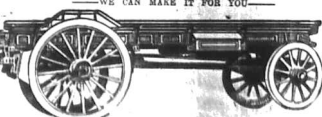

Hill and Co., of Broadwater Street, who place their planters direct through their own agents a selling commission of 10 per cent, and in addition the ordinary commission of half per cent charged by the broker. Under present conditions, when coffee generally sells there is not much argument in favour of an agent, but in ordinary times, planters will probably find that in the end, any extra commission that they pay a money well spent. Institutions like the Bank simply hand over the coffee to a broker for sale at the current rate, and a good trader is a very often happens that the general knowledge of an individual planter gets a better price than would be obtained if the coffee was simply knocked down at auction, or even bought in and sold directly afterwards at any small advance that could be got. It must not be forgotten that planters with very large incomes, and many others, who are resident in London, would not employ agents unless they found that it paid them to do so. 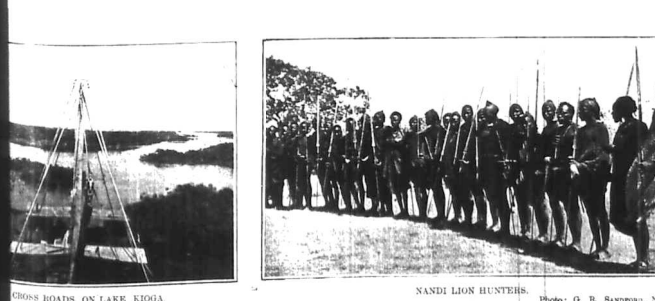

HOMERIC VALOUR
Fight Against Odds
GERMANS TRYING TO CUT OFF BRITISH ARMY.
 (Times Staff's Account.)

LONDON, April 18. The British Headquarters, writing this evening, say: "The Germans this morning developed a flank attack along the front between Cassel and Hebeom, pressing hard towards Giverny. They are apparently driving in from the north. In the course of the day, British, more than 80 enemy divisions have so far appeared. It is not clear whether the German Command is expending every man by the most prudent expenditure of his own power, and not mounting the attack in the great German attack yesterday, we know fought with enormous casualties and tremendous numerical odds. Our troops are fighting in the same terrible manner in the battle between Giverny and the Forest of Houdan, which is more in progress."

"For nearly a week the German gains in the battle in Flanders have been limited to the smallest dimensions. The terribly costly nature of the advance, it is certain, points to the fact that it was not intended to secure the extent of his gains by the price paid by certainly more than 200,000 men at the hold outposts from Cassel to Houdan, which he is gradually bound to attempt to take. The attack to the north, south of the Forest of Houdan, which was inspired by the discovery of our withdrawal from the Hainaut region and the consequent assumption that there would be some discontinuance on this part of the MAN POWER TEST."

"The attack has been repulsed to-day. The enemy was doubtless mortified at being defeated by about half the number of British troops. The past week's sacrifice has been more purely a battle of infantry than has might have been, and the result was a loss of momentum. Apparently, thanks to the withdrawal from the Hainaut region and the consequent assumption that there would be some discontinuance on this part of the MAN POWER TEST."

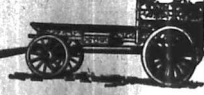

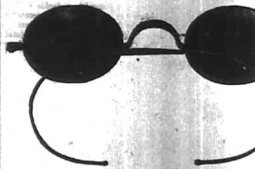
