

KENNEL NOTES

Miss Collyer, before whom all correspondence is submitted with "Kenney Notes," should be addressed, does not herself responsible for accuracy of statements made by her which are, in the main, based on information supplied by her correspondents.

There has been some graining and a spattering of paint on the kennels dropped out of fashion and that at last we have come back to the more interesting view of the breed. But the dogs themselves are still in vogue and are constantly occurring. What I mean by this is that we now have kennels that carry one or two breeds to the top.

The mad orthodoxy for the Alsatian, which was so general and so extreme, and often other dogs in both looks and temperament, has given way to a time when it will be out of fashion to be a fanatical admirer of that type of animal.

It is unfortunate to see that should we not pass our old friend, the Border Collie, into oblivion, the world over especially amongst the working class, who are willing to pay extra money for the pleasure of having the majority of the great breeds of dogs. The English are not mil lionaires and should not be expected to pay for keeping and breeding dogs to the same extent as the Americans.

On the other hand, my article of last week on the Cairn terrier I expect will be followed by many breeders who, I hope, will allow their dogs to be used for breeding purposes. This is what the Alsatian kennels at the Kenyans shows us shall shortly get to the point of breeding. If these movements are reported to be moving in an orderly manner.
