ing the weight of the experience of His members to bear the main burden of the land problems, it has served as a most useful advisory body.

The person of the Land Board is not a matter of official position, but is a matter of fact. It is now more than a year since the various representative bodies of settlers were requested to suggest nominees for the current year.

As has been stated its work has been altogether advisory. The time seems to have come when its counsels should be considered more in the light of enactments to be followed, subject to the Land Laws in force and to the approval of His Excellency.

We have dispensed with the Commission of Lands whose duties consisted mainly of putting things in proper order and in His Excellency's Committee on the Land Laws.

While the Land Office, under the direction of the Land Officer Mr. Barton Wright, has its hands full of the ordinary details of land rents and crown leases there is much to be done which is essentially work for the Land Board to perform.

There are vast areas of unoccupied lands awaiting settlement. It is the duty of the Board to classify these lands and have them thrown open for colonisation.

There again many farms have in the past been alienated to landowners who have never been in the country nor do they wish to develop these holdings.

With fuller powers a land policy could be initiated by the Board, a policy which would be of benefit to the country and would facilitate settlement.

These weighty matters await the consideration of the Land Board which should be formed at the beginning of April, so that a delay of three months has occurred.

New Royal Declaration.

(Banker's Special to 'East African Standard')

Mr. Asquith announced in the House of Commons the form of the new Royal Declaration as follows: - "I solemnly and sincerely, in the presence of God, profess, testify and declare that I am a faithful member of the Protestant Church as by law established, and I will, according to the true intent of the enactments, secure a Protestant succession to His Throne, and I will hold and maintain the said enactments to the best of my power and according to law."

Imperial Conference.

At question time in the House of Commons, Col. Seely notified that the date of the Imperial Conference cannot be fixed till the date of the Coronation is settled. It will, however, be held at a convenient time in 1911. He explained the composition of the Imperial Secretariat and the functions thereof. The self-governing Dominions had not yet indicated the subjects which they desire to discuss at the Conference of 1911, though the South African States had indicated that such question must be left to the Union, the Imperial Conference considering suitable topics.

Liberals Memorialize Asquith.

A meeting of advanced Liberals decided to memorialize Mr. Asquith giving views on the situation and urging him to give full opportunity for discussing any compromise.

Anticipated Wine Duties.

Large clearances of wine from India are being made in anticipation of increased duties under the Budget.

Colonial Office Estimates.

Seely an S. A. Union.

Tribute to Selborne.

Col. Seely in introducing the Colonial Office Estimates mentioned that the outstanding feature of the year was the Union of South Africa. Every citizen will wish to the Minister both as to his Government and the difficult task before them. They appreciated the release of Dinuzulu in which the Act was passed with singular promptness which was an earnest that they would deal generously and fairly with the naive people. He emphasized that Lord Selborne had played a great part in accomplishing the Union. He would like to say, before Lord Selborne again took his part in political controversies as no doubt he would do so, that the members of his party who would be likely to forget the loyalty and zeal with which Lord Selborne had laboured for Union. It had been a year of thankfulness and harvest between the Mother Country and the Dominions. He concluded by deprecating the splitting up of the Colonial Office into Dominions and Crown Colony Departments and drew on the wonderful results achieved especially in South Africa.

Imperial Interference.

At the House of Commons the Rt. Hon. Mr. Asquith said his remarks would be that the Imperial Government should not interfere in the internal affairs of self-governing Dominions. He said that the Transvaal members of the House of Commons referred to the case and the Governor referred to the signing of the warrant by the Administrator of the Transvaal. He said that the House of Commons to confer on the Colonial Office for

authorizing their representative to break the law. Mr. E. D. Isaacs K.C., in reply to Mr. Lyttelton said it became necessary to consider the legal position. When Parliament was no longer in session he maintained that the Governor had not only not asked the Governor in person and the Governor in Council. He had acted in the latter capacity and was bound to follow the advice of his ministers. Not until Lord Curzon had received the assurance that the Minister's money was required in the Public interest did he advise the Governor to do what he was bound to do. Mr. Dalloir observed that Mr. Isaacs had laid down a singular doctrine. Did Col. Seely say that the Courts held that the Governor was to act on the advice of his Ministers even against the law? He then pointed out that the Act was passed by the Transvaal Parliament, and if the Imperial Government were going to revise all these Acts they would be bound to amend the Empire. The question was not whether the Imperial Authorities approved of the Act but whether they were not bound to give the advice which did become the law. He suggested a conference between Sprunt and Gibeau with a view to compromise. Col. Seely said the question was still the subject of correspondence. He again emphasized that the Imperial Government must be absolutely free if the Commons asked to state subjects of discussion a great danger night arise.

Transvaal Indian Question.

The debate on the Colonial Estimates has been remarkable for the number of topics discussed. It was eventually passed, the voting being 147 for, 102 against. Mr. O'Rourke urged that representatives should be made to the Union Government of South Africa with reference to the Indians in the Transvaal. He suggested a conference between Sprunt and Gibeau with a view to compromise.

The Eberbeck Memorial.

The Master of Eberbeck asked the memorialists to hold back their memorial to Mr. Asquith as he might make a statement today. This was declined as the memorial was not presented at the Conference had collapsed. "The Morning Post" says the Conference has described the memorial as a scandal.

Home Rule for Scotland.

Twenty Scottish Liberals in the House of Commons have formed a Nationalist Committee with a view to secure representative Government for Scotland.

words "E. M. S. Fox" and the liner "Gisela" have left Aden to search the Arabian Sea. From Aden "E. M. S. Prosperina" and the liner "Dulwich" have also gone on the search for the "Trieste". It is feared that she has broken her shaft as she was sailing light.

The Near East.

The Turkish Chamber has adjourned till the first of November. The Grand Vizier praised the consistent friendliness of the Greek Protecting Powers who had now adopted the Turkish view as to the status quo. The attitude of Greece was also without reproach and he hoped that Ottoman would observe a dignified attitude to the Government which had behaved with correctness.

Wreck of Arzippus.

The "Deutschland" crew Zeppelin VII was partially wrecked in a gale at Bang Westphalia, when she was carrying twenty-seven passengers who, however, are safe. She had lost her mast and proceeding Westward had to fight against a severe wind which disabled her machinery. She then drifted one hundred and twenty-five miles to the Eastward. For two hours she was battling with the wind when latterly a squall lifted her up to a height of about 4,000 feet after which she fell suddenly to two hundred feet and crashed into the sea. The passengers were able to climb down although they were in a famished condition and bruised and cut with the broken car windows. She fell into a pine forest and the trees pierced her cabin and hull, holding her fast and thus saving the lives of her passengers amongst whom were a number of journalists. The machine got broken here. It is feared that the airship is a total wreck.

LATER - From Osnabruck, Hannover, information is received that the "Deutschland" is a complete wreck and of which are being dismounted and entrined for Friedrichshafen, one hundred and fifty soldiers are helping in the salvage operations.

Zeppelin's Arctic Expedition.

Count Zeppelin is en route to Kiel to embark on an Arctic expedition as a preliminary to making eventually an airship trip to the Arctic. He returned to inspect the wreck of the Deutschland which is irreparable. The papers comment that the accident to the Deutschland is a death-blow to the rigid type of airship.

A bomb explosion has occurred at Barcelona, the casualties being ten killed and six injured.

Anarchists Forbidden the Country.

Death Penalty Provided.

In consequence of the bomb throwing in the Colon Theatre at Buenos Ayres the Argentine Chamber has enacted a most stringent anti-Anarchist law totally forbidding Anarchists to reside in the country and severely punishing the captains of ships landing Anarchists. It also provides for the

death penalty on the authors of fatal outbreaks, retrospective of age or sex.

American Puffblin.

Canva-town has sprung up in Tenco, Nevada, to accommodate the prize-fighting enthusiasts. The Governor who attends the fight, has ordered out the State Militia to be present to protect Johnson if he should be victorious. Betting is 10 to 6 against Johnson.

American Railway Confession.

The Inter State Commerce Commission at Washington has decided several important railway rate cases. The rates were found to be reasonable and excessive. It prescribes reductions of 20 to 30 per cent. This is a severe blow to the railways.

Alleged Gold Find.

No Official Intimation.

Capitalists Cautious.

Strong Proof Required.

The Agent General for British Columbia publishes a cable from his Government, to the effect that the Mining Department has received no official information from the gold find discoverer. A caveat with reference to the alleged gold find has been issued. The Agent General assures that the Commissioner has not had time to present a report on the alleged find and any case financiers are exceedingly cautious. Reports from British Columbia state that it has not helped Canadian Public shares which have steadily declined while the Grand Trunk has improved slightly after the recent weakness. It is emphasized that the site exists in the west and that ordinary practitioners should be warned so that Britaners should not let any find fall exclusively into the hands of Americans. He considers that it would be extremely curious if an important reef existed so close to the long disputed boundary and that should the reef eventually enter American territory there will be a dramatic happening. It was, therefore, a matter of congratulation that the boundary had been ascertained.

The officials of British Columbia consider that the gold is probably low-grade. The Agent General warns gold seekers not to add unless confirmation of the find is received. The papers publish cables from British Columbia that the gold is probably low-grade and one is exaggerated. The majority of prospectors are leaving disappointed as all the best claims have been staked out.

**THE PRESENT SIRE.**

Sir,—In your issue of the 17th Inst. under the heading "The Present Sire," I note you have taken to know how many cows elephants keep company with a sire. As you have already rightly pointed out, this is a matter of some importance, and an admitted fact amongst African exporters and big game hunters that more than one cow accompany a bull elephant. As a matter of fact it is not the cows that accompany the bulls, but it is the latter that follow a herd of cows.

As you are well aware, I am one of the oldest readers of the East African Standard and find no end of allusions to elephants and their habits from the different districts within whose countries I have been fortunate enough to visit for a long time a desire to make a study of these quadruped monsters, and find out for myself what I failed to find in books. In the last two years I have been surrounded to some extent in my travels. I was fortunate enough to get two Indian elephants from the same house and therefore had at least a half gross of elephants, and have satisfied myself on several occasions. There are, as you will be glad to hear, a number of your informers and perhaps you or some of your readers will refer to these later.

With reference to the number of cows that will follow to any herd, my experience has been that the bigger the herd, the smaller is the proportion of bulls amongst them. For instance in one particular herd of about nine hundred to a thousand which covered several square miles of country I do not honestly think there could have been more than fifty bulls, out of these only three were anything like the average. The biggest of them which we shot weighed 220 lbs. the very next the best weighed 120 lbs. and the other 110 lbs. I have seen elephants on an average from 5 to 1000 or half gross animals, but have written to every ten (10) cows and about 3 to 4 cows or half gross animals, but have written to every ten or other sportsman, and have seen elephants in fact have no limitation in number that having seen them in the hands of other white men who had been in that part of the country, they had seen white men, but never seeing any of them. A Greek Trader had two years before he died to get into this country, he was treacherously murdered with all his men and property plundered. It is not my intention to go into this matter, but I will make mention of it to impress on you that the relative proportion of the sexes amongst elephants is not as you would think it is, and that the elephants aforementioned were interbred with prior to our visit and therefore may be taken as a good example. I saw in the same country several herds of cows and calves with no grown up bulls or cows and at the same time and later period I came across a herd of 500 bulls with only one cow following up about 500 yards behind, but the same herd of 500 very scarce and it is seldom that one comes across them. It is of course a very common thing to come across single bulls. The proportion of the sexes as found in nature is certainly in every case as follows: Where men and cordill are fixed. For instance in the Lake Rudolf area, the lake of illicit shooting or to use an African term have been women "unintentional sportsmen" there are hardly any bull elephants left. On different occasions I came upon a country on six elephants and in every case there was not a single cow with them. I have seen a very large number of calves amongst them. I express a contrary opinion to yours on one point. It is true that for some years in British East Africa, only bull elephants were killed, usually those with the largest tusks, but I point out that it is not the most precious animals that are the biggest tusks. It is the weak, old and ivory and it is these that the hunters and hunters are continually on the look out for. The killing of these results in the young blood being left to maintain the nation in the physique of the best specimens of African elephants, not of their extinction.

The following are the points on which I should like to make a few remarks to you:

1. Up to what age does an African elephant naturally live?

**HOLDING UP THE MILK.**  
Mr. John Burroughs, the eminent naturalist, has the following statement on this subject:—  
"Most farmers and country people think that 'holding down' or 'holding up' the milk by the cow is a voluntary act. In fact they think the milk is a vessel filled with milk and that the cow revolves or vibrates it just as she chooses. But the holder is a manufacturer. He filled with blood from which the milk is manufactured. When you milk, this process is controlled by the cow's nervous system; when the milk is cooled or in any way disturbed, as by a stranger, or by taking away her calf, or by any other cause, the process is arrested and the milk will not flow. The nervous energy goes forward. The whole process of milking is voluntary as in digestion in man and in all the other animals in which the same process goes on."  
Mr. Burroughs is undoubtedly correct. And yet there are "milkers" who so certain that the cow holds up her milk because she wants that they proceed to punish her, thus, as so often is the case in our dealing with cows, making a bad matter worse.

**FEEDING SALT.**  
Salt is a very important item in the dietary of a cow or a horse and many people are very careless and negligent about feeding it. Salt is a constituent of the body, and like all other elements must be supplied through the channels of nutrition. But as hayrations and concentrates besides forming a small part of the organism's food, both contain some assimilable food, especially facilitating the passage of the albumen of the food from the digestive canal into the blood, and facilitating the circulation, thus increasing the energy of the vital apparatus. When animals are heavily fed on grain, as is the case with the fatteners, a certain excess of salt is called for, because grains are usually richer in phosphorus and other rich in phosphorus than that stimulate the extension of salt, hence when an animal is fed on grain, salt should be supplied regularly and in sufficient quantities. Many animals are unable to be treated to a lack of salt in the ration. Which when grain and hay appear plentiful and feeding is liberal and so in the veterinarian's eye may have an excess of indigestible solids, and then talk to him concerning the deficiency, and he will tell you that the odds are that the farmer pays for medicine and some senseless loss of animals.

**MANURING COTTON.**  
With regard to the kind of fertilizer best suited for the cotton plants, opinions vary in different parts of the United States, where cotton is extensively grown. As a cotton plant, however, needs an abundance of potash, and a trace of nitrogeneous and mineral matter, whilst the soil is especially rich in those constituents, it may fairly be assumed that when cotton seed is not returned to the land, the fertilizer containing these ingredients is necessary to maintain the fertility of the soil.

**TURN ALFALFA INTO EGGS**  
I do not find much written about alfalfa in any of the poultry journals, and yet I have demonstrated to my satisfaction during the winter season that alfalfa is a most valuable food for growing chicks and a relief for adult fowls.

We have a field of ten acres sown with alfalfa stretching below the colony coops and I have certainly secured a large crop of alfalfa. Last season I noticed that as soon as I gave the chicks four things they would seek out alfalfa and peck at it with avidity, particularly when it loosened ready for eating.

On observation I found that they ate the tender tops and purple buds ravenously and certainly secured a large crop of alfalfa. I tried sowing some seed in my nursery and it was wonderful to see how the alfalfa grew. It was a most valuable food for the incubator. This seed got to thinking when my eggs came on I housed some.

**COTTON SEED AND ITS BY-PRODUCTS.**  
The following extracts taken from Mr. Henry's work, *Work and Food*, and from the *Cotton Field* by Chas. W. Danbury, Ph.D., Agricultural Station, Department of Agriculture, United States of America, afford useful and reliable information with regard to the value of cotton seed and its products. Cotton seed meal and cotton seed hulls, both as a stock food and as a fertilizer.

It is estimated in the United States that for each pound of cotton lint, there are produced 10 lb. of cotton seed or in the case of L. 2. This agrees with the results recorded here. It is assumed that 500 lb. of raw cotton can be produced per acre in this country, there would remain, after removing the lint, 250 lb. of cotton seed. ## WORLD'S NEWS BY CABLE.

### Home News.

#### Mr. Joe Chamberlain Birthday Celebrations.

(Editor's Special to "East African Standard") London.  
Meeting, fete and out door demonstrations were held over the whole country on Mr. Joe Chamberlain's birthday. The Duke of Marlborough presided at a great dinner in London. Field and telephone were received by Mr. Chamberlain who was celebrating the occasion in the most joyous way. Lord George in the House of Commons congratulated Mr. Asson Chamberlain on the attainment of another birthday by his distinguished father, at which there were loud gong salutes.  
Mr. Chamberlain walked yesterday morning, he is looking remarkably well. In the afternoon meetings were received by his wife, who congratulated him he had received. The Duke of Marlborough presided over ninety Pops and Members of Parliament who form the nucleus of a club which will fine annually on Mr. Chamberlain's birthday. Ninety eminent Reformers who are content to celebrate their birthday, express their unalloyed devotion. We are confident you will see your Imperial ideal soon realized.  
Mr. Chamberlain replied thanking them and congratulating them on the progress of their policy.  
Mr. DeLour telegraphed associating himself with the commemoration and sending his affection for Mr. Chamberlain as a friend and his admiration for him as a statesman. He expressed himself confident that as the mass of controversies dispensed his services to the Empire would result to their true magnificence.  
The dinner telegraphed to the Premier of the South African Colonies their Imperial greetings on the occasion.

#### The Civil List.

The report of the Committee on the Civil List has been given. It sees no reason for recommending any alteration in it as satisfied that the provision made in 1901 is adequate but not more than adequate to maintain the dignity of the Crown. Queen Alexandra is entitled to an annuity of £10,000 while a similar amount should be assigned to Queen Mary in the event of widowhood. In the event of the Prince of Wales marrying his wife would be allowed a £10,000 yearly annuity, also £10,000 to each of the King's sons should be provided for in the event of marriage, while his daughters get £6,000. The totals are £254,000 compared with £220,000 in the last reign.

The Civil List includes, Richard Whittington, Arthur, £100. Anberg Boardley's mother £50.

It deprecates, however, the interference suggested by Sir Edward Davies as in England since it was after all only a fair fight.

The Westminster Gazette again hopes that it will be possible to prohibit the exhibition of the pictures as they would not be selling.

Prospective Royal Visit. The Newspapers in South Africa state that Queen Mary in the course of a conversation with a South African Colonel this week referred to another visit which they hoped to pay South Africa. This recalls the announcement that their Majesties would make a tour of the Empire before long.

Moving Picture Agitation. The Westminster Gazette would much like to see moving pictures of the John Bull-Jeffries fight exhibited in England, it would mean that glove fights would cease to have importance.

Corona Club Dinner. Prosperity of Empire. Lord Crewe presiding at the Corona Club dinner dwelt on the evidences of real prosperity existing in the Empire and wished that more railways could be built. He sometimes thought that the indirect benefits derived from the representations in transport was not sufficiently regarded by financial rulers. He considered that the direct benefits derived from the important production of research into tropical disease. Referring to the question of adequate provision for the maintenance incidentally that the substitution in South Africa of a Governor, General for four Governors was issued to affect the Colonial Service.

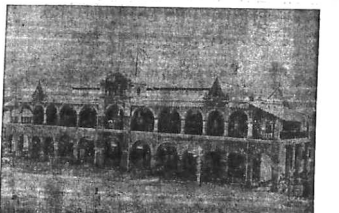

### Home News.

#### Hydroplane Accident.

The Duke O'Connell.  
The Duke of Westminster was indulging  
in a cruise when the boat exploded and  
sank. The Duke was rescued.

#### Anglo-American Peace.

A committee of one hundred with Mr.  
Andrew Carnegie as chairman, is arranging

signing the Anglo-American Peace at Ghent.  
It will include economic aid to Great Britain  
and festivities in London and Washington.

#### Reduced Crop.

The United States Department of Agricul-  
ture states that the wheat crop is estimated  
to be 60 million bushels compared with 78  
million bushels last year. This is the worst  
report in history since 1907.

#### A United States Team.

The Lawn Tennis Association of the  
United States has agreed to the Australian  
suggestion to send a team to play preliminary  
to the Davis Cup matches. The Australian  
proposal is asked for and approved of  
with reference to this, then the sickness and  
inactivity insurance matters must be post-  
poned.

#### Murderers Lynched.

At Newark, Ohio, Anti-Slavery League  
and detectives attacked saloons shooting one  
and killing another. Nine detectives were  
imprisoned. In the evening a mob of people  
gathered, seized the detectives who had  
just shot the keeper and treated him to the  
public square. Hundreds of women and  
children were lynched in the yard of the  
man. The demonstrators did not attempt to  
reveal their identity.

#### Children 400 Prison Cells.

With reference to the case of slaves by a  
British Company in South America mentioned  
last month, a further letter has been received  
by Sir Edward Grey giving details of alleged  
murders and crimes in the Amazon. It  
contains a letter from a Swedish agent,  
Nordenfjard, describing the systematic  
enrichment of Indians. Districts in Bolivia  
which were flourishing under the Jesuits are  
now depopulated. Men are earning a living  
by enclosing villages, killing the adults  
and selling the children to the plantations  
at 400 pesos apiece.

#### Australia Wool.

The Australian Wool export for last season  
amounted to 2,435,000 bales valued at  
£25,125,000 sterling, which is a record.

#### Memorial to Peace Conference.
