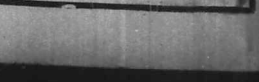

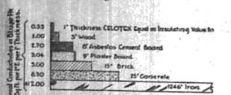

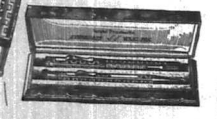

Armed with this simple but effective tool, one can stand at a quiet respectability and clean the mud and water off. No chance of dirt or mud getting on the body, and no need of a bucket of clean water as used in the conventional method.

Treatment of Bodywork.
Mud on the wing, particularly that which accumulates on the front, will not wash off so readily as the mud on the rear. For the benefit of folk who like to do the thing properly and who have at their command a wash-water which is clean and free from mud, the following advice is given: Start on the underparts of the car, and allow the hose to play liberally on the mud-up mud. If sufficient pressure of water is available, no other means will be required to dislodge the mud. Alternatively, a wooden scraper will be found useful. Having finished with the wings, attention should be turned to the wheels.

Wire wheels are much easier to tackle if jacked up or, better still, completely removed, and a good spoke brush, together with a liberal supply of water, is essential. The same generally necessitates the use of a special brush if absolute cleanliness is aimed at. Nothing prevents this success starting in right away by buying a mop. It is the first step towards a better and brighter car in winter.

(Continued from page 1.)

Various categories, but allowed the transfer of tonnage from one category to another after giving 30 days notice.

Comprehensive Acceptance.
Mr. Wilson continued to say that the United States in 1929 had accepted the French proposal because though it considerably favored category limitations, it recognized the tendency of coastal routes towards equalization.

Mr. Farley explained that the French idea was to render the system simple and adaptable to the needs of all countries.

Mr. A. V. Alexander (British) emphasized Britain's opposition with the United States and Japan in regards to the category system, and said that Britain favored the division of tonnage into capital ships, aircraft-carriers, cruisers, destroyers and submarines, and desired that tonnage should be divided into two types, firstly above six-thousand tons and secondly six-thousand tons and under. An important feature in this classification proposal was the strict limitation of maximum tonnage to each unit within each category.

Transfer of Tonnage.
As a result of preliminary explanations of the problem, Britain was prepared to consider some system of the transfer of tonnage provided it only applied to those powerful ships. It is hoped that this would assist other countries to fit in their requirements in the form of a general disarmament convention.

Mr. Macdonald in winding up the debate intimated that the Conference could not pass resolutions by majority.

The resolution was then carried unanimously.

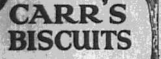

SHOULD FERTILISERS BE GUARANTEED?

Convention Discusses State Control.

ONTS ON THE FARMER.

"That it is resolved that in view of the increase in the use of artificial fertilisers in the Colony, and also of the fact that the present introduction legislation is inadequate to meet the needs of the farmer, it is recommended that the Government should consider the advisability of introducing legislation to regulate the sale and use of artificial fertilisers."

With the consent of the meeting he added two words to that to the effect "and limit" after the words "and limit" in the words "compulsory for fertilisers."

Fertilisers, he said, were being increasingly used. In every part of the local Press there were advertisements for "chemical fertilisers." The Agricultural Department had formed the opinion that many of those advertised fertilisers were of no use. The speaker admitted that it was up to the buyer to find out about the quality of the material, but he thought legislation in that respect would be beneficial.

It was no by any means a revolutionary measure. Experiments of that kind were already in force in other Colonies and Dominions, where such legislation was of great benefit to Farmers. Farmers wished for the sale of fertilisers which were really of use, and that was generally what they got.

Mr. A. E. Beiler maintained that such legislation was not absolutely necessary. If an Act were passed making it imperative for the importer to have authentic guarantees, sent with his waybills, with no acceptance by Customs and subordinate at the port unless a copy of that guarantee came in with the consignment, he thought that would meet the case. There were, after all, no fertilisers at present being made in the Colony. His suggestion would also reduce the cost of administering such an Act to practically nil.

Mr. T. K. Norton although in sympathy with the motion, said he was going to oppose it. The Act he had in mind was not the young to bring in such a measure. Again, analyses of fertilisers were very dangerous. Proper analysis would have to be made.

would have to be employed by Government, else an opportunity would be given to the unscrupulous dealer. When the country was able to afford to import large quantities of chemicals, and was three, four, five times as large as now, I might suggest the time to consider such an Act. A farmer to lose such a large amount of money as he has lost, would be to buy from a reputable dealer, and use the standard fertilizer.

Major F. de Jager also spoke in opposition. He did not think the case of that sort of thing would come on the Government. It was up to the farmer to see what he wanted his land. All depended on the type of soil of the particular district, and the farmer was to judge for himself.

The Official View. The Hon. Director of Agriculture was asked to give the details of the last two or three years a report on the use of artificial fertilisers in the Colony. He was asked to state whether the use of artificial fertilisers in the Colony had increased or decreased in any large extent. The statistics, he said, were not available. He had been before various different bodies at different times. A Government Committee had recommended that action should be taken.

He would emphasize the point that the fact that there had been given did not mean that such a fertilizer was necessarily suitable for a particular soil for any particular crop. He felt that the position in different countries today with regard to the sale of fertilisers was very different indeed to that obtained some years ago. The Director supported the view that farmers could protect themselves by buying from reputable firms, most of which, as he pointed out, already gave analyses themselves to the purchaser.

There had been a very substantial advance with regard to the standardization of the quality of fertilisers themselves. He was not aware that farmers had suffered in the Colony from the importation of worthless fertilisers if they had used such fertilisers. There he suggested that the responsibility was of their own choice. They might seek advice from a quarter where it was most readily given (he said). If such an Act were passed, he did not think the Agricultural Department would be found wanting, but he would guard against the possibility of such an Act that the cost of such an Act would probably be in the neighbourhood of £1,000 to £1,500 a year.

Mr. T. A. K. Turton (Nandi) asked why such legislation had been found necessary in other countries, such as South Africa.

The Hon. Director of Agriculture replied that other countries who had used such fertilisers, though some time had not been, when it was introduced, in the position of Kenya today, with all services available, and with the farmer in a position, he did not think they would have pressed for such legislation.

SYSTEM TO REVEAL.

Veterinary matters occupied a considerable amount of time at the sitting of the Convention of Associates on Wednesday afternoon, and for the remainder on this subject the Chief Veterinary Officer and the Director of Agriculture were present.

It was unfortunate that no member of the Thomson's Park Veterinary Association being present, it was necessary to read a paper standing in their name to be presented to a resolution of the meeting from other districts who supported the proposal merely for the sake of discussion.

Mr. W. N. Newton (Kisumu) proposed the following resolution: "That this Convention recognize the position of the Honorary Permit Issuers, and that all such Permits be issued by officers of the Veterinary Department only."

Mr. Newton said that his Association had been formed in 1910, but he considered that the Convention had with advantage given the subject a second consideration. Mr. King (Kisumu) seconded the motion and said that there was something to be said in favour of it. It would be desirable to restrict the issue of permits by the fact that permits had been issued by uneducated people, and so dirty cattle had been brought into a clean area. He thought the greatest error should be taken in permitting people to issue permits as in the past there had sometimes been trouble caused by youthful members of the Association and Police Officers.

The Director of Agriculture (Major Keyes) was of the opinion that the House in the matter. One or two, however, had referred to the work of administration. This he did not propose that the Act should be administered by the Department of Agriculture. It would be an offence to sell cattle except under the conditions laid down. It would be an offence which could be dealt with by the police as usual with offence. The same was on the individual himself who would if necessary take the matter up, but he would not do so until he had the matter up with the conditions. He was not referring to imported fertilizer at all. There would be no use for the Department to consider the case of the putting of the Act. The case was the purchaser to see that the warranty was carried out.

quite some of experience were better able to issue permits than Government officials who might be situated a distance of 40 miles away from the applicant.

Mr. Housley (Drobo) said he had been advised of complaints against officials who had issued permits wrongly, but he had received several complaints against Government permit issuers.

On the suggestion of Captain Housley the Chief Veterinary Officer, Major Bransby said he had been asked to find out what had been done in the past on the agenda paper. He had done so and had found that the Honorary Permit Issuers were selected by the District Councils and were very carefully examined when they were submitted to the Veterinary Department. It was essential that they should be fully conversant with the movement of cattle in their areas. The Honorary Permit Issuers submitted to the Veterinary Department they were very carefully scrutinized. Generally speaking the Department were having the desired effect.

Major Adam (Kisumu) said that if there were Honorary Permit Issuers he thought that he would have no objection to their being issued, but he thought that it might have to send very good districts to get permits from the Veterinary Officer.

Mr. Walter (Nandi) opposed the motion on behalf of the Thomson's Park Veterinary Association. His area, he said, was about 1,000 square miles and there was one Stock Inspector stationed at Kisumu. The adoption of the suggestion contained in the resolution would mean that settlers would need to send 20 or 30 miles to get a permit to move their cattle. He spoke as an old Honorary Permit Issuer of many years' standing and said although a lot of inconvenience was caused to himself by having the work of issuing permits was caused to himself by the fact that it was essential to the health of the country. He thought that it was essential to the health of the country.

Mr. King (Kisumu) said he was of the opinion that the Department of Agriculture expressed the appreciation of his Department to the valuable services of Honorary Permit Issuers who were believed to be extremely careful in the exercise of their duties. In the 10 years he had been in the office he only remembered two cases in which permits which had been wrongly issued had caused serious consequences and in neither of those cases had the permit been issued by a permit issuer. In addition, in his opinion, the system was quite impracticable.

Mr. King (Kisumu) said he was not in any way opposed to the present system, but he supported the resolution for the purpose of discussion. The motion was then put and carried.

A CAUSEUR OF AFFAIRS.

Leaves From a Sportsman's Diary.

A REVIEW OF CURRENT EVENTS.

Several years before the war when Prince were admitted to the Rugby Championship, I remember that they were thought of very few people who ever thought the time would come when they would win the Championship. Now they have already defeated Scotland and Ireland, and as England are not considered to have a great team this year, though good enough to beat Wales, there is no reason why they should not win all their matches and emerge Champions for the first time in their rugby history.

To say that the majority of spectators at the Test last Saturday were disappointed with the display of the Kenya side is to put it mildly. A defeat was expected but not such an overwhelming one of nearly 50 points. If the spectators were disappointed, what must the visitors have known that a great amount of care and trouble was taken in selecting the best possible side. Owing to injuries one or two of the original selections were unable to turn out, but probably weakened the team to a certain extent. I was pleased to see in Mr. Finlay's address on rugby that in discussing the Kenya side, he referred to the fact that some people were under the impression that our forwards were good and the backs were the main cause of the heavy defeat. Mr. Finlay held the reverse opinion, though without exactly considering the backs group, they did as much as they had the opportunity of doing, and, after all, that is all any player can do, as much as the other fellow will allow him. The game has no doubt been thoroughly discussed among all rugby men and also in the Press so it is useless to revive arguments but after making a close study of the game, it may be allowed to vote one or two personal opinions.

In the first place, the three wingers and halves undoubtedly let gaps for the opposing backs to make for us, good players.

Who would find gaps in many other teams than Kenya. One has to take into consideration that our opposition are some of the most rugged players in the South and, no doubt, will be found to have a very good back-up. However, let us get back to Saturday's game and one Kenya forward truthfully say that he never trusted the scrum half of the Students but alone any of the other backs. Gibbs was chosen as our scrum half to pick up the ball at set-piece, run round the scrum and distribute the ball that had not been touched off, that means that the inside centre in the absence of some forward had to take the scrum half who, having left his "side" still looking for the ball, bent the stand off, and drove the centre, had no time to do his job and a score was bound to come. Not one did any of our forwards make any attempt to cut across and tackle an opposing three in possession.

Faith in Consistency.
This leading loss was terribly slow, several times the ball was even touched back; perhaps they were so little of it that they wanted us to keep it for a while. However, I am not blaming the forwards for everything, the backs were far more to blame for the simple reason that as I mentioned before, they were only allowed to play as well as the other side would let them. Here I think the selectors made a mistake in selecting two players of whom I had never been "washed dry" in my time on the field. Why not put their faith in somebody like Halloway, Hilditch, and even Bridgman of Nairobi, have O'Brien and Mottrell to give the line a bit of speed and I fancy they will put up a better show than that of the weak.

A Reply.
Before leaving the subject of rugby I would just like to refer to another statement of Mr. Finlay and that is he hoped this visit would be beneficial to the young players of Kenya. In reply to Mr. Finlay I should like to say that the "old" ones (our present players) are very grateful for the exceptionally fine exhibition of rugby shown by the Students but, as for the young ones, there "aren't." I was talking to an old and experienced player after the match on Saturday, and we were discussing the probable gap of the Kenya side and for the coming season, several young players were named.

"Where are they?" Rugby is always without doubt one of the benefits of the Students' visit but how many times has it been noted that the season would have been had it been taken by young players at the beginning of the season.

English Cup.
It is a remarkable thing that one very often finds teams occupying the lower positions in the English League doing well in the Cup. Newcastle United are in dire straits of relegation but are still fighting in the Cup. In fact, these two it is doubtful whether they deserve to go for in the Cup; every match was a mass of errors, but to be played and injuries are bound to occur more so in Cup matches than in League. Even the winning of the Cup would certainly compensate them for the loss a game should they be in Division II. The Arsenal are getting popular here for the thousands paid out; their record in the League is very moderate and last Saturday they would only draw at home to Walsingham, and should the replay be lost their chance about the end of the season will no doubt show a considerable loss. What I mean really overcomes Leeds United as so many boys fancy for the Cup. For several years past the team that have beaten the Yorkshire Club have either been in the first or second division but a London team will be in the first and it won't be Arsenal or Millwall.

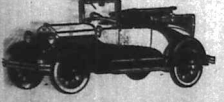

A Convention carried the motion affirming the principle, but the Commissioner, although in agreement believed that any official proposal to extend the period of service would result in mass discharges.

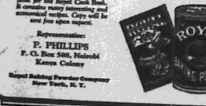
