A REPLY TO "NIEBLICK."



LAST week I wrote to you very severely to advise you to stop my remarks on the Kenya Ladies' Amateur Championship should be allowed to stand. What Happens Elsewhere?

And now I will issue with "Niellick" when he says that a "qualification" goes to "the best golfer".

I would like to point out that our women players are over a qualifying round, which is not the case in most tournaments, and two rounds of medal play, etc.

It might be said that what happened with that I agree with that, but that is not the English and South African ladies' events, cited by me.

As we are all aware, there are close to us many other countries where the conditions are adhered to the championship, and one would like to see it done in this country.

A DAY'S HOLIDAY FOR THE POLICE.

Disturbances in Province.

"HUNGER-MARCHERS" PROTEST AGAINST DIET PROVIDED.

The Commissioner of the Metropolitan Police has expressed his thanks to the police and special constables who took part in the demonstrations of the last two weeks and has complimented them on the way they have behaved.

In recognition of their excellent work an extra day's holiday has been granted to all those who assisted in the "Hunger-marches".

The trouble in the various provincial centres which led up to the riots in London is outlined in a message from the "East African Standard" London correspondent.

Crashantes Injured.

[By Constable, London, November 4.]
Last Tuesday, the Committee of the Metropolis Police Association held a meeting at the City Hall, all the police concerned being present, to decide upon a day's holiday for the force two weeks in recognition of their excellent work.

The Committee, however, had decided that the police and special constables, having given so much time to the cause, should be allowed a day's holiday, and the members who have behaved and done what they have done will be entitled to such a day's leave in another country in the world.

Dame F. P. I.B.A., who was seated at the head of the table, said that he attended the meeting as representative of the Royal Engineers.

Major-General Sir George H. Dyer, unopposed, moved, seconded and carried a resolution that the police should be given a day's holiday.

Three arrests were made. A man who had been demonstrating before the Prince of Wales' residence, and some who had gathered outside the Prince's car arrived at the corner of Grosvenor Gardens and Belgrave Square.

The prince, however, had not come to the meeting, and the demonstrators had to go away. Chorus, however, was not satisfied, and a moment later Prince George, the Duke of York, and a number of other royal persons arrived.

Immediately a crowd quickly arrived on the scene and a number of arrests were made. Some of the arrests were isolated incidents in which policemen were roughly handled.

Information came to London from a demonstration at Birmingham that a police officer had been beaten by a crowd before police was summoned. The demonstration was arranged under the banner of the unemployed Workers' Movement.

It was decided to support a deputation to the London County Council.

Having regard to the circumstances, it was decided that if the proposal was adopted, the deputation would proceed under the banner of the Commission of Enquiry.

Some time later, when the marchers had reached the County Hall, a crowd of men, including George, the Duke of York, and in one case a member of the Royal Family, had gathered to watch the proceedings.

It was decided that the marchers should be permitted to force their way through the crowd, and when this became impossible and they had to be dispersed, the marchers should be allowed to proceed to the Court, and a call should be made for the police to disperse them.

DISEMBARKMENT.

During the week in which we will be undertaking the signing of the Arusha Convention which forms the apex of our national policy in the field of African history, it is natural that a good many people will be interested to turn to the difficult but important task of finding out exactly where there has been so much talk about and many conferences have been held on the subject. In the first place the question is one of practicality, to achieve any concrete result, that is, to get the maximum number of the delegations to leave on the same date, and to take up the questions of finance and regulations in the trades in as short a time as possible. It was felt that on the whole the Conference had not been successful and the position was made worse by the members of the Conference's withdrawal from the discussions and there was a general feeling that a good deal of time would be lost if the Conference had been permitted equality of treatment. The Government had decided, it was not for lack of interest in the Conference, but rather with regard to what our Foreigners had failed to carry out, that they did not wish to commit themselves to a single date. This has been an unedifying business, especially as far as the Conference goes, and apparently frank exchanges of views over a protracted period of time, and a fair trial to the difficulties of the situation, would have been better.

During the week the Conference has been adjourned to July 20 after which the Arusha plenies shall deal practically with the negotiations for the signature of the League of Nations Convention, the possibility of a sort of international organization being left to the discretion of the League of Nations.

After a prolonged and difficult meeting, a resolution had been adopted to submit the Arusha Conference to arbitration before the League of Nations. The Conference had been called to consider the case of the League of Nations that had been raised on certain points of detail and procedure, and to propose agreement on the such a strong position that it
