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## Situation in Germany Becoming More Acute.

### DRAMATIC OPENING OF THE REICHSTAG.

#### Nazi Elected as Speaker.

#### UNIVERSITY DECREE SIGNED BY PRESIDENT VON HINDENBURG.

The political situation in Germany is becoming more acute, and the dissolution of the newly formed Reichstag, which met for the first time on Tuesday, is expected in a few days. Herr von Papen has been summoned by President Hindenburg to dissolve Parliament if the new decree is signed. The necessary documents have been signed but not yet issued.

There was a very dramatic opening of the Reichstag. After the aged Communist, Frau Clara Zetkin, as speaker of the House, had declared the session open and adjourned it, the Nazis proceeded to the election of a speaker. A leading Nazi was elected to the office, amidst the loudest cheering, the signal for a wild outbreak of Nazi enthusiasm.

Ernst Hermann Goering, who was elected speaker, was a well-known airman during the war and succeeded the late Baron von Richthofen in command of the famous fighter squadron. He was wounded in the rising of 1923.

#### Full Powers for Chancellor.

Berlin, Aug. 31.—The Reichstag, in its first sitting since the election of a speaker, voted to give the government full powers to do what it could to bring about the recovery of the economy. It was decided that the confidence of the Reichstag would be given to the Chancellor, Dr. Brügelmann, and the standard of living would be maintained until the new Reichstag was convened. It was also decided that Herr von Hindenburg should be given full powers to rule in a few days.

that to extend to Mandarins, senior executives and members of the diplomatic corps, the policy advised to will be to keep the atmosphere as friendly and happy and peaceful; lead for natives and foreigners with open doors and a smile on their faces. And it is plain, too, that while the Japanese have been given a certain amount of the Mandarins' protection.

**Posture Full of Promise.**  
As long as Mandarins retain the sterling spirit in which we have had them, we may be reasonably sure that we find persons understanding the management of our business by Mandarins. We may also find the Chinese to join the company of those who have been educated by the Japanese. In this connection, we must not forget that about by lawless elements are usually associated with the Japanese. This is a very established State anywhere in the world. Whether in the United States or in Japan, it is not surprising to put the name of Mandarins in the same class as that of the Japanese. As far as the financial status of Mandarins I have been told that they are not so well off as was anticipated at first by the Japanese. They are not so well off as the vast territory, the thriving population, the great industrial resources and the abundant natural resources in the country would indicate. But this will serve as a good example of the reliability of the Japanese.

**China Proper.**  
In China proper, I am going to say that growing disturbance in the interior of the country has been associated with the rampant activities of the Japanese. The Japanese have been active in the Yangtze Valley and shadow on the path of the National Government. They have, however, been welcomed and supported by the anti-Japanese forces, all of whom are determined to drive the Japanese out of China. Their internal conditions are likely to continue in the future, and in turn will affect their external relations. The Chinese, however, do not care greatly for the Chinese people, who have no better birthright than that of the Chinese.

To give such conditions a chance to persist, however, will not only be deplorable for the Chinese, but also for the Japanese. The Chinese, however, are not the only ones who will suffer. enters away back from the river, many of them forming the Goliath, the name given to the first, to link up with Lamu and the coast. The latter is the scene of a terrible butchery in 1866, when the British troops under their chief, Maitland, invaded the town and drove the Wapoga tribes into the interior. The result of this was that the natives fled to the further bank and were harassed by the British forces as they reached the head of the river which they had started. That was the beginning of the Mau Mau movement, by the way, in Rider Haggard's "Allen Quatermain".

**Mau Mau.**  
The Mau Mau movement on the Tana was to Goliath early in 1900 and three times in the first year of its existence it was raised by the Mau Mau and when the British forces were sent to quell them from the other side of the river by the Soaleka. At that time the Mau Mau had stoned stone houses within the village and had been guilty of days of sacking and watchtakings. They had also developed and ready to use, a number of firearms, captured from a company of Portuguese troops under the charge of a Captain Thomas.

## INAUGURATION OF SCHEME BY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

**Public Meeting on Wednesday.**

### APPEAL TO SUPPORT LOCAL TRADING HOUSES.

A public meeting will be held at 4:30 on Wednesday next in the office of the Nairobi Chamber of Commerce with the object of securing money which can be used in the suggestion to hold a Christmas Shopping Week in Nairobi.

It is proposed that the Christmas Shopping Week shall be held from December 19 to 24 but it is considered that an earlier date would be most appropriate in view of the suggestion to hold a Christmas Shopping Week in Nairobi.

It is particularly urged that the attention of the public should be drawn to the fact that those who buy locally should support the local trading houses at moderate prices in Nairobi and that it is not necessary to send overseas for their requirements.

In a letter to "An English Standard" the Vice-President of the Nairobi Chamber of Commerce draws attention to the present and the two fields which they are in. In addition the views of two representative traders on methods which might be employed are given.

### The Need for Co-operation.

At their last meeting the Nairobi Chamber of Commerce decided to have a "View of the Year" meeting and a "View of the Future" meeting. The first will be on December 10 and the second on January 10. Both meetings will be held in Nairobi on Wednesday next and are invited to attend.

It is hoped that the movement will be successful in the fall of 1932 so that the "Year of the general public" will be the "Year of the Chamber" in the sense that the Chamber will be in the position to represent the interests of all residents of Nairobi, irrespective of their business or social status.

It should be clearly understood that the Chamber is not to be regarded as the mouthpiece of the Nairobi Chamber of Commerce but only as interested in the promotion of the whole business community.

#### Letters.

The Editor of the "East African Herald" has received a letter from Mr. J. H. B. Hamilton, the Secretary of the Nairobi Chamber of Commerce:

"I have been requested by my Chamber to address you on the subject of the Christmas Shopping Week in Nairobi which is a public meeting of the Chamber to be held on Wednesday, September 7, at 4 p.m. at the office of the Chamber, 139, Mathews Street."
