TERRIFIC STORMS SWEEP BRITISH ISLES.

Naval Disaster Off Ushant.

FLEET TUG FOUNDERS IN HEAVY SEAS.

Many Lives Lost on Land Through Falling Trees.

Once again the British Isles have been visited by terrific gales, which have swept the country causing loss of life and considerable damage.

A naval tug which was on its way from Portland for Gibraltar to join the Atlantic Fleet in connection with the forthcoming manoeuvres, foundered in heavy seas off Ushant. Three officers and 20 ratings were drowned.

The Atlantic Fleet delayed putting to sea from Portland for 24 hours owing to the gale, the force of which caused some of the ships to lose their masts and other boats.

Inland telegraph and telegraph wires were blown down, windows were broken, roofs and chimneys were damaged and roads were blocked by fallen trees.

There were mountainous seas in the Channel, and lifeboats were sent out to the assistance of shipping.

Record Wind Velocity.

The gale which struck St. Germain, west of London, Jan. 11, was the most severe since the storm of 1874. The velocity of the wind in the Channel was estimated at 120 miles per hour which is a record for Britain.

Much damage was done throughout the country. Telephone and telegraph wires were blown down, windows were broken, roofs and chimneys were damaged and roads were blocked by fallen trees, by which a number of accidents were caused.

There were mountainous seas in the Channel and lifeboats were sent out to assist the distressed fishing boats. "Lami" which was seen from Dover went to sea.

The Death Roll. Four men and three women and one child died in the storm. One man died in yesterday evening and another in the morning.

Two more men have been added to the gale death-roll. They left their homes in a motor launch and disappeared.

**ROADS IN THE NYANZA PROVINCE.**  
Activities of District Council.

**VETERINARY INSTRUCTION TO NATIVES.**  
Opposition to Stock Farms in Londiani Area.

**"STANDARD" CORRESPONDENT.**  
Lumbwa.  
A full meeting of the Khamar Londiani District Council was held at Lumbwa recently. Before the business of the meeting was begun, the Council Chairman expressed his pleasure at being able to attend the meeting, and to take the chair, and explained that during the past 70 days, he had only spent 18 of these in his Province, which accounted for his inability to preside at previous meetings. The following gentlemen were duly nominated to membership of the Council during its present term of office—Lumbwa Ward—Messrs A. Cusby, and M. H. Trowell; Lumbwa South, West Ward—Mr. P. L. Pilcher.

**Wadi Border Road.**  
Further discussion took place in connection with this road. It was pointed out that the survey carried out by the Government had covered an area of 20 acres of cultivated land. The owners of this land were quite prepared to hand it over for the construction of a new road but asked that they might be given information as to the likelihood of the road being constructed in the course of 1920, in order that they might be able to take another crop off their land if it was not proposed to start the work during next year. It was pointed that the Hon. Director of Public Works should be asked to give this information.

Arising out of this information the Hon. Director of Public Works should be asked for information as to this new road, at the same time. North Lumbwa Road.  
Major Deary reported that he had been instructed by his consti-

tuents to propose that the matter of the extension of the North Lumbwa Road should be left over until all the District roads had been duly surveyed and planned. Capt. Martin explained that so far as the Government had no intention to apply for Commonwealth funds for the construction of the road in connection with the matter-up it was resolved that the Council should hold itself responsible for the North Lumbwa Road up to the Lohi River.

**Stock Farm.**  
The subject of becoming a very heavy animal. The Resident Commissioner indicated that in the view of the representatives which had been made by the various Farmers' Associations in the District, he had sent a circular to the Veterinary Officer and Mr. Lattin, asking them to help him to limit the number of cattle allowed to feed together to five heads by demanding a certificate to the effect that the number applied for would not bring his total number beyond the requisite five.

The Veterinary Officer who was present at the meeting by invitation, pointed out that it would be extremely difficult for the Administration to help in this manner as his consideration that it was essentially the business of the individual farmer. He promised, however, that he would do everything in his power to help the Magistrate in his efforts to enforce the rule.

Mr. Atkinson gave his considered opinion, as the result of 20 years residence in the country, that there could be no half measures. He felt that unless a District prohibited the number of cattle entirely, there would be no possibility of limiting the number of cattle held by individual squatters on individual farms.

Capt. Deary was not in agreement with Mr. Atkinson but felt that we should attempt to make the best of a bad business, and it was the feeling of the meeting that the matter must be left in the end to the honesty of the farmers concerned.

**Veterinary Farm, Londiani.**  
The Veterinary Officer explained that the Chief Veterinary Officer intends to develop the old Veterinary Hospital as a model stock farm for the purpose of training natives in animal husbandry, in order that they may be of greater use to the stock farmer employing them and also to help Europeans in the same respect. Captain Martin reported that the Lumbwa Farmers' Association

had passed a resolution in a most flattering manner in favour of the Chief Veterinary Officer's proposal, and for favour himself he was of the opinion that all such schemes should be established in the native reserves and not in settled areas.

Major Deary was in agreement with the Chief Veterinary Officer's proposal, and expressed his pleasure at the establishment of a school in a settled area for the purpose of training natives in animal husbandry. The Chairman explained that, so far as he understood, one member of the establishment of a school in a settled area was for the purpose of training natives in animal husbandry.

To the question raised by Captain Deary as to whether the farm was not already the property of the Veterinary Department, Mr. Lattin Saunders replied that the Londiani Farmers' Association had tried for not less than five years to get the farm allocated for European settlement. As a result, the farm was handed back by the Veterinary Department, some 10 months ago. This request from the Chief Veterinary Officer came as a thunderbolt to the settlers in Londiani, and the Londiani Farmers' Association strongly supported the action taken by the Council and its progress in presenting the action being handed back to the Veterinary Department for its purpose.

Mr. Atkinson expressed his distrust of the Government's offer of an undesirable gift. He pointed out that the Londiani District has adopted a definite policy of excluding native stock and they have not the slightest intention of going back from this policy. He felt, therefore, that although the intention of the Chief Veterinary Officer was good, it was unfortunate that he had his eyes open in an area which had determined upon the exclusion of native stock.

Mr. Deary then stated the following resolution—That this Council appreciates the suggestion made by the Chief Veterinary Officer that a farm squatter in the Khamar Londiani District should be reserved for the establishment of a farm school, but in view of the prevailing conditions in the Londiani area, the farm on which it is suggested that this school should be established is neither suitable nor acceptable for such a purpose.

Game Preservation - Precept and Example.

The Uru Vintners Association of the Kavirua District in Tanganyika addressed to us yesterday certain correspondence they have entered into with the Administration in regard to a particularly vexatious incident which they allege has taken place in the Territory. They state that a number of natives were guilty of driving a herd of elephants over a dirt 120 feet high with the most dreadful results to the animals and remaining in the incident in the Territory. They state that a number of natives were convicted of this gross brutality and were sentenced to imprisonment from three to five years with alterations of imprisonment which work at one day for every shilling of the fine. The authors organization has provided a strong protest with the Resident Commissioner of the Northern Province against what they consider to be a grossly unjust punishment for a heinous offence. We have to protest the reply given by the Provincial Commissioner to that protest but if the facts are as stated by the Uru Association we have no hesitation

in agreeing with them that the attitude of the Court to the authors convicted of brutal destruction of game is unlikely to provide any deterrent. We are aware that as a result of the publicity which the question of game preservation has created in our own colonies and in those of "The Times," the Government of Tanganyika has taken important steps to effect greater control over the slaughter of game. These regulations include the abolition of a reserve in the Serengeti Plains and the imposition of the severest penalties for hunting or even photographing game there without permission - penalties which include confiscation of transport and equipment and the liability of the offender to six months imprisonment without the option of a fine. In addition the Government has prohibited the hunting of game by the methods in common use among the natives. In organized drives, trapping, pitfalls, poisoned bait, etc. So far as legislation is concerned the Government of Tanganyika has taken every step presently necessary to stop the ruthless extermination of the game policy last year. By the matter in the Press, an enquiry was instituted from District Messrs. Some time later a letter was received from Government informing the planter that the Native Administration had been directed to issue "order cards" to the district by the Administration to assist the planter in his work of compensation and so far as it concerned the district, the following was reported:

**Railway Road**  
One of the most serious matters however, concerns the theft of motor cars, and the loss of a valuable plantain. The theft was used by the native blacksmiths to make spades, cow bells, village implements, etc. The fact that remnants of the steel rails and sleepers were found five miles from the steel plantain in the possession of blacksmiths in the district, to the effect that motor transport had been employed in the theft. It is added that when the pilferers were caught, their knowledge was at least one chief took to the attitude that the Government had no right to send police into his district, and he was the person responsible for its administration.

In the first case, the motor car was obtained, the native was in possession of it for a period of three months. In both cases the stolen property was traced to the same district, and the proceeds of sale were actually found in the blacksmiths' fire. The thefts of rails and sleepers occurred every few months but eventually the plantation owner ceased reporting them as he believed it to be of no use to do so.

**EVIDENCE OF A FOOTPRINT.**  
**Not Sufficient to Warrant Conviction.**  
**A SENTENCE QUASHED.**

Expert Evidence Needed.  
 Again, it was necessary that the prints be shown to the jury which had not been done in the present case. In the present case the prosecution had endeavored to prove that the footprint disclosed that the man of the cloth was those of a person with a deformed foot and that the accused had a deformed foot, but there was no certainty that this was so. Mr. Justice Thomas: "In other words, if a footprint of an ordinary foot was made on mud in a certain way it might give the appearance of being the impression of a deformed foot when it was not. A hand might be made by a person with a deformed foot which resembled the marks on the ground and an assumption wrongly made would be sufficient to convict the guilty person. That would be an unsafe conviction to open to the jury." Counsel: "Quite unsafe. There must be expert evidence as to how such footprints were taken. There must be additional evidence to establish the genuineness of the conviction."  
**Sentence Quashed.**  
 His Honor the Chief Justice, in delivering the judgment of the Court, said that the only evidence in the case before them supporting the Magistrate's conviction was the alleged similarity of footprints found on the floor, where the child was committed with those of the accused. An important factor relied on by the learned Magistrate was that the footprints showed that one of the feet was deformed and the convicted man had a deformed foot. The measurements and comparison of the footprints of the person who committed the theft and that of the accused were not taken and made by an expert, and there was no reliable evidence that the footprints found and those made by the accused for the purpose of comparison were made in similar circumstances. Mr. Justice Thomas said that the accused, under those circumstances it was unsafe to convict. The Court agreed with that view and the conviction and sentence were accordingly reversed and the accused discharged.

**"Jack the Ripper."**  
 He referred to the English case commonly known as the "Jack the Ripper" case. A child had been murdered and the body was found on the further side of a ditch. A man had been seen in the ditch and footprints were found. Cases were taken and by reason of the fact that the impression clearly showed the absence of certain nails and nails were found to be missing from the boots of the accused in a manner coinciding with such impressions and after careful measurements by experts a conviction was obtained and "Jack the Ripper" was sentenced having admitted his guilt.

In the case now before the Court, Counsel contended the facts were different, and he was not prepared to support the conviction or sentence. With regard to the distinction between fingerprints and footprints criminologists and experts differed in regard to their merits.

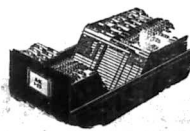
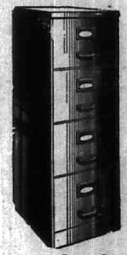

**ROADS IN THE NYANZA PROVINCE.**

After further discussion the resolution was put to the meeting and duly carried, and a vote of thanks was passed to Mr. Emerson for attending the meeting and explaining the situation of the Veterinary Department.

**Malvern-Songhor-Chumuli Road.**

A letter from the Hon. The Commissioner for Local Government in reply to the Council's last resolution on this subject was duly read.

Mr. Allen expressed the opinion that in his letter the Commissioner for Local Government had given an direct reply to the Council's resolution and had even gone back on his original promise to grant an additional £2 net rate for the maintenance of this road. He could not understand why there was any reference to the balance of the road, if that road is to be constructed, it should certainly be used for this purpose, and get offered to the Council in the nature of a gift.

With regard to the Commissioner's suggestion that, if necessary, the Council apply to the Central Roads and Traffic Board for a special grant for the maintenance of the wagon road, he felt that there must be a catch somewhere if that grant was given for 1920, we should have no guarantee that further grants would be forthcoming in future years.

He knew that the Malvern-Songhor road was originally intended to be constructed as an all-weather, all-traffic road, but he considered that the recommendation of the Hon. the Director of Public Works to the effect that this new road should be reserved for motor traffic only was a direct admission by that officer that the road could not be considered as an all-purpose road.

With regard to the new road, he pointed out that the maximum surface was already badly worn in

parts, and he could not help thinking that it would be much wiser in the new future. As this road was not capable of standing the strain of traffic, and as he was convinced that the transport of the district would be essentially confined for several years to come, he considered that both roads were absolutely essential to the settler community, and that the Council should take a firm stand and point out that it does not see the way to take on the responsibility of maintaining a road which had been constructed at a cost of £21,000 of public money, unless adequate funds were provided for the purpose.

Mr. Allen in all that he had said and pointed out that the original idea of the construction of the express road was to tap the district in which the rate of population was increasing rapidly. 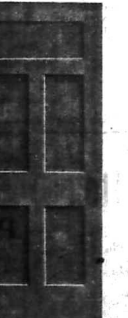

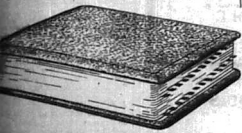

**Food Advertisers.**

**PREVENTION OF A NEW BILL.**

The current issue of the Kenya "Official Gazette" contains the text of a Bill to make provision for the prevention of adulteration of food and drugs. Representatives in regard to the provisions of the Bill are invited and it is stated that any criticisms which are submitted will receive due consideration.

The object of the Bill is to prevent the adulteration of articles of food and drugs with ingredients and materials of an inferior nature and the fraudulent sale of such articles to the prejudice of the consumer. The provisions of the Bill closely resemble those of the Food and Drugs (Adulteration) Act, 1926, of the United Kingdom. The Bill prohibits the mixing of food and drugs and prohibits the sale of articles not of the nature, substance and quality demanded.

Officers and duties are conferred for the enforcement of the provisions on local authorities and details the duties of sampling officers and procedures to be followed in the taking of samples and their submission for analysis.

Provision is made for the making of regulations prescribing standards of quality in regard to food, the control of which are liable to variation.

**Report on Past Years Working.**

**THE ANNUAL MEETING.**

The Twenty-third ordinary meeting of East African Estates, Limited, was held on Thursday, December 10, at No. 1 Broad Street Place, London, E.C.2.

The Chairman, The Rt. Hon. The Viscount Cobden, said: "In rising to move that the Directors' Report and Accounts be adopted, I would ask you, as usual, to take them in order."

As is customary, I will deal with the Balance Sheet first. The liabilities at March 31, last amounted to a few pounds more than £97,000 which is about £18,000 in excess of the corresponding figure last year. Included in this amount are Directors' fees, which have not been paid for more than three years, and a total of about £8,000 arrears due to certain directors, apart from the Dividends which other members of the Board have given to the Company's Bankers. It is hoped by the issue of debentures or otherwise, at latter convenient date, to crystallize these various liabilities.

The Profit and Loss Account shows a profit for the year of £8,000 less £1,000 for the balance sheet available for New Year presents and have credited these down to show a very small margin of profit.

This asset is set out rather more fully than in previous balance sheets, but no alteration has been made in essence.

With regard to the investments, the British Colonial Provision Company, Limited, continues to make good progress. We received a dividend of 5½ per cent less tax, on our holding of roughly £100,000 of the paid up Capital. A similar dividend is forecasted for the current year.

Recently the Kenya Government conveyed a tender for the Pig Industry, and after a due examination of the proposals of the tenderer, the Conference recommended a reduction in selling prices to the extent with a corresponding reduction in the price paid to the farmer by the factory.

Our investment in Central Office (Nairobi) Station, Limited still stands at the whole of the £25,000 and £1,000 shares out of £30,000 shares of £1 each issued.

On the other side of the Balance Sheet appears the Property in Kenya, valued (as last year) at £99,500. In accordance with the Companies Act, 1929, the description of the "lease of vacant" property

for the future success of this undertaking, and has placed a value on the property which justifies the balance sheet figure.

As reported to you last year, Evans Brothers (Kenya) Limited, have reduced their Capital by withdrawing £100,000 of the shares which were previously of twenty shillings nominal value.

Our interest in this Company consists of the whole issue of £250,000. Seven per cent Debentures and 80,000 Shares, out of an issued capital of 147,000 shares.

The past year or two have been a period of anxiety both for the management in Kenya and for your Directors in London.

According to the "East African Standard," the "Daily Mail," K.C.B., F.R.S., J.L.D., Chief Scientific Adviser to the Board of Agriculture, who has been acting as Chairman of an Agricultural Commission appointed by the Kenya Government, said: "Developmental work takes place during the last quarter of a century, but I think the agricultural wealth of the Colony has only been identified at the surface."

A little earlier when the members of the British Association were returning from their Conference in South Africa, Sir Robert Greg, LL.D., F.R.S., Chairman of the Southern Board of Agriculture, one of the number visiting Nairobi, and (according to the "East African Standard")—"As the same age has seen many other countries, many of them areas, in the same stage of development as Kenya is today, it seems to me incredible that the country should have anything but a magnificent future."

In conclusion I would like to record, on behalf of the Board, our continued appreciation of the services rendered by Colonel Taylor and staff.

The Director's Report and Accounts were adopted and the retiring Directors and Auditors re-elected.

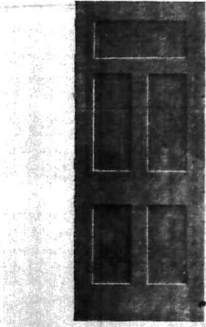

#### MAIARIA

To the Editor "E.A. Standard."—I would like to make a suggestion in regard to malarial fever which may help in curing the problem. It will be tested thoroughly on a sensitive horse to find out the percentage of test and therapy there is in it.

Twenty-six years ago I lived in places where I got few malarial fevers and I had a lot of people to visit those places, and the people there told me they do not get malarial fever as it is unnecessary.

For the last few years I have been living in what was once one of the most malarial places in the world and as a result, we never get malarial fever.

After studying the problem we could only come to one conclusion:

that dipping the cattle had some connection with the malarial fever. From the malarial section and from many theories to solve, not one of which would have thoroughly investigated.

When we happened to be far away from a dipping tank we put a number of malarial fever patients in the first few nights, then there was no malarial fever. It could only be due to the poisoned water being drunk from the malarial fever tanks were covered with the malarial fever water.

At the conclusion came to be the result of over 20 years' experience, I think it is worth a scientific trial.

I can only go by advice on European matter and I have had some experience in this matter. The malarial fever patients were perfect for a malarial epidemic before dipping was introduced, and after a few years of regular dipping the malarial fever was still there, but a wonderful difference in the health of the natives especially the women folk and children.

At the conclusion came to be the result of over 20 years' experience, I think it is worth a scientific trial.

### Nairobi Town Planning.

#### DIFFICULTIES OF OWNERS OF PROPERTY

The question of property owners in Nairobi developing their plots in a manner that may ultimately be found to disagree with the Town Planning Authority proposals was recently the subject of discussion by the Corporation and members have been suggested to meet this difficulty.

At a recent meeting of the Municipal Town Planning and Public Health Committee, Nairobi, the question was discussed by the fact that property owners were not being put to the expense of surveys in consequence of the fact that the results of their plots which it was found did not agree with the Authority's town planning proposals there were few owners who were not in a position to be proceeded with development proposals.

It was left to the Council's representatives to take the question into their own hands. The Nairobi Town Planning Authority and Public Health Committee were asked to put to the Council to recommend the publication of a list of property owners to make them aware of the fact that they were being surveyed by the Authority and to advise them accordingly with development proposals.

The Council's representatives were also requested to draw attention to certain cases where their development schemes, prepared in accordance with the town planning proposals, were not being approved by the Council.

The above report by the Committee was adopted by the Council on 10th January.

### LOCUSTS POSITION IN KENYA

#### Hoppers Reaching Flying Stage.

#### WARNING TO FARMERS

Locust hoppers are now reaching the flying stage, and farmers and natives, particularly in the Machakos district, are warned to expect swarms by the end of the month. Single flies should be prepared to deal with all crops. Destruction of hoppers and young locusts should be continued as far as the Government staff.

The following is the departmental report on the work effected in January 15.

Reports now indicate that several young flies are appearing in isolated districts, but are not as yet leaving the areas where hoppers remain. They are now occasionally noted with the hoppers.

Some fear is now entertained as to what the locust position is in the inaccessible parts of the district. It is impossible to carry out any method of hopper destruction on an economical scale. It is probable that flying swarms will emanate from these areas.

#### Hopper Area.

At Northern Province. The examination of stores and equipment inspected will have been completed. Hoppers are reported from near Nairobi. No signs of malarial fever are reported from near Nairobi.

Kenya. There has been a large concentration of hoppers and young flies on both banks of the Nairobi River. Farmers are taking place and great destruction is being carried out.
