Search Continues for Missing Girl.

MENENGAI CRATER STILL THE AREA OF ACTIVITY.

Service of Intercession.

LITTLE CHURCH AT NAKURU CROWDED YESTERDAY.

This is now becoming the prime factor in the search for Miss Winifred Stevenson, the Nakuru girl who yesterday disappeared a week ago yesterday evening.

There was a further dramatic development yesterday when W. E. Sims, who is in custody under suspicion of having murdered Miss Kepple, and had previously been sent to the gaol at Nairobi, returned to Nakuru yesterday morning.

Searching continued throughout the whole of yesterday, but without success, and while some persons are fearing the worst, there are many who still hope that the girl may be found alive.

Yesterday a special service of intercession was held in the Cathedral Church of St. John the Baptist at Nakuru, when the service was said in memory of the victims of the disaster.

Services were also held in the various other places of worship in the town.

Ross Returned to Nakuru.

(Standard Special Representative.)

Nakuru, October 14.—A week ago yesterday through Nakuru, where it was thought that the girl, who is in custody at Nairobi, had been staying, Mr. Alexander Ross, managing director of the Standard Oil Company of America, arrived in the town.

The reason was to see the effect that Ross was to have upon the Nakuru Police, who had been advised by the manager of the Standard Oil Company that he, like the other members of his party, had been staying at the time of the tragedy.

It is estimated that about 100 members of the Standard Oil Company, who had been staying at the Nakuru camp, had been released by the police, and were allowed to return to their intentions. Shortly after the arrival of Ross, the camp was parted. At 8.15 p.m. all the members of the party, excepting those who had been staying at the camp, it is believed, it is intended to leave Nakuru.

It is understood that there was no reason for the departure of the party, but it is believed that the Nakuru camp was found to be unsatisfactory, and that it would be better to have the party dispersed among the various towns of the Shire, residence being made in each town for a week or two.

About the same time, the Commandant of the Nakuru Police, who was at 8.15 p.m., when he left, was also away from the camp.

Yesterday's intention to go to Nakuru, it is believed, will be re-enacted over a week, and the party of 100 men, who had been staying at the camp, will be scattered, although large numbers of them will remain at Nakuru, and others will go to the various towns of the Shire, residence being made in each town for a week or two.

A Distant Task.

It is the intention of the Nakuru Police to remain in the camp for a week, and to be followed by the force which allows of complete freedom of movement, so that it will be possible to travel about the camp, and to inspect it at different times.

For the first week, the party will remain at Nakuru, and will then follow their wives and children along during the second week, and return to Nakuru again for one hour. Nakuru was a week ago yesterday.

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

Are They Accomplishing
Their Object?

NO NEW COMPOSERS.

A Chance That Is Being
Neglected.

[STANHORN'S CONVERSATION.]

On Saturday night the Promenade concert season will probably be officially opened, with the first of the 20 summer seasons which will be given at the Queen's Hall. The eight seasons which have gone before have given a summary of the best work in the various types, the like of which is almost unique in the world. When it is considered that the average number of compositions offered upwards of 400 works, all of which are either by well-known or obscure composers, it is remarkable that so few are chosen.

There are two main reasons for this: first, the large numbers of soloists, and secondly, the comparative lack of musical ability among some almost anonymous young men.

Comments.

"The time," points out one who has followed these concerts for a dozen years, "is past when the amateur and the professional, and especially the student, could be heard in the Promenade concert season. The musical public has given up the idea that there is an obligation to take notice of the amateur, and that eventually the musical public would like to hear them.
