RASULI DEPOSED.

Dec. 31.—General Durrani with his Army numbering 5,000 men to-day to the borders of India and will lead to the local chiefs a letter from the British Government demanding that the Tribesmen should submit to the Sultan.

NATAL'S TROUBLES.

Jan. 1.—There is considerable anxiety in Natal owing to apprehension of a revival of the Zulu trouble. Numerous cases have occurred recently of Rifles and Cartridges having been stolen from settlers. The Natal Government are considering the advisability of proposing the Chief Din's suits for treason.

Obituaries.

Dec. 31.—The Baroness Bart de Costa is dead.

Jan. 2.—Lady Elizabeth Cecil will be buried in Westminster Abbey on the 5th instant.

Jan. 2.—The Countess of Glanville née Belle Hilton is dead of cancer.

CUBA.

Dec. 28.—American troops are being employed for the first time since the occupation of Cuba in suppressing bandits.

A NEW GOVERNMENT.

Dec. 29.—General Rothe has announced that an arrangement has been come to between the United States and Germany in regard to the British. Party he believes it will be a Combination strong enough to form a Government.

Germany.

SHIPPING DISPUTE.

GUNNING BURLOW.

Dec. 31.—A serious shipping dispute has arisen at Hamburg owing to the Hamburg American Line, the German East Africa Line, the Keppel Line, and other Companies requiring its offices to withdraw from an Association for German Mercantile Captains and Officers. The Majority of the Officers have refused to comply with the Company demands. It is expected that 71 vessels and 1,000 seamen will be employed to demand the reestablishment of the companies.

Jan. 1.—The German Government in his electoral district is to be held for the Liberal Vote against the Centre and the Socialists.

THE NEW AMBASSADOR.

Dec. 31.—Bryce's appointment as Ambassador to Washington is officially announced.

LORD TWEEDMOUTH TAKES A CRUISE.

Dec. 31.—Lord Tweedmouth on board H. M. S. "Echobronn" was started on an official inspection of Gibraltar and Malta.

MAHOMMEDAN ALARM IN INDIA.

Jan. 2.—Alarm amongst the Mohammedans in India is increasing owing to the political activities of the Hindus. A great meeting in Decca was held on Monday at which representatives from every quarter in India attended and it was decided to form a Moslem League to protect the interests of Mohammedans and to promote loyalty to the British Government. The President declaring that the safety of the Mohammedans depended on their loyalty to Government. The News of Decca also declared that they must prevent the mischief caused in India through the Indian Congress and Extremists.

L'ENTENTE.

Jan. 3.—His Majesty replying through Lord Knollys to a congratulatory telegram from the Paris paper "Le Figaro" expresses his earnest hope that the warm feeling of friendship now existing between France and Great Britain will never be disturbed.

WALES SAVED BY CARDIFF.

Jan. 2.—Cardiff defeated the South Africans by 17 points to 11. This is the last of the South Africans tour.

France.

SEPARATION LAW.

WILL THE LAW BE AMENDED.

Dec. 28.—The French Cabinet are considering a Bill for the suppression of military Court Martial in peace time and 15 officers will be tried by the Civil Court owing to the sentences of Court martial being heavier than those passed by Civilian. Regimental Councils will only deal with disciplinary offences.

Dec. 31.—The enforcement of the 3-partition law is creating a serious situation in Lower Brittany. The Clergy are preaching a revolt against law, commerce is at a stand still and agricultural operations have been suspended in many districts.

Dec. 31.—Many petitions in France are making the necessary applications to hold services and it is believed this movement will soon become general.

the supplementary Public Worship Bill by 190 to 160 Votes.

Jan. 3.—General Piquart calls to-day for Beleters with a large staff on an important mission in connection with the defenses of that post.

EPIDEMIC OF RAILWAY ACCIDENTS.

FEARFUL LOSS OF LIFE.

Jan. 1.—There is an epidemic of Railway accidents on the Continent and on Sunday 3 serious ones occurred. The Hamburg Cologne Express dinged into a cattle train while crossing the main line 5 people were killed and 11 injured. The Frankfurt Cologne Express collided with a goods train and the Brussels Bruges train was derailed. In both cases one passenger was killed and many injured.

Jan. 2.—The Engine Driver of the train at Aachen has been arrested and charged for reckless driving while intoxicated.

Jan. 3.—34 passengers were killed and 90 injured in a collision between passenger Trains at Alta Vista in Kansas.

Snow and Accidents in Europe.

Dec. 29.—Snow storms and gales continue throughout Great Britain, Germany, Austria, Switzerland, and France and the Railways on the Continent are disorganised.

Dec. 31.—The snow storms have broken down the land lines throughout England and trains are now conveying telegrams.

Dec. 31.—Since the snowstorms the first local service train left Ayr about late on Thursday afternoon snow packed with snow bound passengers, while the train was standing at Elliott Junction an Express dinged into its rear smashing two carriages, killing 13 and injuring 37 passengers. Mr. Black M. P. for Banffshire and both legs broken. The accident is attributed to the signalling, breaking down through the Snow.

Dec. 31.—Mr. Black M. P. has succumbed to his injuries.

Jan. 1.—A passenger and a goods train collided in a suburb of Washington 30 were killed and 30 injured mostly weak and holiday makers.

Jan. 2.—A general thaw has set in throughout England but on 29th storms have recommenced with fury in Scotland. The Railways are blocked and passengers from Perth and Aberdeen

are stranded all along the line. Three engines while endeavouring to clear a drift were thrown off the line.

Russia.

THE TERRORISTS AT WORK.

Dec. 31.—Six of the great Cotton works in Loda have closed their doors and 30,000 workmen have been discharged. The situation is most serious and fierce conflicts between revolutionaries and workmen are constantly occurring, and up to the present at least 11 have been killed and scores injured, property has been reinfused.

Dec. 31.—The Leaders of the Russian terrorist have revoked their previous decision to abstain from terrorism during elections and have resolved to energetically pursue the campaign. Two terrorists assassinated the Governor of the Province of Anzholinsk in the street of Moscow.

Jan. 3.—Police searches throughout St. Petersburg and Moscow have led to the discovery of a list of 37 names including the highest functionaries in Russia all of whom have been condemned to death by the Revolutionaries.

Jan. 3.—In Russia famine is gaining in extent and to tenacity and typhus is spreading rapidly in several provinces.

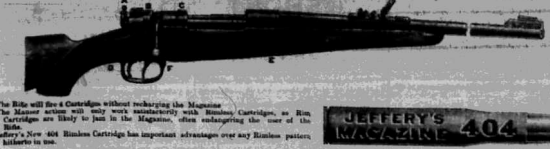

EDITORIAL.

We might take a leaf out of Canada's book and organise a great Rhino hunt, there would be plenty to join in and there would quite a possibility of exterminating these savage and useless beasts, so far as the area of operations is concerned. This area would then be open for colonization. The protecting of the rhinoceros is a ridiculous farce the outcome of pure sentiment.

The question of the past two months has been: Where are the big game sportsmen? They are the big game sportsmen who have heard so much about? The answer is here, or where? Why do they not come? That is the real question which we are answering and the answer to my mind is simply because ninety per cent have noticed our country being boomed to such an extent that they have gone off somewhere else rather than being mixed up with an overwhelming number of other. Big game sportsmen are a class who do not court publicity, who do not court fields where the cheap tripper is likely to be rampant, but look to countries where there is the least likelihood of meeting other men of the same lay. Our booming has been a mistake, a few, very few, judiciously placed advertisements, visible in tissue paper, might be useful, but more than this is detrimental, hence the lack of sportsmen with their purses in British East Africa.

The meeting of the 23rd January promises to be the meeting in the history of the Colonists' Association. Members from all parts of the country have decided to leave their ploughs, their desks, their counters or whatever it may be, to attend on this great occasion, an event in the history of this country. It is at this meeting we must lay down what are our immediate necessities, we must assist our Home Government to ascertain what is the least we can do with and what changes are essential to our future progress. Though fact and decorum must be observed throughout the proceedings yet plain and earnest words may be spoken with freedom, there must be no beating about the bush and whatever resolutions are passed these must be accepted as the feeling of the community. Apologies and backslidings must not mar the results this time, as they did at the previous meeting, nor should they be necessary.

This week's cables bring us news that the Defence Committee have condemned the Channel Tunnel proposal. The scheme is therefore out of consideration temporarily. It is difficult to follow the reasons of the Committee, one would have thought that a definite treaty setting forth that neither France nor England should use the tunnel in case of war, would have been a sufficient safeguard. No country could break such a treaty in these days without incurring the wrath of other nations, a wrath which would lead to disastrous results to the nation who first broke the treaty. The proposal for blowing up the Tunnel in case of war is not sound. Even supposing that the tunnel, there is always a chance of a tractor touching the bottom at a wrong moment.

An Editorial Word to the Members of the Colonists' Association.

(i) Reference to personalities is not necessary nor will it help the objects of the Association. (ii) A House divided against itself cannot stand. These older firms will be backbones of the Association in years to come when they have got over the novelty of the situation. (vii) Resolutions unless unanimously carry little weight. (viii) The future of the Colony lies in the hands of the Association.
