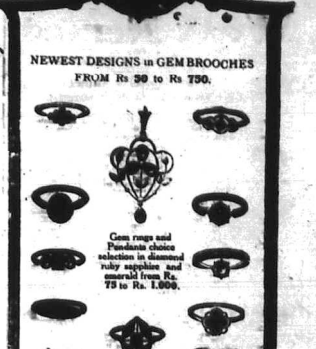

Mr. Holm, Director of Agricultural and Mr. Daly, in a few well chosen remarks, welcomed the new Chaplain, and Mr. M'Quinn, who wished to know exactly what prospects were in the new Chaplain's mind for the good of the Church. The new Chaplain, in reply, said he thanked all those present most heartily for the way they had welcomed him, it was only in the beginning of June last that he stood in a schoolroom and was wished God speed. He bid adieu to his old life, but the Bishop of Mombasa had at length had something to say about things about Nairobi and its people. Very nice things too.

He particularly wished the children of this town to have the same privileges as in the Old Country. 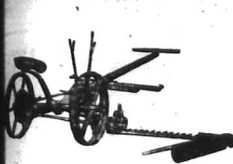



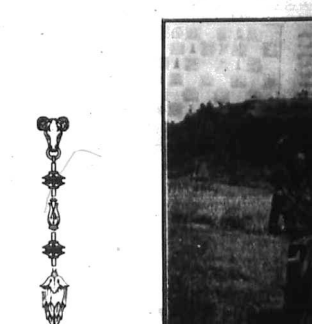

Hoping method of dealing with them.

WORK OF ANTS.

By J. W. Dyer, M.Sc., Ag. Entomologist.

A weed on lucerne in the Nakuru District was being cut by a greater or less severity, and the presence in the same time of a small, dark, slender number of visitors, has afforded the opportunity for some observations and inquiries about the proper method of controlling these insects.

The method has been reported by some flax growers to be completely successful, but others who have used it say they have found it ineffective. There appeared, therefore, to be a complete divergence of the reports, but the tests which were applied on Nakuru farms seem to make clear the reason for the difference of opinion.

The method used was to obtain an index of the number of caterpillars in a flax sward where roving was in progress, and then four days later, to obtain another index of the numbers present as a test of the results of roving. These tests were made by the flax and walking through the flax and counting the number of caterpillars seen in five minutes, several such counts were made on each occasion. The counts were made by the same person each time, in the same part of the sward, and at the same time of the day.

The results may be summarised as follows: SHAMBA NO. 1. The roving took place just forming on the flax, caterpillars were quite numerous. Just a very few had turned cocoons. After four days roving was done with good results. The caterpillars which were seen on the flax at the first count were made. There were a few more cocoons than at the first count, but the numbers were entirely insufficient to account for the reduction in the numbers of caterpillars.

SHAMBA NO. 2. This shamba was on the same ground as shamba No. 1, and quite ready for plucking. The caterpillars were not so numerous as in shamba No. 1, but they were rather less numerous. Failing that, it would certainly do some good to go to collect caterpillars by hand at the junction of the roused and unspelt areas where they were very plentiful.

REDUCING NUMBERS. In the last shamba some observations were made in order to try to determine just in what way the roving was bringing about a reduction in the numbers of caterpillars. Dead or injured caterpillars on the flax were not so numerous as in the other shambas. One large caterpillar was found. One large caterpillar which could not walk a little was seen and each of these latter it was unable to move, being apparently dead. Another caterpillar, not very large, was found on the ground and only seen to move a little; it did not make any attempt to climb up the flax, but was seen to crawl after the other were seen to tackle a single blade, when it would crawl up each time they were seen to attempt, but after an hour and a quarter it was attacked by those ants in force and carried off.
