The Swahili Coast and its People.

BY MISS ALICE WERNER OF NEWHAM COLLEGE, CAMBRIDGE.
(Delivered King's College, Oct. 23.)

"The Swahili Coast," as you so probably aware, is a tautologous designation—"Swahili," being nothing but the Arabic word for "Arabian." The word "Swahili"—the broken plural of "Shahili"—Coast. The name is given to the coast extending from Washahili, in what is now Italian Somaliland to Cape Delgado westwards.

The inhabitants of this coast-strip are called Swahili (sing. of M-Swahili equal to "Man of the Coast"). They are the most diverse races—descended from Arabs and Persians who came to settle here in the eighth century, and "intermarried" with various aboriginal tribes. As I have some across-roads information on equal terms with any of these tribes—though possibly such may have taken place with the Somali—the picture of blood was effected by means of intermarriage, though in the most diverse quarters. Abyssinians and Galla from the northern territories, Nubians from the Nile, and an overwhelming majority of Bantu from as far north as Nyasaland and as far east as the Upper Congo. To understand the Swahili as you must remember that the children of slave-wives follow the status of the father and that this status is never allowed to leave the mother's line, though the whole descent is pure Arab on both sides is not restricted to the father's side. I am bound to say, however, that I have never observed any traces of the father's side in my neighbours. I think a man who showed it to any marked extent would be looked upon with disfavor.

In the northern islands, where intermarriage with the parent country was near, the intermarriage pure Bantu, the pure Arab-type is much more prevalent than in the north. I have seen many of the pure Arab-type in Lamu and on Zanzibar; but the good looks are not confined to the un-mixed Arab families, as some families seem to be the issue of a desecrated African type.

THE EARLIEST ARAB SETTLEMENTS ON THIS ISLAND seem to have been that at Pate on the island of Sius, founded in A.D. 696, of our era, during the reign of the Khalid Abd-Malik, son of Marwan, of Damascus. Little is known of its history during the next 500 years, except that its rulers came to be known as the "Arab" rulers of the coast. It was not invariably the case in these Arab settlements. Lamu, for instance, being an interesting ruled by the "Socotri" of Mere.

In 1204 (A.H. 600), Sultan Isahak of Pate harbored a fugitive from Arabia—Saliman bin Hushayb, the husband of the Sultan's family—came him his daughter to wife, and named him as his successor. The Sultan continued as ruler of Pate, and later of Witu till within the last thirty years, and members of their home are still living at Lamu and elsewhere.

Sultan Isahak's son, a boy of six, was thus out aside from the succession, but he left descendants at Pate, one of whom—Bwana Omara—is now Sultan of Witu. We have no time to follow the whole history of Pate, sufficient to say that this history is in great part made up of feuds and quarrels of the Sultan's family. The latest foundation was that of Sultan Muhammad bin Ahmad (1304-1344) subjugated the town of Pate, the northern islands of Kierwan and Manda, and the coast as far south as Mwanibiki, including the town of Malindi. The people of Manda were detached to Pate and compelled to build the town wall, wherefore they made a home, which is current to this day:
