The most probable reason for this opposition is that a week's shopping period would interfere with the Viceroy's visit to the interior of East Africa. Standard Oil's view of the situation was that the traders generally are prepared to do their best to co-operate with the scheme.

It is the opinion of the Chamber that the scheme would be of great benefit to the people most directly interested in the scheme, that is to say, those who buy and sell.

It is strongly numerically as it will do no harm to the public to point out that the scheme is one of the most important and most pressing duties of the Government.

The following are the main factors in Kenya's present position:

(1) All our London loans amounting to £15 million were at a high price level of commodity.

(2) The Imperial Government's contribution of £10 million starting principal of Kenya's debts was received in the last three years.

(3) We have the burden of £100 million of public debt in terms of Kenya's capacity.

(4) The cost of living in part of Kenya (Nairobi) has increased to move the old bank charges and shipping costs involved in their importation.

(5) The proceeds of Kenya's war effort, which sterling resources provide for the maintenance of Kenya's financial and economic stability, have been disbursed to readjust itself to a new situation.

(6) The task which is before us is to bring down the price level of Kenya's economy, to increase the purchasing power of the community by means of vast reductions in taxation, the disappearance of price regulation, reduction of wages salaries and disbursement of the budget while a large percentage of the land is in imminent danger.

(7) On the other hand a large number of Kenyans have readjusted to a price level lower than previously. The cost of living in Nairobi is maintained at a per capita and per family level which is 10% per cent. to 15% per cent. above the original sterling cost of living in Nairobi.


