PLANTS FAIL TO SURVIVE AT HIGHER ALTITUDES.

Nairobi-Grown Seed Equals Chinese in Oil Content.

At the beginning of this week the "East African Standard" published an article on Tung Oil—the new Imperial industry which is attracting the attention of Kenya and the Empire Marketing Board.

Simultaneously the "Standard" asked what had been done in Kenya in view of the fact that in the opinion of many varnishes and, until America experimented successfully, had always been supplied from China.

The Kenya Forestry Department, which is apparently the responsible authority in Kenya, has supplied the "Standard" with the following statement which shows that not entirely encouraging progress—but the oil content of the seed is being investigated.

The Forestry Department states that seeds of *Alseis Black Olive* and *Alseis white Olive* were planted in the Imperial Institute and the Kenya Forestry Department, Harare, in 1917.

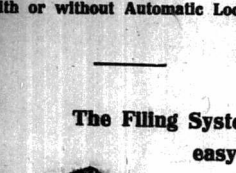

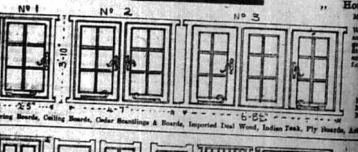

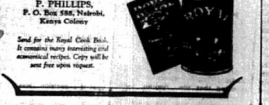

WIRELESS IN EAST AFRICA.

NOTES ON RADIO SUBJECTS.

Recent Rapid Developments.

The "E. A. Standard" has arranged for the regular publication of a wireless page. Three articles, written by Mr. Lionel J. Hughes, a well-known Kenya radio authority will appear weekly.

Radio, or Wireless, as it is popularly termed, has made great strides during the last three years—and this is particularly noticeable in East Africa. It is a mere three years since attention was drawn, through the medium of the Press, to the possibilities of listening to broadcasting in Kenya. Two stations stand out during this period—K.T.L. the station belonging to Messrs. Phillips Lamoy Works at Thika, and belonging to 30.5 metres and 5KAF the African Station at Schomburgk.

There are three great divisions of Radio interests. The Commercial. These include Government, Naval and Military interests, point-to-point services, ship-to-shore services and the Radio manufacturing trade generally.

Recently, we have had the broadcast. Not only do the studios the actual broadcasting of musical entertainment. But also the broadcasting of Press and radio signals such as in the case of the Lusitania and Dornier Italia.

The Amateur.

The third division is the amateur, which includes the Experimentalist. This is a large and useful class. The first amateur of this class in Kenya before the public eye was a Signor Marconi. It must be remembered that it was not until the work of amateurs that radio waves were developed. They were first recognized by the Washington Convention held, as later discussions it has been definitely laid down that they have the right to wavelengths. To this, we have the precedent of amateur photographers, motorists, who are allowed to assist although they have professional counterparts.

In East Africa we have four stations performing coast station work, owned by their respective Governments—Zanzibar VTC, Pemba VTC, Tanganyika VTC and Mombasa VTC. These are mainly ship-to-shore communications for the benefit of their respective ports. For the publication carries three in Nairobi—Radio VTC, which works direct to a companion station in England on 15 metres. It is also an alternative route to England via the cable service.

In broadcasting we have the station at Nairobi (T.L.), which has a broadcast frequency on 805 and 31.5 metres. Other stations that may be heard are G.W. at Chakama, England, 5KAF at Schomburgk, G.P.V. at Entebbe, East Africa, known and one or two Australian stations. There are also short wave stations and it is rarely possible to hear the stations on the normal broadcast band although on very rare occasions T.L.O. and Dornier month have been heard and also the South African stations.

The amateur fraternity has been well represented by Messrs. Hall, 2385, Cox (G.E.), Fox, L.M., Ferguson (S.H.), Dow (L.T.) to mention a few, who with a power of 40 watts—that is one twentieth of a horsepower, a power no danger of the smallest one or motor-cycle motor does to run—have worked Mombasa, Africa, America, Australia, Brazil, etc. etc. mostly on the 15 metre wave. They have proved that they communication is possible between all the big towns of East Africa and that it is possible to establish a reasonably reliable system of working to these islands.

Reception of signals as short as 10 metres has been successfully accomplished although there is no record as yet of actual communication two-way on the wavelength.

These notes will claim for the present include a bare mention of the articles of items of interest to the professional community, items of general interest to the broadcasting public, notes on apparatus for the beginner, hints for the man who wishes to construct his own, South African Radio Hobbies League, Division of the East African Radio Club, and any answers to general questions.

It is somewhat difficult to avoid technicalities in radio articles and the class who takes up radio for the first time will find that he has a whole new set of terms to know and understand, even if he only relates to the local station and knows nothing or sees less to how or why his set works.

The two first items that occur in radio are what are known as time and wavelength. In this we will follow the laws laid down by the International Convention.

Time Signs.

Time will be given in what is known as Greenwich Mean Time, G.M.T., which is the winter time of England. The reason for this is that it is in general use all over the world and is G.M.T. on 31st December is the same in North America as it is in England.

Time will be referred to as local time if it will be referred to as local time if necessary a three hours indication of G. M. T. is, 1900 is 11 a.m. here. Greenwich Mean Time is always reckoned on the twenty-four hour system, used on the Continent, that is by a group of four figures the first two referring to the hour and the last two to the minutes. 1 p.m. is hours as 18 hours, 11 p.m. as 23 hours. Thus we would represent five minutes to seven a.m. as 0655, half past four p.m. as 1630.

Wavelength.

Wavelength, again following the Convention, this will be referred to as frequency followed by the appropriate wavelength in brackets. Thus Nairobi Radio will be represented as transmitting broadcasting on 750 K.C. (400 and 2000 K.C. (151.5)—that is to say 750 Kilocycles (400 metres) and 2000 Kilocycles (151.5 metres).

For those who wish for the exact time, the time signals from Paris can be heard on 5275 K.C. (56.1) at 1800 to 2000 hours G.M.T. (11 a.m. local) every evening. There are three time signals and the last of the set dots is usually 1800, 1900 and 2000. These are followed by variable time signals which is a series of dots practically a second apart.

THE SPIRIT OF THE ADMIRABLE CRICHTON.

Sport and the Character of a People.

WHAT THE GAME OF RUGBY TEACHES US.

Team Work in Life as Well as in Play.

The value of team work in life as well as in sport was the moral behind a lecture delivered to the pupils of the European School, Nairobi, on Friday afternoon by Mr. J. G. Finlay, at present touring the Colony as a member of the South African Universities party. This was one essential to the game of Rugby, and that was team work. It was combination and the development of instruments that lead to success.

The sport of a people provides an indication to the character. The greatness of Great Britain is often ascribed to have its foundation on the playing fields of our public schools, and perhaps that is not so remote as some would have it. During his address, Mr. Finlay emphasized something of this fact while outlining the progress and development of the game since its inception.

A SOUND MIND IN A SOUND BODY.

Nothing is more indicative of the character of a people than its attitude to and accomplishment in the field of sport. The wonderful part played by it in the future of a country has always been more clearly demonstrated in the pages of history. Rome gave itself up to proficiency and cast aside sport, it perished as so Greece. The greatness which was its because no more, but like the overflow on the river vanished and a tide of degeneracy. Greece then said her accomplishment in the field and gradually sank into oblivion. The other side of the picture is depicted by the story of Great Britain. Today the glories of the Empire can be said to be founded on the traditions of the playing fields of the country. Every virtue and chapter of our national life emanates from the sporting interest which has been passed down to us as a glorious heritage.

Something of what sport has meant, and what it has done right through the ages was recounted by Mr. J. G. Finlay, the Rugby Rugby was the subject of the lecture in the course of a lecture to the pupils of the European School on Friday afternoon. There he played a large part in the lives of the people of Rome and Greece in the days of their prosperity.

The Admirable Crichton.

There was an old Eton saying to the effect more or less a corymbous head. An ancient would in a moral body. That was one of the great things we sport because it helped one to do his or her work well. They must remember that one was the complement of the other, and that neither was to be neglected. Some three years ago the world played sport and drove all other work to the detriment of their work. Sport, continued Mr. Finlay did not do for them. It kept them physically fit, and that was the greatest debt they owed to it. other two districts, and a number of plants were raised successfully in the Aberdeenshire and Inverclyde areas in 1932. The rainfall at Nairobi averages about 30 inches. In dry weather there is no rain temperature becomes very high, but the nights are cold with a minimum temperature of about 42 F.

A Plot.
Tung trees were sown successfully and in soil enriched with a small amount of superphosphate. The plot has been covered by treatment with Rabba cotton. The plants were sown in two slightly different situations (rows) situated on a slight slope. One row was sown on the north-east slope of the slope and had drainage of the soil, and the other row was sown on the south-east slope of the same and had no drainage of the soil. The average height of these plants is about 8 feet. The others were planted the beginning of a slope. The plants have suffered little from "die-back". Their average height is about 30 feet. The first group began fruiting in 1937 and fruiting again in 1938. The second group is coming into leaf bearing this year.

Oil Yield.
The seeds were examined at the Imperial Institute in 1927 and were found to yield 20% oil. The seeds from Chinese sources were found to give a slightly higher yield of all of the same substance. The 20% oil substance can be made from one set of experiments. It may be separated for Algeria. The seeds yield about 25% oil by the use of the upper limit of successful culture. The seeds are very hard, and require a long time to break before they are ready to be sown. It will appear that the plant has a very good, but not a very high, oil content. The few trees have not yet borne any crop to date.

It has been pointed out that the seeds from outside the Colony that are being sown are of a different variety. It has been distributed throughout the Colony.
The poor germination observed is partially due to the short period of viability of the seed.
It should be stated that the suitability of growing either of the two species as a commercial proposition is not yet proved.

Nairobi Hospital.

For more than ten years the people of Nairobi and the Government of Kenya have been looking with the principle of associating the public in the responsibility for the Nairobi Hospital. During the long period of demerit and barren discussion, several important things have emerged. In the first place it has become clear that the Government is not aware from the suggestion that the public should share in the control and direction of the Hospital. Secondly, the term of cooperation by the public has increased down to one or two main proposals, such as the creation of a Hospital Board, representative of the Government and the citizens, and a joint system of raising funds to defray the contributions by the State through an insurance or other scheme. This is a valuable basis for further discussion, which is being followed by the Nairobi Association which is an eminently representative machinery for the conveying of their own affairs to the Government. It is necessary to carry the apparently general consent they have given to the present account the whole responsibility for the Nairobi Hospital rests on the Government.

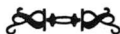

REVISION OF CUSTOMS TARIFF.

It is hereby notified for public information that at the Governors' Conference held at Nairobi on 7th January, 1930, the following resolution was adopted—

(1) That a Customs Tariff Revision Committee be appointed at once with the following terms of reference—
(a) To examine in detail the existing Customs Tariff common to Kenya, Uganda, Tanganyika Territory on the light of experience gained in its operation during the past six years, and to recommend such alterations as may be deemed necessary in the national interests of all concerned subject to the proviso that no serious diminution in the revenue accruing to the several territories is entailed and that the duties on articles specially protected through the medium of the Customs Tariff are outside the scope of the enquiry.

(2) To take into consideration the following matters, namely—
(a) The specific rates of duty under Table I of the Tariff in the light of current rates as compared with those existing in 1928 when the existing Tariff was formed.

(b) The duty imposed on vehicles and parts and accessories thereof, with special reference to motor tractors, special wagons, delivery vans, and parts and accessories thereof.

(c) Any alteration or modification in the tariff which may from time to time have been suggested to the several administrations or which may be submitted to the Committee either by memorandum or oral evidence.

(3) To take into consideration such matters as may be administered to be desirable.

(4) To examine the possibility of formation of a permanent Interim Board and to make recommendations as to be referred to the personnel of such a Board and the scope of its activities.

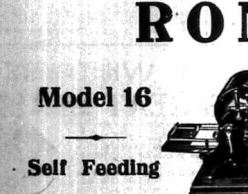

TARIF COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

Associated Chambers to Take No Action.

PROTEST FROM UGANDA.

["Standard" Special Correspondent.]

The Associated Chambers of Commerce at the session last week decided, in view of the notification contained in the communication issued by the Conference of Governors that decisions had been reached on subjects within the purview of the Tariff Committee Report, and, moreover, that these subjects were especially excluded from the terms of Reference to the Official Tariff Committee, that these subjects would be served by further discussing the Report.

The procedure did not altogether meet with the approval of Mr. Aronson (Eastern Province) who considered that Nairobi was sitting on the fence "and not taking the sense arising from the Report. He referred to the Tariff Report issued by the Uganda Government which was the full and considered view of Uganda.

Mr. Tamahili was rather inclined to agree with Mr. Aronson, but did not think the present session of the Association was sufficiently representative enough to give any great weight to any decision, even if they did discuss it, and it is understood that on his subject this idea is a little difficult to deal with them from the capital, where Government Departments, information offices were readily available.

Mr. T. A. Wood (Nairobi) and his views on the subject, which he had held for years very well known and they had not altered.

A Dangerous Suggestion.

In view of the notification in the official communication issued by the Conference of Governors to the effect that decisions have been reached upon the subjects falling within the purview of the report of the Kenya Tariff Committee and moreover that these subjects are especially excluded from the terms of reference of the Official Tariff Committee the Association resolves that no useful purpose could be served by its further discussing these matters until such time as the details of the Government decision are available except to the Uganda Tariff Committee. The Executive is accordingly instructed to keep the matter pending until decisions of the Government are known and are accordingly available for discussion by constituent chambers or as a motion if necessary specially considered.

New Criminal Code.

ATTITUDE OF EAST AFRICAN CHAMBERS.

["Standard" Special Correspondent.]

The question of the new Criminal law came before the half yearly session of the Associated Chambers of Commerce at Eldoret on Wednesday. The opinion of constituent chambers had been obtained and it appeared that the following Chambers were in favour of the new criminal code: Uganda (Kampala), Mombasa, Nairobi and Eastern Province Chamber (Uganda).

Eldoret and Mombasa Chambers were in favour of the new code. The Mombasa Chamber of Commerce were divided in opinion and the Tariff Chamber of Commerce were unable to express an opinion and are decided to inform the Executive that the Association could not give definite information. A lengthy communication had already been addressed to Government by the Nairobi Chamber incorporating the views and expressions of opinion received from other Chambers.

Registration of Taxes.

THE HEED FOR A GREAT AND SIMPLE SYSTEM.

["Standard" Special Correspondent.]

Whether or not the law and the regulations laid required amending in Kenya came to the notice of the Government. The matter has already been discussed by the Nairobi Chamber and a majority and minority report from that Chamber was before the session by Mr. H. W. Payson.

Reports from Uganda indicated that in that country a modified form of the Torrens Act, which obtained in Australia, was in force, and also the case in Tanganyika. It is maintained that this system gives security of title, by way of Government guaranteed title after investigation combined with cheap and simple transfer.

The Nairobi Chamber majority report whilst not specifically called for the Torrens system said that some simple form of registration and transfer should be available which, it was maintained, was of the case under the existing system.

The minority report prepared by a lawyer held that the existing trouble was due to the fact that two systems of registration and transfer were in force and that the difficulty could be largely overcome by concentrating on one system alone.

The Mombasa Chamber owing to peculiar circumstances existing at the Coast considered that the Torrens system of registration was the most satisfactory and the Torrens system of the Coast area had offered the opinion that it was in the Highlands required amendment and simplification.

It was considered that the reports and data collected by the Nairobi Chamber fully covered the matter and the Association approved the majority report of that Chamber and instructed the Executive to forward it to the Secretary General together with the information obtained from the adjoining territories.



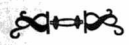

REVISION OF CUSTOMS TARIFF.

It is hereby notified for public information that at the Government's Conference held at Nairobi on 7th January, 1926, the following resolution was adopted:

- That a Customs Tariff Revision Committee be appointed to deal with following terms of reference—
- (1) To examine in detail the existing Customs Tariff common to Kenya, Uganda and Tanganyika Territory in the light of experience gained in the operation thereof in the past 102 years and to recommend such alterations as may be deemed necessary in the mutual interests of all concerned subject to the proviso that no serious disturbance of the duties on sundries specially protected is entailed and that the Customs Tariff see outside the scope of this enquiry.
 - (2) To examine in particular the following matters, namely—
 - (a) the specific rates of duty under Table I of the Tariff in the light of current prices as compared with those ruling in 1922 when the existing Tariff was formed;
 - (b) the duty imposed on imported goods and accessories thereof, with special reference to motor trucks, speed wagons, delivery vans, and parts and accessories thereof;
 - (c) the duty on proprietary medicines and other items over which difficulties of interpretation have been experienced;
 - (d) the duty imposed on imported goods and accessories thereof from time to time have been suggested to the several administrative or other officials or notified to the Committee either by memorandum or oral evidence.
 - (3) To take oral evidence of agents custom as may be considered to be desirable.
 - (4) To examine the possibility of formation of a permanent Inter-Colonial Board in which recommendations in regard to the personnel of such a Board and the scope of its activities.

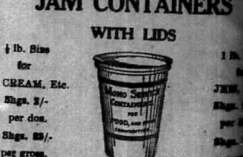
