the planters' request was that the route to Arusha should be constructed, leaving a direct outlet for produce to Dodoma. In view of the fact that the railway was to be built at the expense of the State, the Government submitted to the Government of Tanganyika that the scheme be abandoned.

Now, Arusha is served by the railway, and the local community is encouraged to look forward to the achievement the local community in furthering the welfare of the area.

It is to be hoped that the transport charges entailed by such

long delivery by road to Moshi, they were unable to send some of their produce to the market, and so into the world's markets. The weight of this loss must be judged by the fact that even the cost of production was sent out of the country, and the initial transport charge of Shs. 70/-.

That state of affairs was remedied by the construction of the line, and the acceptance of goods for transport from the distant port.

The argument presented at that time that a line terminating at Arusha would be of little value, and even part of the present demand for a railway from Arusha to Dodoma, was shown by figures held by the Government, which encouraged the production of this crop.

Arusha district, it was also submitted, on that occasion, was not in a position to benefit from the working of the railway, and the Government, as a result, gave the railway to the settlers in the area.

It will also be recalled that when the East African Commission reported on the territory in 1924, the Government had reluctantly reiterated their representations that the main object of the proposed railway was to communicate to the Coast the products of the interior. The railway was built, to finish the line, to the coast, and the Government obtained a rate obtained by a surcharge on rates on the freight carried on the railway to main products.

The Arusha district, in contact with the various planters, has been sending its record their thanks for the completion of the railway to Arusha, one of the most important factors in the development of the interior.

The claim for a connection with Tanganyika is quite strong.

The railway is one of the two most valuable systems in East Africa, and it is to be hoped that the

Government will make the connection with Tanganyika.

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
