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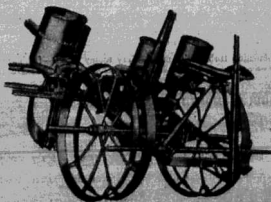

The Report, discussing land principles in relation to the distribution of Native Interests, continues:

If the possession of areas for native development is accepted as a first policy, it does not necessarily remain arbitrary right to be allocated for attention to natives. What we advocate as complementary measure is the definition of native reserves in certain areas which should again be mapped out as definitely and immediately available for settlement to non-natives.

Land to be retained by the Government in its own disposal which can be kept free for any of the following purposes: either in addition to the native reserves if the proper measure or as a definite alternative to non-natives, or as a sale to native. The last alternative requires special circumspection for dealing with the class of title which is not satisfied to continue in the native condition. Both of these may include some of the best land available, and these should be

an opportunity to settle down, perhaps after a period of long service with a white employer, as independent agriculturists in the country and not be forced to remain as labourers or tenants on white estates or to drift into the large town. Every land will cease to be sufficient with the primitive native methods of cultivation. The native must then pass to a second stage in his evolution by adopting improved and more intensive methods of cultivation. After that must come further steps, characterized by the introduction of other forms of employment, and eventually forming the automatic adjustment of the increase of population to the measure of the means of its actual maintenance.

As every civilized community of the world has to deal with these conditions in the way that there is no objection in making native communities to be established and protected, the same principle should be fairly operative to learn improvements of agriculture wherever it is forced into which we have described as the second step of the Territorial Segregation.

The matter to be decided must, of course, be largely governed by practical questions. It so happens, for example, in Kenya that most of the land situated suitable for European settlement forms one continuous block, whereas in Tanganyika there are several scattered highland areas. As a general principle, we recommend an assessment of territorial segregation which will facilitate the creation of homogeneous native and non-native areas of a sufficient size to become units of local self-government.

The arguments against the principle of territorial segregation are generally based on the idea that it will involve the friction of the territory into large distinct "white" and "black" areas, and that with the conditions native who wish to work on a settler's estate may have to travel for long distances, while the benefits of contact with the representatives of a more advanced civilization will be lost to the country at large. The advantages of contact with good natives are undoubted, and it may in certain cases be desirable to introduce a special provision for the principle which we have previously established, on forms specially adapted to suit native areas, but it can be done without assuming native superiority that the instability of these territorial rights to land reserved for the preliminary to the release of other areas for alienation. which this result might occur may be found in Tanganyika in connection with the project for the construction of a railway to the south-western border. Such a line, if it adheres to the objects of encouraging the development of the south-western portions of Tanganyika Territory, would greatly increase the opportunities of employment for the natives in an area which is now the main source of labour supply for the coal plantations in the neighbourhood of Tangu. We express no opinion as to the construction of the line; but we observe that the latter effect need consideration as well as its direct effects, so that Government may be prepared to counterbalance them if they become full.

Quality of Settlers.

Secondly, Government ought to take account of their responsibility for controlling the quality of settlers. It is of enormous importance in connection with the relation between the immigrants and the natives that the settlers—particularly in the early days—should be men who have not only the experience and material resources necessary for success, but also the qualities which will ensure that they will be just in their dealings with the natives and their own confidence and respect. Railway Policy

NATIVE DISTURBANCE AT ZANZIBAR.

Police Called Out to Disperse Rioters.

The riotous scene from the Kwanza community of Zanzibar created some month recently when many hundreds, led by their agitators, and armed with a small number of clubs, invaded the Sultan's Palace.

It is believed that they thought they had a grievance with regard to the payment of the arrears of tax for which they enjoy a moratorium of six months under a former policy.

The crowds were not admitted to the court of the Palace, where His Highness the Sultan, at the present in residence. The Senior Commissioner represented with the natives and tried to make them disperse. He agreed to meet a few of the ringleaders but, with such shouting the disturbance increased and the Acting Chief Secretary, who had also arrived from the scene, decided to send for the Police.

Arrests Effected.

Superintendent W. Warrell and Inspector Senca attempted to control the ringleaders, and eventually succeeded in arresting 15 of them. But this was only accomplished after they had been struck by both sides. The men were removed in motor cars.

Some filled with police paroled in all areas and during the afternoon hundreds of natives, both men and women, congregated near the hotel. For some time the situation appeared serious and it became necessary for the police to be called out to disperse the crowd.

New Police Powers.

CONTROL OF TRAFFIC ON COUNTRY ROADS

Recently, the "Times" correspondent of the "Standard" suggested that some kind of overhauling of public vehicles on the Port Hill road was such to call for some action on the part of the Police.

AGRICULTURE

The Agricultural Census.

Big Increases in Production.

Following is a summary of the Agricultural Census Report 1925 and in respect of the period from August 1 1923 to July 31 1925. This summary embraces the final figures and is therefore much more comprehensive than the preliminary report published last month.

The most interesting features in the report are the increases which are shown in the number of occupiers, the amount of cultivation and the increased acreage under various crops. It will be noted that the value of coffee exported rose nearly 50 per cent of the total value of agricultural exports from the Colony.

Coffee.

During the year 1925 (i.e. the year which mainly affects the agricultural production in the period under review) a general tendency to reduced crop yields and production generally, particularly in the case of cereal crops.

Area and Development.

The total area under European occupation as at July 31 1925, was returned at 4,996,606 acres, an increase over the previous year of 20,600 acres, equivalent to 5.4 per cent.

Occupancy.

The number of occupiers increased from 193,119 in 1922 to 171,071 in 1925 a net increase of 2.7 per cent.

Cultivation.

Of the total area of 4,996,606 acres occupied, 392,741 acres or 11.8 per cent is under cultivation, as compared with 312,413 acres or 10.8 per cent in the preceding year. The increase in the area under cultivation, as compared with the previous year is thus 80,198 acres or 15.6 per cent. Of this 592,741 acres under cultivation, sheep covers 96.4 per cent, sheep 16 per cent, wheat 14.9 per cent and coffee 14.3 per cent. Miscellaneous other crops and fallow 19.0 per cent.

Livestock.

The total number of European owned cattle is 216,061 as compared with 212,050 in the previous year, the increase being 1,911. Of the 216,061, 106,165 or 49.1 per cent are cows. The number of weaned sheep is returned at 119,261, an increase of 4,000. Native Sheep have, however, decreased from 23,073 in 1922 to 20,008 in 1925.

The report of wool produced from 7,413 cwt. in 1922 to 7,745 in 1925, an increase of 332 cwt. or 8.9 per cent. The total number of acres in returned at 18,122 in 1925 as compared with 17,620 in 1922.

CROPS.

177,606 acres were harvested during the year, yielding a total of 1,068,000 bags—equivalent to a country average yield of 6.13 bags compared with 7.30 bags per acre of the previous year. A total area of 215,850 acres is returned as planted as at July 31, 1925, an increase of 22,289 acres or 11.25 per cent over the previous year.

Wheat.

73,192 acres of wheat was sown during 1925—over and produced 472,306 bags or 6.45 bags per acre, an average of 2.23 bags per acre compared with 2.04 bags of the previous year. 81,420 acres of wheat in 1925 were sown in the Uasin Gishu, an increase of 4,138 acres over the previous year. It is known that further

improvements have taken place since that date.

An increase of 9,311 acres or 12.7 per cent is reported, this being the highest annual increase ever recorded, and compared very favourably with the previous year's figure of 5,542 acres or 8.14 per cent. The total area under coffee is 3,647,608 acres as compared with 3,642,000 acres—i.e. 55,608 acres, or 1.53 per cent, increase, and over 6 years 33,964 acres, or 0.92 per cent. The total production of coffee during the year was 210,611 cwt. It is estimated that the 1926 crop will produce 154,474 cwt.

Tea.

The area under tea in new ground is 4,620 acres, as against 3,855 acres or 32.4 per cent, 39,400 lbs. of tea were produced during the year, as compared with 47,700 lbs. in the previous year. It is reported that a commencement has been made in the production of factory prepared tea.

Sheep.

61,900 acres are now under stock and an area of 20,600 acres or 20.60 per cent. This also is the greatest increase yet recorded in sheep year.

Cattle.

The increase in production during 1925 is given at 18,150 tons as compared with 17,000 tons the year's output of 14,002 tons.

Labour.

The average number of units of labour employed under European cultural holdings is returned at 114,230 as compared with 107,420 in the previous year. A plentiful supply of labour appears to have been available in most districts.

Agricultural Exports.

The total value of agricultural commodities exported during the year ended July 31 1925, amounting to £2,280,402, an increase of £112,128 or 5.12 per cent over the previous year. The principal increases and decreases as compared with 1925-27 are as follows:

The increase of £606,828 or 75.5 per cent in coffee, as compared with the previous year is noteworthy.

The following shows the percentage of the principal products exported in relation to the total value of agricultural exports during the year—Coffee, 29.4; Beans, 31.8; Meats, 10.3; Hides, 8.1; Hides & Wattle, 3.9; Sheep, 2.4; and Butter, 1.7. Wheat and 1.7. All other products are represented as returned as 1.2 per cent of the total value of agricultural exports.

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New Coffee Bags.

These facts, however, are not sufficient to satisfy the Union in view of the fact that coffee is so highly sensitive to extensive odours, the using of new bags before use is a wise and necessary precaution.

Soil Experiments in the Lower Molo District.

The following official reports of the effect of green manuring, sub-soiling and liming on potato plants in the Lower Molo district has been prepared from the Agricultural Station, Molo.

The growth on the limed and sub-soiled and limed potato was good; two top crops could be grown, and the sub-soiled and limed potato showed a decided increase in the development of tubers on the roots over the control. AFRICAN OLYMPIC SPORTS.

Forthcoming Gathering at Police Grounds.

On Saturday, 26th January, the 21st African Olympic Sports will be held at the Police Grounds, Nairobi. Organized in 1926 for the purpose of stimulating and fostering sports among the African people, this Olympic has proved very successful, and each successive year has been popularly growing. The gathering is held under the auspices of the African Athletic Association, and the various districts hold their own sports prior to the main meeting, when the representatives for the Olympic gathering are chosen.

Trophies are presented for competition by various people and these are led by the districts represented by the respective winners of the year.

The Aggregative Shield is awarded by the Education Department, and this is won by the team scoring the most points. A cup is also awarded to the district securing the most firsts.

In the initial year of its formation the Aggregative Shield was won by Nakuru, who repeated their success in the following year, 1927. In 1927 the shield was won by Nairobi, and last year's winners were Nairobi B of the Police.

Nairobi is divided into three sections, these being the K.A.B., the Police and the district.

The events entered are: 100 yards flat, 220 yards, 440 yards, half mile, mile, 120 yards hurdles, relay race, obstacle race, high and long jumps, marathon (5 miles), half mar., (cable weights and light weights), and spear throwing.

In the spear throwing contest a 10-inch throwing spear of four feet six inches in length is used, with a wooden shaft and iron head. The target is a life size figure of a man standing erect, and is six feet in height. Each competitor throws five spears from a distance of twenty yards.

To date five districts have entered, these being Nairobi, (three teams), Nakuru and Kisumu. It is anticipated, however, that this number will be increased by the entries of Kapulu and Nark and teams representing the Masai Boreers and Meru.

Wireless Topics

The Crystal Set.

Installation and Working

The following is the sketch of a series of articles contributed by "Q.N.M." on the maintenance and care of wireless sets.

As the crystal sets which the I.L.U.A. Association are now distributing among its members have arrived and will arrive from England I feel that setting the wireless results that are obtainable and I must be forgiven if I go over ground already covered in one of my early articles. I understand that a considerable number are being supplied, that aerial wire and insulators are being used, and so I will deal with the erection of the aerial first before dealing with the transmitter.

Insulator first and decide where the aerial is to go. The aerial should be as high as possible and about 75 feet in length. Most gardens have a suitable tree, but a blue gum about 50 ft. high will make an excellent aerial pole. This should be well stayed and a pulley put on the top so that the wire can be lowered if necessary. A line is passed through the pulley before the pole is raised and the aerial wire attached to the top.

Take an end of the coil of wire and connect it to the top of the required length and to an insulator being the best you can get. It is not necessary to tape the wire and can be done with advantage, arranging each insulator in a row and being careful to keep the aerial being bound on to the rope. This done with the far end of the coil and now the lead in to the next consideration.

Again the near end of the aerial should be high if possible making the top horizontal and attached to the highest part of the house to get it out there. It is difficult and a second pole may be required. Where the aerial is attached to the house or second pole it must be insulated against heating the aerial to the insulator. This is done by a down lead point for it is not the point will have to be used as a faulty connection, owing to the copper wire oxidizing. This down lead should come straight to the window through which the wire is to run into the house.

The wire is attached to the "lead in" tube which is generally an iron tube about nine inches long through which the aerial wire having terminals on each end is passed. The terminal on the end of the wire is attached to the "lead in" tube leaving one terminal outside the house and one inside.

It will be noticed that the series is absolutely insulated and must not touch any part of the house or anything such as a branch of a tree. The general "I.C." of the aerial should be as open as possible and free from anything either by house wires.

I have described an ideal aerial, but it is not necessary to use a coil of wire. One can be obtained which is made of wire and has a coil on the right and left of the aerial. The twenty-five feet left over from the aerial wire should be used for your earth lead. And this lead wire can be buried some 6 inches into the ground. This small hole can be drilled through the window frame low down enough for the wire to run through and for the wire to be run through and

the crystal, by the loudest signals heard as large as possible, about a 5 or 6 foot distance. This leads above to be deep enough to take a horse shoe nail. The wire should be soldered to on each corner of a horse shoe tin (not into the ground, but soldered). It is quite a good plan to fill the tin with wax "chopped" which will retain moisture, and also to run some asbestos in the hole itself in advantageous. When the tin has been bored and the hole filled in a very liberal watering should be given, and further it should be watered as often as possible. The more moisture there is the better the earth.

Some people however are the great promoters of "water pipe running through their houses. The earth connection may be made by a water pipe, the wire being bound very tightly to the pipe which has been previously scraped very clean, or a strip may be bought which makes a good joint to a pipe.

The earth wire should be as short as possible and the water pipe is at the other end, thus there will be no current flow when taking the earth wire run right round the house, since the buried horse shoe is an earth connection.

I have said before that the aerial should not be bound to yet it should not be loose, and make sure that the metal work is not connected with any other wire which will result. If the earth lead is too close to the wire it should be covered with V.I.C. or E.P. paper which wire would do, but ordinary lighting flux as its resistance would be too high and would quickly rot.

Now that the aerial and earth are made complete, the set can be installed. The set is called "The Hrowan No. 2 Model" and will be found to be a small black finished box of irregular shape. On the top are two terminals which are marked aerial and earth. This tin is connected with a piece of insulated wire to the aerial terminal and the earth to the earth terminal. If necessary these leads should be as short as possible, and the set should be placed on a table near the window.

In between those two terminals is a loop of metal which is a slurring piece and does not concern us at all now. This is for the section of a leading coil enabling the wavelength range of the set to be increased and is used in England when listening to E.T. The high powered station of the British Broadcasting Corporation which works on a wavelength of 180 metres. The metal loop should always be inserted as the coil which is inside the box covers the wavelength of 400 metres which is the wavelength of 711 ft. This is the length of the aerial and can be kept in the set.

On the front of the box will be found two more terminals marked "aerial" and "earth". The first leads are first and you are then ready to receive.

The next thing to interest us is the crystal detector which is in the center of the box below the leading bridge, as it is called in the set. This consists of a glass tube inside which, on the left is the "cat's whisker" and on the right lead is the "lead in" tube. The wire of the wire is fixed with attached to a small metal rod on the right and has a small slide which can be moved along the top of the whisker, should it be necessary to bring some point on the surface of the crystal.

This is a delicate operation and some time should be taken in finding the point on the slide which

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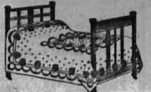
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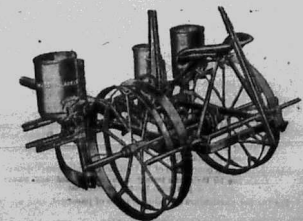
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
