The German military command in the occupied zone has decided to have its men carry out the terms of the armistice.

The German command has ordered the removal of all arms from the cities and towns demarcated by the armistice, and has issued orders to the League of Nations for indemnity questions with a view to settling the claims of the various states all over the world.

The Germans have made the required repatriation.

With regard to the remainder of the army could be demobilized and sent home, the German government says that it is likely that the occupying army will have done the best service if it can be disbanded and be repatriated by a systematic increase of pay.

Bereavement of Royal Family

THE KING'S SECRET
(THROUGH ROYAL'S AGENCEY)

London, Jan. 19.

The King's secret agent, John, died last night.

Greville, the Earl of Warwick, died with three Mavians over the death of Prince John, which was caused by a heart attack. He was about 80 years old.

A royalist bulletin says, in reference to the secret agent, that he suffered since infarct from a heart attack, which was more frequent and severe. The prince passed away in his sleep, following a short illness, on the afternoon of January 18 at Sandringham.

In recent years the die-hard supporters of Prince John made it necessary for the King to have a royal attendant, consequently he was never seen with public visitors with the exception of the Queen, who remained in comparative privacy at Sandringham.

The royalists say that the King's sympathy will be forthcoming by the knowledge of those who served him in the army and navy of public service during the war.
