

KING'S RECEPTION  
United States and Britain  
AMERICAN LABOUR DELEGATES  
AT BUCKINGHAM

(Telegraph Report's Answer.)

LONDON, May 17.

The King and Queen gave a reception at Buckingham Palace to the American Labour Delegates. It was felt that the delegates would have opportunities of judging Britain's war work from their visit to the British dominions and the United States while we were doing and meant to continue to do our utmost to show them that the British Parliament and legislature would be able to give a satisfactory report of the manner in which the British Government had been able to fulfil the men and how faithfully they were carrying on. "It has always been the desire of the Anglo-American nations that world work together in close and harmonious co-operation to combat the forces of evil," said the King.

The King hoped that after the war they would continue to do so.

McCormick assured the King that the delegation was impressed with the methods of the British Government and the whole world would be behind him in contributing to the common cause.

MERCHANTMEN HEROES

Special Decoration to be Given

Them

LONDON, May 17.  
In the House of Commons yesterday Mr. Stanley stated that 12,000 men of the mercantile marine had lost their lives during the war, but none had ever rallied to tell what had become of them.

He announced that the King had approved that a badge should be worn by members of the mercantile marine who had completed a further voyage after being allowed a vessel which had been captured or damaged in the course of the war. The badge would be in the form of a torpedoes, and would be worn on the cuff of all officers, with full rank insignia, and on the shoulder of all ratings.

GERMAN PARLIAMENT.  
Question of Equal Suffrage Raised  
in Lower House

LONDON, May 18.  
A message from Amsterdam states that the Prussian Lower House had rejected the Electoral Bill, which would have given the ballot to the class granting equal suffrage deleted. The Progressive, Radical and Democratic parties supported the amended Bill. The Minister for Prussia declared that the Government enjoyed all constitutional support, except that of the Socialists, which House previously rejected by 295 to 185. If equal suffrage was not accepted within this lifetime the House would be dissolved.

ITALIAN FIGHTING  
Enemy Attacks Completely  
Repulsed

LONDON, May 18.  
An Italian official communiqué stated: "The Allies' third attack on May 17 was repulsed with heavy losses."

Two columns with machine-guns, flame-torpedoes and smoke apparatus advanced very steadily supporting each other in confusion. We captured two flame-torpedoes and firmly held the position. We inflicted such heavy losses upon the points of the front."

HEAT WAVE IN FRANCE  
HUNS GRUMBLING ABOUT  
THEIR RATIONS.

LONDON, May 18.  
The correspondent writes from Paris: "The heat wave in France continues, the last two days and the majority of the time there has been no rain. The mercury shows no signs of subsidence. A great number of people are ill in hospitals. There has been a great increase in the number of deaths from heat stroke. Deaths from heat stroke have been mounting and rising daily, not only due to the heat but also to the fact that the food and drink have been scarce for some time now. The death rate seems to have been about 1200 per day during the last week."

THE ALLIES' DUTY  
Lord Curzon Emphatic  
PEACE TALKS DROWNED BY  
ROAR OF GUNS  
(Telegraph Report's Answer.)

LONDON, May 17.

Speaking at the British Press Association Lord Curzon said one of the great men who had shaped the destinies not only of India but of the world for which we were fighting must be ready to meet conditions. "A man must be just to his friends and he must be bold to his enemies. He must be a leader of the world for government from the horrors of future war." He hoped that nothing that had been done by us in the war was preferable to a doctrine that an unjust peace was preferable to a just war. He believed that the world deserved a peace of justice and that it was a victory for crime and the justification of renewed crime in the world.

It was useless to discuss the details of peace terms without the voice of the great powers behind us. The duty of the Allies and press was to show our countrymen that the world, the Nations, the Governments, and peoples that the whole civilized world agreed with them.
