## NEW STATE IN AUSTRALIA?

Convention Adopts Draft Constitution.

(THROUGH REUTER'S AGENCY.) Sydney, April 7.

The draft constitution of the new Federal "Royalist" unit namely "New England" has been formally approved by 150 delegates at the Maitland Town ILD




