EAST AFRICA IN PARLIAMENT.

In the Imperial Parliament before the Mail left, On the vote of £20,000 for a grant in aid to the British East Africa Protectorate, Mr. M'Kenna moved to reduce the vote by £100. The grants in aid in the six years up to March 31, 1900, had amounted to £566,000, while, in that period, our import and export trade with British East Africa was £240,000.

If any leasee fails or neglects to perform any condition contained or implied in his lease application, or to comply with any cancellation thereon in the form or to the effect set forth in the Schedule (I) hereto annexed, and at the time of lodging such application, there shall be deposited herewith a sum of money, to be applied as security for the due performance of the application, and in satisfaction of any expenses which the lessor may be put to by such application, if unsuccessful; and if such application shall not be successful, such sum shall, in respect of such deposit, may be handed over to the lessor as may be necessary to pay the expenses of such lease, and the balance, if any, shall be refunded to the applicant after deducting the amount of the notice hereafter mentioned. PORTUGUESE NOTES.

ANGLO-LUZITANIAN JOTTINGS.
